Moderator, 20th General Assembly

John Meredith Graham, III was elected Moderator of the 20th General Assembly.

A ruling elder ordained in 1977 at First
Presbyterian Church in Rome, Georgia,
John came to the Lord in 1976 during a
lay renewal held at First Presbyterian,
under the leadership of the late Dr.
Andrew Jumper. John is a Sunday school
teacher and participates in the church's
Men's Prayer Breakfast, Men's Accountability
Group and Promise Keepers. His responsibilities on Session have included the Advisory
Committee, Christian Growth and Nurture
Committee, Young Adult Ministries, Prayer
Ministries, and Search Committee for the
Director of Ministry to Families and Children.
He currently serves on the Pastors Advisory



Committee, the Search Committee and Prayer Ministry. John serves the General Assembly as a member of the permanent Committee on Christian Education and Publications.

A graduate of Washington and Lee University and the University of Virginia, John is a partner in the law firm of Smith, Shaw & Maddox. Areas of practice include Fiduciary Law, Trust, Estates and Federal and State Taxation, as well as Transactional Law and special litigation involving trusts and estates. John's professional responsibilities include being a member of the Rome and Georgia Bar Associations, member and past president of the Fiduciary Law Section of the Georgia Bar Association, member of the American College of Trust and Estate Counsel, Director of Sun Trust Bank and Trustee of Darlington School.

John has been honored as Rome (Floyd County) Young Man of the Year, and was one of Five Outstanding Young Men of Georgia (Georgia Jaycees). He also participated in Leadership Georgia.

John and his wife, Frances Ann Daniel Graham, have been married 37 years and are the parents of John M. Graham, IV, Mather D. Graham, and Robert B. Graham. They have five precious grandchildren with a sixth expected in December. John also enjoys tennis, reading, writing, and traveling.

Michael Glodo, Stated Clerk

Reverend Michael Glodo was elected Stated Clerk of the General Assembly. At the end of 2000, the incumbent Stated Clerk, Dr. Edward Davis, will retire after 20 years of service in that office.

Reverend Glodo is a native of southern Illinois, who moved to St. Louis after graduating from the University of Illinois (Urbana) with a B.S. in Accountancy. It was in St. Louis where he joined Central Presbyterian Church in 1980, being ordained a deacon in 1983, Mike's early professional life was spent as a CPA both in public and private accounting. At Central, he would eventually join the staff in its college and



singles ministry while completing his M.Div. at Covenant Theological Seminary. He also served as business manager and secretary-treasurer in the founding year of Lay Renewal Ministries.

JOURNAL

Minutes - Thursday morning

First Session June 22, 2000

20-1 MORNING WORSHIP

Worship began at 8:30 a.m. in the sanctuary of Ward Presbyterian Church, Northville, Michigan Moderator Jimmy McGuire, opened the service with prayer after opening music Just A Little Talk with Jesus sung by the Ward Men's Chorus. Following congregational singing and a responsive reading, the Ward Men's Chorus sang Great Is Thy Faithfulness. Rev. Mark Jumper led in a season of prayer and introduced Stated Clerk Edward Davis who preached from Esther 4:14 on the theme For Such A Time As This.

For Such a Time As This Dr. Edward Davis, Stated Clerk Thursday, June 22, 2000

In the opening worship service of the 20th General Assembly, preaching is typically the pleasure and privilege of the host pastor of the church in which the assembly is convening. And I have this privilege of opening God's Word in my heart to you only by the insistent request of this church's pastor, Dr. McGuire, to whom I am indebted for this privilege.

Would you turn with me please to the Book of Esther. In your pew Bibles it's page 354. My readings will skim the book. We're beginning in the first chapter, the first verse. Our text ultimately arises out of the fourth chapter the fourteenth verse so if you get lost in the process, just stay in chapter 4 and we'll ultimately come back to you as we think together on the subject, "For Such a Time As This," This is the Word of God. Listen to it.

This is what happened during the time of Xerxes, the Xerxes who ruled 127 provinces stretching from India to Cush. At that time King Xerxes reigned from his royal throne in the citadel of Susa, and in the third year of his reign he gave a banquet for all his nobles and officials. The military leaders of Persia and Media, the princes and nobles of the provinces were present.

For a full 180 days he displayed the vast wealth of his kingdom and the splendor and glory of his majesty. When these days were over, the king gave a banquet lasting seven days. On the seventh day he commanded the seven eunuchs who served him to bring before him Queen Vashti in order to display her beauty. Queen Vashti refused to come. Then the king became furious and burned with anger. He spoke with the wise men who understood the times and were closest to the king who said to him, "Therefore if it pleases the king let him issue a royal decree that Vashti is never again to enter the presence of the king. Also let the king give her royal position to someone else who is better than she."

Then the king's personal attendants proposed, "Let the search be made for a beautiful young virgin for the king." Now there was in the citadel of Susa a Jew of the tribe of Benjamin named Mordecai who had been carried into the exile from Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzor, king of Babylon. And Mordecai had a cousin by the name of Hadassah whom he had brought up because she had neither father nor mother. This girl, who was also known as Esther, was lovely in form and features.

Esther had not revealed her nationality and family background because Mordecai had forbidden her to do so. Now the king was attracted to Esther more than to any of the other women so he set a royal crown on her head and made her queen.

And after these events, King Xerxes honored Haman, elevating him and giving him a seat of honor higher than all the other nobles, but Mordecai would not kneel down or pay him honor, When Haman saw that Mordecai would not kneel down or pay him honor, he was enraged. Yet having learned who Mordecal's people were, Haman looked for a way to destroy all Mordecal's people, the Jews throughout the whole kingdom of Xerxes. Then Haman said to King Xerxes, "There's a certain people dispersed and scattered among the people in all the provinces of your kingdom whose customs are different from all other people and who do not obey the king's law. If it pleases the king, let a decree be issued to destroy them." And the king said to Haman, "Do with the people as you please." Dispatches were sent by couriers to all the king's provinces with the order to destroy, kill and annihilate all the Jews.

When Mordecai learned of all that had been done, he tore his clothes, put on sackcloth and ashes and went out into the city, wailing loudly and bitterly. Then Esther summoned one of the king's eunuchs assigned to attend her and ordered him to find out what was troubling Mordecai and why. And Mordecai told him everything that had happened to him. He also gave him a copy of the text of the edict for their annihilation. He told him to urge Esther to go into the king's presence to beg for mercy and plead with him for her people. And he went back to Esther and she instructed him to say to Mordecai, "All the king's officials and the people of the royal provinces know that for any man or woman who approaches the king without being summoned, the king has but one law: that he be put to death. The only exception to this is for the king to extend the gold scepter to him and spare his life." When Esther's words were reported back to Mordecai, he sent back to her this answer; "Do not think that because you are in the king's house you alone will escape. For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father's family will perish. And who knows but that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?" Then Esther sent this reply to Mordecai: "Go, gather together all the Jews who are in Susa, and fast for me. When this is done I will go to the king even though it is against the law. And if I perish."

On the third day Esther put on her royal robes and stood in the inner court of the palace in front of the king's hall. When he saw Queen Esther standing in the court, he was pleased with her and held out to her the gold scepter that was in his hand. Then the king asked, "What is it, Queen Esther? What is your request? Even up to half the kingdom, it will be given you." Queen Esther answered, "If I have found favor with you O king, and if it pleases your majesty, grant me my life and spare my people. For I and my people have been sold for destruction and slaughter and annihilation." King Xerxes asked Queen Esther, "Who is he? Where is the man who has dared to do such a thing?" Esther said, "The adversary and enemy is this vile Haman." The king said, "Hang him." So they hanged Haman on

the gallows he had prepared for Mordecai. Then the king's fury subsided.

Esther again pleaded with the king, "If it pleases the king and if he regards me with favor, let an order be written overruling the dispatches that Haman wrote to destroy the Jews in all the king's provinces. For how can I bear to see the destruction of my family? The king replied, "Now write another decree in the king's name on behalf of the Jews". The king's edict granted the Jews in every city the right to assemble and protect themselves. For the Jews it was a time of happiness and joy, gladness and honor."

I want to begin by suggesting, as we think upon our textual context and thought without lifting it unduly out of its historical context, that we think on the question, "May it be that God has brought you to this royal position," Mordecai said to Esther, "for such a time as this?" And our question, as we enter the 20th anniversary of our life together as a people, is the question, is it indeed true that God, by his grace, has brought us to this time and this place for a very special purpose? I would suggest to you that we are not here, and have not been here these 20 years, by accident but rather by the sovereign providence of our Lord. Twenty years ago in this church, in a General Assembly convened following several preceding convocations in the city of St. Louis, approximately 12 churches representing 10,000 people, and about 75 ruling elders and teaching elders came together and constituted in that first assembly a

family of God known as the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

And here we are today, beginning our 20th year of celebration which will span yet another Assembly. You know, in the scriptures there are at least two major words of great interest for the word "time." They are the words "chronos" and "kairos." History is suggested as being the succession of moments. But kairos in the Old Testament (we find it more than 300 times in the Septuagint) indicates a special time and place in which from God to his people and into the created order, there is a special movement and visitation of God which is decisive, special and unique. Out of our textual context this morning, that is, with Esther and Mordecai of old, the Jewish people of the southern kingdom had been carried into exile by Nebuchadnezzar. Two portions of the kingdom in captivity had been enabled under Zerubbabel and Ezra to return to Judah and Jerusalem and rebuild, but there were still those, the Diaspora, who lived in what was now the Persian empire. Mordecai and young Esther and other Jews were part of the exilic community who continued living in that great empire. God's community, his people, were about to go through the hideous conspiracy and the political machinations of a man by the rame of Haman and were under an edict to be exterminated. To be killed. To be rubbed out. To be eliminated. The king had not realized the extent of the conspiracy, and edicts had gone out that this strange people spread across the provinces of the empire were at some

subsequent point to be eliminated in whatever way was seen fit. Into that very special moment of history of God's people came a kairos moment. Now, I am fully aware those of you who know and have studied the Old Testament very well, that irrespective of the high regard the Book of Esther holds in the Jewish community and understandably so, there is no formal recognition or identification of God in the Book of Esther, But those of you who understand the canon and the work of the Spirit of God in forming the canon at least as understood in most of our Reformation tradition, know that we believe that the canon (the old, the new and every part of it), is what it is and where it is by the work of the Holy Spirit. That the inspiration of God's Spirit upon the written words delivered however God so ordains is the criteria of canonicity, and we accept Esther as part of God's divine and infallible Word. It's a story of providential and sovereign deliverance. It's a reminder to us as God's people even in our day, that the Lord of history is also the sovereign in every regard of our well being, of our comings and goings, of the vicissitudes that may confront us. He is God almighty who made both heaven and earth and this beautiful creation as fallen as it may be. and we are his people-even we who stand in the covenantal tradition of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and the Reformers, We are who we are and we stand where we stand not by accident but by the divine sovereign call of a provident God. And I would dare to say there is, however modest it may be, an analogy to be understood in God's ways and God's dealings between the making of this family of churches defined by those common spiritual biblical values which we share and are bonded together, if you will permit me the indulgence of Jonathan Edwards' favorite phrase, in "the effectionality of the Holy Spirit." If Jonathan Edwards bothers you (and I trust he doesn't), then substitute the word "fellowship" for "effectionality." But the word "effectionality" is great for a sermon.

But God, 20 years ago, moved upon a small group of people, many of whom are in his glory today so that you and I might be here today. When we look at the Book of Esther, it's fascinating to be reminded by those little providential reminders. Humanly speaking we might call them the ironies of God's providence that saved God's people and set the stage for deliverance: The queen's deposition and the identification of a young, heretofore unknown. Hebrew stepchild of a Jew from the tribe of Benjamin by the name of Mordecai. Her selection out of many others, her being identified as queen and accepted when the urgency was there for her to approach the king, her being accepted by his grace into his presence that she might speak forth the word that needed to be heard irrespective of the potential cost that she knew she might pay; if I perish, so be it, I will perish. And yet the king's graciousness, even in the land of the Medes and Persians and all that meant for the laws of that day, was to issue an edict that overrode the preceding edict in a marvelous way. These were not accidents, folks. These were the divine acts of an intervening God in a kairos moment in which God moved into the plane of human history to do something special and unique that would remind people that above all else, they were the people of God, the family of God. Twenty years ago God called us into this family. And in those early years the story could be told of many delightful ironies of providence, Some of you may not like that contract, but that's okay. We'll get by with it. Men and women were used in

significant ways to bring us into this family.

There are four observations I would like to make out of this text, out of the understanding that as it was in Esther and Mordecai's historical time, when the word of God came to her through him and said, "Who knows but

that you have come to royal position for such a time as this?"

Keep that question before us and never presume that what we are today, or have been by God's providential sovereignty and graciousness, is that which we will always and automatically be. But rather we are reminded that as we walk as a people by faith we will increasingly become what God wants us to be only if we are faithful. And that faithfulness, if nothing else in American Presbyterian history teaches us, should not be taken for granted. But there came to that little group of pilgrims in the late 70s and early 80s through a variety of means, a conclusion. And the conclusion, if you will permit a roughly stated phrase, was "Enough is enough." Enough is enough. That was a kairos moment. Let me make four observations about what it meant to say "enough is enough" at that time.

The first observation is this. Because we ask the question, enough is enough of what? I would say to you it was the erosion of the uncompromising fidelity to the infallible authority of God's word. Enough is enough. We had seen the authority of that word severely compromised. We had been reminded by the prophets within the Christian community that God is not silent and God does not stutter. And we recognized that in the community in which some of us were a part the God who does not stutter had a people who did. Enough is enough. We recognized that in the gentle erosion of the authority of an infallible word of God there is ultimately an erosion of the Christology that makes us who we are. We recognized that with the crosion of the authority of God's word and the impact on the Christology that is the historic backbone of the body of Christ, there is ultimately an erosion of the Gospel, the compromising of the unequivocal testimony of scripture that under no other name than the name of Jesus Christ are men and women to be saved and brought into his kingdom. Enough is enough,

The second observation from that kairos moment out of which we've come is this: there was the erosion of freedom of conscience. Some of you here this morning lived through (as you did the Mansfield Kaseman issue that speaks to point one) the implications of the Kenyon case. This purported to say that the larger church in matters that are secondary to the fundamental truths of the confessions and creeds that we own, can be trusted, and the freedom given to God's people to sovereignly ascertain the will of God's Spirit for them as a people. We did not need to be told to elect to office any particular class, origin, or race needed by God's people. Nor on the other hand, when we began to look around and realize there was no room at the inn outside the Big Inn at thut point, did we need to be told that we shouldn't have the freedom to make that choice if that was the will of God's people in any given time and place. This was the erosion of freedom of conscience, the ability to let the main things be the main things and to let secondary things be secondary and to believe that the Spirit of God will be faithful to the sessions, presbyteries and the assembly of our family of churches.

The third observation was that there seemed to be a growing unwillingness to be fully Trinitarian: to not only happily affirm the Father and the Son but also the reality of the Holy Spirit. To affirm the presence and vitality of the Holy Spirit and his power, his giftedness, his calling, his fruitfulness. To recognize that we didn't have to grapple with the issues of enthusiasm of the Azusa Street movement or extremities such as that insofar as our tradition is concerned. But we needed to have both the freedom and the conviction to affirm that God is three in one, fully Trinitarian, and that the Holy Spirit is God with us wanting to bless and empower and endue us. This is a kairos moment - the anointing, the pouring forth and the empowerment of the Spirit of God in freedom upon his people. So we recognize that we chose, and needed to choose, and saw it in a fresh and new way that there is a wonderful life of abundant living in the Spirit, not only in the scriptures but also in our predecessors—great persons of faith who have preceded us—in John Calvin and John Knox, in Richard Baxter, Jonathan Edwards. The effectionality of the Holy Spirit.

Last, the fourth observation that came to us in that kairos moment and which we carry with us, was the recognition of our failure at times, even as evangelicals and faithful to our confessions, to practice God's truth in the graciousness of his love. You will remember, those of you who were here twenty years ago, that Francis Schaeffer ministered to us and reminded us of the message of one of his little books that God's family lives out its lives as God's people before a watching world. And they not only need to see and hear divine truth, but they need to see and experience God's divine love. We heard him remind us, as one who stood in the tradition of the 20s and 30s, although the Machen controversy and those who gave much in those years (himself included) to hold forth the truth of the word of God, at times it was done without the love that it warranted. And so we were reminded that we hold forth the

truth, and need to hold forth the truth, before a watching world with great, great love.

The baton is passing from a first generation to the second. This is a kairos moment. The issues may change but the fundamental principles that affirm that the absence of divine truth and divine love and the reality of a Trinitarian God are realities to which we must never slip and principles from which we must never move. The issues will change The Mansfield Kasemans will die and go on to their eternal assessment. Many of the rest of us have gone, or will go in the years ahead. But the issues of faith and conscience and fidelity and confidence and empowerment and love will continue the need of the family of God until the Lord returns. The specific issues are changing but the fundamental principial issues are not. Twenty years ago we didn't have to struggle with what we have to today - issues of abortion. euthanasia, and biological determinism. We did not have to struggle at that time with the issue of same-sex marriages, but today we do. But the faithfulness that God brought us to out of that kairos moment and spoke to us of, is the faithfulness that he calls us to reaffirm today. Let the word go forth to the world that knows us, that the baton is being passed to a new, spiritually vital, faithful generation. Let the word go forth that God is continuing to bless us mightily. Let the word go forth that we intend to remain faithful to the infallible authority of his word, to the fullness of his Son, to the reality of the outpouring and empowerment and life that is in his Spirit. Let no one question us on that Let the word also go forth that God has richly blessed us with wonderful resources. These past years it's been my privilege to move across the face of other Christian kingdom organizations and to be involved to some extent in some of them. Let me say to you that in that broad exposure, which has been a privilege, there's no body, no family of God that I'm aware of that has any greater men and women endowed with the Holy Spirit than we do. These men and women who occupy pulpits can turn this culture and nation around. When churches are so vital with the life of the Spirit the watching world has to sit up and take notice. This is the heritage God has given us. And in this kairos moment, as we celebrate not only God's faithfulness to us in the past, let us celebrate the expectations that he wants to give us for the future. Let's be happy and joyful and, with Mordecai of old after God had delivered his people through the faithfulness of Esther, proclaim to a watching world the reality of who we are as a family. And as that reality is proclaimed, like God's people of old in Persia, may there be times of great joy and great happiness and great celebration because God, once again, wants to visit us. Let us pray.

Our Father and our God, we would not dare to simply celebrate the past, as important as it is. As we convene these days, by your Spirit may we enjoy the present through the presence of your Spirit. But, O God, as you in your sovereign and providential way pass this legacy of your grace onto others, may we celebrate that with great expectation also. Fill our hearts with great joy and happiness that the God whom we love and serve who is from

everlasting to everlasting is ever ready and willing to revisit his people. And, O Lord, we look for that divine moment. These things we pray in your name and for the glory of your son. Amen.

Rev. McGuire introduced the EPC missionaries present, noting thanks to Women's Ministries whose Faith Focus project raised the funds necessary to bring them home for this Assembly. This Assembly begins a yearlong celebration as the EPC begins its 20th year as a church family.

20-5 EMERITUS STATUS TO BE CONFERRED ON STATED CLERK

The Moderator addressed the Assembly to nominate Rev. Edward Davis, Stated Clerk to emeritus status upon his retirement at the end of 2000. The Assembly honored the Stated Clerk with a standing ovation.

ON MOTION that the Assembly shall confer on Stated Clerk Edward Davis, effective upon his retirement, the honored distinction of Emeritus as allowed in G.15-5D.

20-6 ELECTION OF 20th GENERAL ASSEMBLY MODERATOR

Elder John Sherard Chairman of the Nominating Committee introduced Rev. James Van Dyke First, Rome, GA) to present the nomination for Moderator of the 20th General Assembly. Dr. Van Dyke placed the name of Elder John Graham from First Presbyterian, Rome, in nomination for Moderator of the 20th General Assembly.

ON MOTION Elder John Graham was elected Moderator of the 20th General Assembly. The newly elected Moderator introduced his wife, Frances, and offered personal comments as he accepted the position of Moderator. Rev. Bill Flannagan offered prayer for the new Moderator and his wife.

20-7 THE MODERATOR'S ADDRESS

The Retiring Moderator, Rev. Jimmy McGuire, offered reflections on his year of ministry as Moderator of the 19th General Assembly.

Moderator's Address Dr. Jimmy McGuire Moderator, 19th General Assembly

Lucy and I want to thank you for a great year. I had no idea what this office really entailed nor the sacrifice or the blessing it would bring, and it has been both of those. I have a gracious church with a staff that filled in and was able to carry on when I was not there, which is kind of scary. It lets you know how careful you must be to keep living or maybe they won't notice.

In the providence of God we were able to visit every presbytery and Brazil where there is a grand Presbyterian church in fellowship with us. We visited St. Andrews Presbytery in Argentina where there is an equally grand cluster of our people who will soon form their own denomination. I discovered a fine spirit of unity and cooperation. It was good for me to be broadened by my experience with you. I thank God for it, and so does Lucy.

We found that the marks of the Church are alive among us, which has to be the work of the Spirit. There's the right preaching of the Word, the right observing of the sacraments, the practicing of biblical discipline and maintaining loving fellowship. These are the marks of the people of God. We were encouraged as we moved around. When you just stay in your local church you lose sight of the fact that there is a larger church out there. We thank you for teaching us about the love of God in the hard practice of being the Church. It is not easy, but God has given grace.

There are several issues sweeping our denomination, some of which we will address today. The relationship of "The Essentials of Our Faith" to the Westminster Confession of Faith is a major issue. Affordable major medical coverage might be more on people's minds than the Essential/Westminster Confession debate. The planting of new churches, and the matter of women in ministry are also issues that are alive with us today. Of them all, the first two create the most discussion: major medical and the Essentials. On planting churches we all agree. The last one, women in ministry (particularly as teaching elders), we have, so far, refused to allow to become a separating issue. On the Essentials issue, we have an ad interim committee that will bring a recommendation to the 21st Assembly. I am extremely encouraged by the work of the Spirit among the 18 people on that committee, two from every presbytery. We see the answers, we believe, and Tuesday of this week the leading of the Spirit became evident to us all. It was one of those kairos moments in life when you say "the Spirit of God is in this." It's not just us cranking out some thoughts. We will have a report for you at the 21st Assembly. And let us hope that Christ returns first!

On the major medical issue, we know in the end we will find the best and most agreeable way to offer affordable quality care for all of us. On the planting of new churches, every presbytery and several individual churches are pressing to make things happen. And with the leadership of presbyteries from within and Bill Meyer from the National Outreach office, we are seeing paydays. We must do that. That's the lifeblood of the church, the next generation, raising up new churches.

The final issue, the ordination of women as teaching elders, is focused at presbytery level. There's no discussion about what local churches can do, but there are tensions on the presbytery level where the authority to ordain teaching elders resides and must reside. Some churches choose to ordain women; some do not. Some presbyteries seem closed to women as teaching elders while others are open. What if you are in a church that believes calling women as teaching elders is improper and yet you are in a presbytery which ordains women? What if you are in a church that believes it should call a woman as a teaching elder and yet you are in a presbytery that won't let you do that? A large part of the resolution of that issue lies in our understanding of God's leading through the jointly made decisions of presbytery. God leads through corporate decision-making, we say. And so that's the first thing in each of our spirits that says we are where we are by the hand of God. There is a submission to the brothers that is required unless you don't believe that and then you don't want to be Presbyterian. You just want to be independent. We love you but we can never satisfy all your needs, no matter which side you are on. But as I said, we've decided thus far we will not allow that to divide us as we submit ourselves to one another in the Lord.

But there's another part of that not to be left unsaid: Are you able to allow that another church in your presbytery just might be led of God to accomplish its particular mission in a different way from yours? And are you open
to granting that church the freedom to pursue that mission with your love? This question applies equally both to
those who believe in ordination of women and those who do not. Now, this issue has practical implications which
is why it matters. Some want to support new church plants that have only men ruling and teaching elders and some
want to support new church plants that allow women as ruling and teaching elders. So you see the rub. The question
for presbyleries to answer is how can our churches walk together in this matter and give real support to each other in
planting new churches that may not look like us? How do I rise to that occasion to support my neighbor who wants
a church to look different from how we want ours to look? We are one family. We need to figure out how to answer
that. I don't have the answer but I know it's there. Remember, the EPC has determined constitutionally that women's
ordination is non-essential. My plea is for vigilance to keep it so. In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all
things, charity. To God be the glory.

20-8 PARTIAL REPORT OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Elder John Sherard, chairman, opened the report with prayer. The chairman noted that all pre-registered commissioners have been assigned to standing committees, including commissioners whose registrations were mailed no later than 10 days prior to the convening of the Assembly (cf. Rules for Assembly §8-2). The chairman called the Assembly's attention to the slate of nominations for permanent committees in the Commissioner's Handbook.

20-9 RATIFICATION VOTE ON DESCENDING OVERTURES

The Stated Clerk offered prayer and reviewed the procedures for ratification of descending overtures. Three descending overtures were referred to the presbyteries. Overtures 99-A and 99-C received the required support of the presbyteries, Overture 99-B did not. (For vote of the presbyteries, see p. 187ff).

15-9The retirement of a Minister: A Minister may request Presbytery to be placed on the Retired Roll of Presbytery due to age. infirmity, or other debilitating condition. If the Presbytery concurs, a service of appreciation and thanksgiving should be conducted, either at the meeting of Presbytery or at the place of service of the retiring Minister. Ordinarily, a Presbytery shall appoint a special Commission to conduct this service and a record of it inserted in the minutes of Presbytery. A Minister who is so retired remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership may be transferred to another Presbytery. The Presbytery shall be responsible for making an annual review of its retired members to be sure of their welfare and to rectify any deficiencies. Such annual review shall be reported to the court and recorded in its minutes.

(No section 15-10 currently exists.)

Status. The Presbytery, at its discretion and after judicious consideration, may place the Minister on the Inactive Status Roll involuntarily provided the vote to do so is by a two-thirds majority.

A limit shall be placed on the time during which a Minister on Inactive Status who is not retired shall remain on the roll of Presbytery, the limit being five years. After five years, the Presbytery has the right to drop that person from the roll without censure.

15-9 The retirement of a Minister: A Minister may request Presbytery to be placed on the Retired Roll of Presbytery due to age, infirmity, or other debilitating condition. If the Presbytery concurs, a service of appreciation and thanksgiving should be conducted, either at the meeting of Presbytery or at the place of service of the retiring Minister. Ordinarily, a Presbytery shall appoint a special Commission to conduct this service and a record of it inserted in the minutes of Presbytery. A Minister who is so retired remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership-may be transferred to another Presbytery. The Presbytery shall be responsible for making an annual review of its retired members to be sure of their welfare and to rectify any deficiencies. Such annual review shall be reported to the court and recorded in its minutes.

15-10 Retired Ministers: A Minister who is retired according to the provision of G.15-9 remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership may be transferred to another Presbytery. A Retired Minister who does not participate in the life of the Presbytery by attending at least one Stated Meeting during a calendar year, may be placed on Inactive Status at the discretion of the Presbytery. After at least one year, the Retired Minister may request Presbytery to be restored to Active Status. The

Presbytery shall make the determination based on the Minister's participation in the meetings of the Presbytery and need not require a specific call to be restored to Active Status. A Retired Minister on Inactive Status shall not be removed from the Presbytery rolls for that cause and is to
be afforded the same pastoral care as Retired Ministers on Active Status.

ON MOTION Descending Overture 99-C was ratified.

He referred to his written report, citing figures for active membership and internal growth as well as baptisms and Sunday school enrollment. Fifty percent of our churches reflect a membership of 100 or less. It remains difficult for churches of less than 100 members to meet their obligations and experience growth, and more difficult still in smaller communities.

The Stated Clerk discussed denominational giving. In 1999, our churches gave an average of \$45.96 per member toward the administrative budgets and benevolence askings in addition to World Outreach missionary support. He challenged the churches to step up to the financial support needed to more satisfactorily operate the Assembly office. Though the Assembly, at the outset, declared the General Assembly Office would be "lean," the Stated Clerk declared that "we have been too lean for too long."

On behalf of the General Assembly, the Stated Clerk has asked the 19th General Assembly

Moderator to represent the EPC at the Amsterdam 2000 convocation this summer. The Stated Clerk also implored the Assembly to understand and respond to the challenge to develop executive leadership at the presbytery level and to become more serious about the ongoing mission of the church. Until the presbyteries have executive leadership, it is not likely they will be able to accomplish their goals. (See pp. 324-334 for full Report of the Stated Clerk.)

Grounds:

Most Reformed bodies prohibit the possibility of succession.

Although there are occasional apparent exceptions, the General Assembly Office is aware of numerous situations in which the possibility of succession has resulted in turbulence, unrest, conflict or disruption within congregations.

Some have suggested that prohibiting succession binds the Spirit in his work of calling
to ministry. However, the fact that the Holy Spirit works through the orderly processes
of our church courts is a basic principle of our constitutional system of church
governance.

 Scripture affirms that God does not author confusion (1 Cor. 14). In our experience, the possibility of succession from within is more likely to generate unrest conflict and discord than it is the peace, unity and purity of the church.

Such cooperation includes informing Presbytery as early as possible of Session's intent and proposed location for a mission church (G.16-16.E). However, to organize into a particular church is a right reserved to the Presbytery.
- 5-2 The development of a mission church:
 A mission church consists of a number of professing Christians, with their children, associated together for divine worship and godly living, agreeable to the Scriptures, and submitting to the lawful government and discipline of the Evangelical Presbyterian

The mission church, because of its transitional nature, requires a temporary system of government. Depending on the circumstances, and at its own discretion, Presbytery shall provide for such government in one of several ways:

- A. Appoint an Evangelist as prescribed in 10-3C of the Book of Government and entrust appropriate powers to that person.
- B. Cooperate with the Session of a particular church in arranging a mother-daughter relationship with a mission church. The Session may then serve as the temporary governing body of the mission church.
- C. Appoint a commission to serve as a temporary Session of the mission church.

At the discretion of the temporary governing body, members may be received into the mission church as prescribed in Chapter 9. These persons then become confirmed or baptized members of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. Mission churches shall maintain membership rolls in the same manner as, but separate from other particular churches.

Mission churches and their members shall have the right of judicial process to the court having oversight of their temporary governing body. It is the further intention of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church that mission churches enjoy the same status as particular churches in relationship to civil government.

A mission church is distinguished from a particular church in that it has no permanent governing body, and thus must be governed or supervised by others. However, its goal is to mature and be organized as a particular church as soon as this can be done in good order.

A Governance: The mission church, because of its transitional nature, requires a temporary system of government. Depending on the circumstances, and at its own discretion, Presbytery government shall be provided for such government in by one of several ways means:

- Presbytery may appoint an Evangelist as prescribed in 10-3C of the Book of Government and entrust appropriate powers to that person.
- Cooperate with The Session of a particular church in arranging a mother-daughter relationship with a mission church The Session may then serve as the temporary governing body of the mission church.
- Presbytery or Session may appoint a mission-church. commission to serve as a temporary Session of the mission church.
- B. Membership: At the discretion of the temporary governing body, Members may shall be received into the mission church as prescribed in Chapter 9. These persons then become confirmed or baptized members of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. Mission churches shall maintain membership rolls in the same manner as, but separate from other particular churches.

Mission churches and their members shall have the right of judicial process to the court having oversight of their temporary governing body. It is the further intention of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church that mission churches enjoy the same status as particular churches in relationship to civil government.

Grounds: Experience in planting churches has shown that this section of the Book of Government needs greater clarity. The proposed substitution clarifies the nature of cooperation expected between sessions and presbyteries and the different means by which mission churches are
governed. The substitution also clarifies the necessity and means by which membership rolls
in mission churches are kept.

Recommendation #19

"Strategic Area #5 HOME MISSIONS: To enable workers to present the love of Christ to English-speaking people groups in the USA, unreached by the established church.

- 2. To find and nurture qualified missionaries who will live with these groups,
- 3. To assist these workers in securing funds for their ministries;

Grounds: Many people within the United States are unserved (or underserved) by the established church, e.g., Native Americans, migrant workers, rural and urban poor, handicapped individuals, families of recent immigrants, homeless people, substance abusers, prison and jail inmates and their families. This will enable NOC to call Home Missionaries to minister to these people and to enable these Home Missionaries to raise necessary support from our congregations. Referred to the Committee on National Outreach (p. 50)

Recommendation #20

In response to the 19th General Assembly's instruction to the National Outreach Committee "to propose a plan for funding church planting," that the following Plan for Funding Church Planting be approved:

- A 3-year campaign to raise \$750,000 will be started January 1, 2001.
- 2. Contributions to the Fund will be sought from presbyteries, churches and individuals.
- 3. The Fund will be used as follows:
 - · Two-thirds for church/presbytery/NOC partner projects;
 - · One-third for NOC-initiated projects.
- Church planters of NOC-approved projects will be required to raise 50% of their compensation package for a period of three years. (Part of this may be accomplished by being a bi-vocational church planter.)

Grounds: The \$750,000 is approximately double what has been received through the Church Planting and Key City Benevolence Askings. The Committee believes that with a broad-based campaign that encourages grass roots church planting as well as NOC initiated plants, the church-at-large will respond. Furthermore, when church planters participate in the fundraising effort, several things will occur.

- · They become more fiscally aware;
- Supporting churches identify more closely with people;

The planter's commitment and aggressiveness is demonstrated.

A great challenge for the church in every age is to pass on the lifechanging message of the gospel of Jesus in a way that is both powerful and meaningful to the next generation. Teens and young adults must be nurtured in their understanding of the great truths of the Christian faith. This curriculum is offered as one possible part in the process of accomplishing that vital goal.

20-18 INTRODUCTION OF FRATERNAL GUESTS

The Stated Clerk welcomed representatives from various denominations and ministries and each brought greetings to the Assembly. **Dr. David Englehard**, General Secretary of the Christian Reformed Church, summarized some of the key decisions made at their recent Synod meeting, including the matter of women as elders, an issue which has generated ongoing discussion for the past five years. **Rev. Jim Corbitt**, Director of Outreach, North America (Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church), reminded the Assembly of the Geneva Statement, a working fraternal agreement for ministry between our two denominations as well as our joint Assessment Center for Church Planting. He noted that the ARP has also has a continuing discussion on women in ministry, particularly as deacons. The Moderator led the court in prayer for our sister denominations.

Dr. Robert Pitman, Founder and President of Knox Fellowship, spoke to the Assembly, noting that two EPC ministers, Dr. Richard Little and Dr. Duane Armistead, are part of the founding of Knox Fellowship. The purpose of Knox is to assist churches in evangelism so that in 5 years a church will grow by 30% in membership. He said that when the Spirit of God is present in the Church, there is a yearning for prayer, a hunger for the scriptures, a freedom for sacrifice, a burden for the lost and an exercise of spiritual gifts. The Stated Clerk led the court in prayer for Dr. Pitman and Knox Fellowship. Mr. Robert Millard Regional Director of Development of King College, then brought greetings on behalf of the college, noting that he recognized EPC members who are now graduates, trustees and members of the board of King College. The Moderator offered prayer for Mr. Millard and the ministry of King College.

Grounds: Experience in planting churches has shown that this section of the Book of Government needs greater clarity. The proposed substitution clarifies the nature of cooperation expected between Sessions and Presbyteries and the different means by which mission churches are governed. The substitution also clarifies the necessity and means by which membership rolls in mission churches are kept.

Following the adoption of the amendments to Recommendation #18, the Report of the Committee on National Outreach was suspended to accommodate the lunch schedule. 20-25 REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSION & BENEFITS

The chairman, Elder Orin Littlejohn, opened the report with prayer. (See pages 134-140 for full report of the Board of Pension and Benefits.)

ON MOTION the Administration Committee was granted permission to give a partial report in conjunction with the report of the Board of Pension and Benefits on Overtures 00-B and 00-C. (Cf. Rules for Assembly, 8-10.)

A representative of Fidelity Investments, Ms. Diane Bolden, made a brief presentation on the benefits of the EPC Pension Plan including use of the Net Benefits features of the Fidelity Internet site. The Plan has made some significant changes this year, with additional opportunities for investment. There is a greater variety of funds and on-line investing is now an option.

Elder Littlejohn summarized the state of the medical insurance plan, reiterating the reasons for the 49% increase in premium in January and noting that the problems which generated this increase are now under control. Claims rose from an average of \$1,792,454 annually for the years of 1995-98 to a cost of \$2,659,769 for 1999. This represents an increase of \$867,000. Without a premium adjustment, the medical reserve funds decreased from approximately \$2,000,000 to \$830,000, both in principle and the interest income derived from such.

The Board has taken a number of steps to correct and strengthen our Plan.

- 1) We have contracted with a new third party administrator (TPA).
- We have negotiated for a new Stop Loss Insurance carrier, again at a savings as compared to our previous coverage.
- A prescription card is now included which saves both the participant and the Plan a significant amount of money
- 4) We have instituted an annual review process whereby the adequacy of our medical

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reserves shall be evaluated and unwise erosion of such fund precluded.

Other suggestions considered by the board include:

1) a change to a fully insured plan;

- regionalization of the insurance coverage allowing each presbytery to provide for the medical insurance of their pastors and employees;
- 3) enforcing complete compliance or participation in our plan, and
- 4) merely keeping the plan as is or decrease benefits.

Recommendations:

 That the Medical Plan be amended to cover home health care services when provided within 7 days following discharge from a hospital and for a cause related to the cause of the hospital confinement.

Grounds: This provision is intended to limit unnecessary care. Most plan documents contain this provision and specify "within 7 days following hospital discharge." Home health care services should have provision similar to those for services rendered by a skilled nursing facility.

Grounds: Many people within the United States are unserved (or underserved) by the established church, e.g., Native Americans, migrant workers, rural and urban poor, handicapped individuals, families of recent immigrants, homeless people, substance abusers, prison and jail inmates and their families. This will enable NOC to call Home Missionaries to minister to these people and to enable these Home Missionaries to raise necessary support from our congregations.

The standing committee recommended amending Recommendation #19 with the following changes, and to adopt as amended:

- Following "Strategic Area #5 Home Missions," replace the first word "To" with the following words: "In partnership, cooperation with, and/or at the request of Presbytery, we will" (enable etc.) so that the section would read as follows:
 - "Strategic Area #5 HOME MISSIONS: In partnership, cooperation with, and/or at the request of Presbytery, we will enable workers to present the love of Christ to English-speaking people groups in the USA, unreached by the established church."

- They become more fiscally aware;
- · Supporting churches identify more closely with people;
- The planter's commitment and aggressiveness is demonstrated.

Lucy McGuire, editor of *Reflections* magazine, was given the floor to report on *Reflections* magazine. She opened with prayer. Mrs. McGuire presented a verbal and graphical report on the work, plans and financial support for our EPC denominational magazine. *Reflections* now has a website: EPC-reflections.com. She encouraged commissioners to pick up the latest copy, available throughout the church, and asked the churches to distribute the magazine to all the families in their congregations. Financial support of the magazine is crucial to its continuation.

The Stated Clerk took the podium to exhort commissioners to encourage their churches to financially support the magazine. \$25,000 is still needed for this year and an additional \$50,000 in 2001. The budget items approved at this Assembly do not cover the entire costs of publishing.

Dr. Dan Erickson, Executive Director, National Coalition of Men's Ministries, was given the floor. He emphasized the decline in male participation in the larger church and the need for intentional men's ministries. He exhorted the Assembly to reach men and develop a disciple-making ministry, because by reaching men, entire families will be reached. Too many men in America do not consider church relevant today. It is time to make an intentional bid to reach these men. Dr. Erickson asked the presbyteries to appoint representatives to work with NCMM.

After extensive review of existing curricula, it was determined that the development of such material would be a valuable asset to EPC congregations and a worthwhile undertaking. A great challenge for the church in every age is to pass on the life changing message of the gospel of Jesus in a way that is both powerful and meaningful to the next generation. Teens and young adults must be nurtured in their understanding of the great truths of the Christian faith. This curriculum is offered as one possible part in the process of accomplishing that vital goal. The standing committee believed the Curriculum to be an excellent tool but that Journal

Grounds: Any recommended changes, corrections or improvements can be made at future date, if needed.

The PJC reviewed recommendations (#10, #12 and #18) to amend the Book of Order.

 - 5-1 It was noted that the added sentence beginning "Such cooperation..." for a mission church (G.16-16,E) seemed to be limiting and too narrow to be appropriate for the **Book of Order**.

PJC recommended that the sentence ought to be removed from the proposed change to the **Book of Order**. No issue was noted concerning the substitution of G.5-2A. It was noted that the proposed reference to a "temporary system of government" failed to emphasize that the ultimate authority for establishing new churches lay with the Presbytery (G.5-1 16-16.E). The new provisions 1, 1, and 3 should reference this understanding.

5-2B The proposed section, by deleting the reference to "the temporary governing body,"

gives the impression that a session will receive the new members. Chapter 9 reference only refers to Sessions. PIC recommended that the reference to "temporary governing body" be reinstated to the proposed change.

The above concerns were communicated to the standing National Outreach Committee by Elder Jim Rimmel and Elder Don Mason. The standing committee took action to address these concerns so that Recommendation 18 met constitutional and clarity standards.

That the Assembly adopt the provisional opinion of the Stated Clerk, that the Presbytery
of Mid-America acted constitutionally (G. 13-5) in receiving Rev. David Baer into its
membership (p. 293).

Mr. Dick Oestreicher, Director of <u>World Outreach</u>, opened with prayer and reviewed the work of World Outreach over the past year. Mr. Oestreicher thanked the Women's Ministries Committee for its Faith Focus work to raise the funds needed to bring missionaries home to be part of the 20th anniversary celebration. Missionaries present were recognized and introduced, with a brief word about their service and ministries.

Rev. Bill Meyer, Director of National Outreach, opened with prayer and reviewed the work of National Outreach. He introduced Rev. Glenn Ferrell, National Outreach's first home missionary, ministering in the Appalachian Mountains in Kentucky. He encouraged the Assembly to report back to their churches that this Assembly's theme was to seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness. If we are about the Lord's business, He will take care of everything clse.

 of Teaching and Ruling Elder are not used, 2) discrepancies between names listed as
 unexcused and the number listed as unexcused, 3) 47th stated meeting has no names of
 ruling elders present.
 - No record of disposition of Exceptions to Minutes from 19th General Assembly (Rules for Assembly, §8-11F)
 - 47.23: Ministerial Committee report is incomplete. No record of status prior to change of call, no terms of call summaries or forms.
 - Called meeting 8/28/99: Attendance does not contain excused or unexcused absences (Rules for Assembly 8-11.G.1)
 - Attachment 6 for the 48th stated meeting is missing from the certified copies. The Clerk is instructed to forward the attachment to the Office of the Stated Clerk no later than July 31, 2000.
 - 48.22: Insufficient information in minutes to determine if actions taken conform to
 constitutional standards: 1) status of Dr. Overton prior to being "reestablished" is not
 indicated; 2) no record present of actions to dissolve pastoral relationship of Christ EPC
 and Rev. Petterson; 3) no basis cited for moving Rev. Roberts to inactive roll; 4) no
 record present of actions taken to dismiss Rev. Roberts as Assistant Pastor; 5) no record
 that Allan Thompson is ordained; 6) no record of actions taken to dissolve pastoral
 relationship of Rev. Werner and Marshall EPC.
 - Signatures are missing from copies of certified minutes submitted for review (minutes
 of stated meetings and commission reports). The Clerk is instructed to submit copies
 of completed signature pages to the Office of the Stated Clerk by July 31, 2000.
 - 48: Attachment 9 (second page, section E): Administrative Commission acted unconstitutionally to restrict whom a congregation could elect as its own officers, thereby violating the rights of Crossroads Community Church held in perpetuity (G.17-5; 7-2). This action is remanded to Presbytery for correction.
 - 49.19: No terms of call form included for Ron Horgan or Frank Varro.
 - 49 (attachment 7) Terms of call for W.T. Permenter are out of order. A call as pastor
 has no definite period of time. There is no provision for 2 weeks of study leave.

 - Responses to exceptions in a letter from the Clerk (spreading information in the October 2, 1999 minutes) have not been fulfilled. Presbytery of the East is directed to include the required information in the minutes of the Fall 2000 meeting.
 - Appendices referred to in minutes of the 56th stated meeting are not included in the
 certified copies. Clerk is instructed to forward these Appendices to the Office of the
 Stated Clerk by July 31, 2000.
- Recommendation #41: That the minutes of the <u>Presbytery of Florida</u> be approved with the following exceptions:
 - 27:16 Presbytery has no constitutional authority to divest Richard Adelman without censure without using disciplinary procedures in the Book of Discipline.
 - Record of the 28th stated meeting appears to be inaccurate. Provisional Minutes of the 28th stated meeting have significant differences from the certified copies, yet there is no record of corrections at the 29th stated meeting.
 - 28:14 Ministerial Committee report is missing in the certified minutes. Presbytery
 is directed to correct the minutes and forward corrections to the Office of the Stated
 Clerk immediately following their Fall 2000 meeting.
 - 28:15 Judicial Committee report is missing in the certified minutes. Presbytery is directed to correct the minutes and forward corrections to the Office of the Stated Clerk immediately following their Fall 2000 meeting
 - Session Review Committee report is missing, including admonishment of Dan Lacich.
 Presbytery is directed to correct the minutes and forward corrections to the Office of the Stated Clerk immediately following their Fall 2000 meeting.
 - 28:14 The Presbytery appears to have ordained Jonathan Tagg improperly, without having official terms of call forms in hand (Acts of the Assembly §98-03).
 - General: Permanent record lacks signatures.
 - 29:14 Presbytery has no constitutional authority to divest Michael Eubanks of
 office without censure. Presbytery took action based on a misstatement of fact: "The
 EPC does not transfer to non-reformed denominations." There is no such constitutional
 prohibition. Neither is there a constitutional provision for a de facto renunciation of
 jurisdiction. This matter is referred to the Presbytery of Florida for reconsideration.

 - 25.21: A ruling elder was assigned as advisor for candidates. Book of Government requires a teaching elder (G.12-2.D).
 - 26.16: Required forms for minutes of commission to ordain/install have not been used (Acts of the Assembly §98-03).
 - 26.16.01: Required forms for minutes of commission to ordain/install have not been used (Acts of the Assembly §90-03).
 - 26.16.03: No call or terms of call form for Charles Plant were approved by Presbytery.
 - 26.16.05: Minutes do not indicate that proper steps for receiving a church from another body or independence have been followed: installation of pastor, election or recognition of officers, reception of members (G.5-4).
 - 26.16.07: Minutes do not indicate that membership of Greentree Community Church was received according to G.5-3.B.
 - 26.16.12: Minutes do not contain required out of bounds call forms (Acts of Assembly §98-03).
 - 26.16.14: Presbytery acted unconstitutionally to set aside the term limit requirement
 of officers. It is the right of the congregation, not the presbytery to determine if it
 has lifetime officers or to have limited terms (G.15-6). The issue is remanded to the
 Presbytery of Mid-America for correction.
- Recommendation #43: That the minutes of the <u>Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic</u> be approved with the following exceptions:
 - 32.02: Forest Hill is authorized to have 8 ruling elder commissioners but 10 are registered.
 - 32.27: The pension for Robert Buchanan is below the 10% minimum requirement.
 - 32.27 M: Required out of bounds call form is omitted for Doug Murphy (Acts of the Assembly §98-03).

 - P. 284: No indication that the required 10-day notice was given for a called meeting.
 - 83-8 A: Commission reports are missing.
 - 83-11: No advisor appointed for Tim Brown.
 - 83-13: Call and terms of call for Jamie Cupschalk was approved, but no record of his
 prior status, no record that he was examined and approved for ordination.
 - 83-13: Call and terms of call for Craig VanBiber was approved, but no record of his
 prior status, no indication that he was examined and no record of signing the Ministerial Obligation.
 - 85-12: (Note: this should be numbered 84-12.) No out of bounds call or terms of call form included for Kurt Gebhard.
 - 85-12: (Note: this should be numbered 84-12.) No record of previous status of David Hicks or dissolution of his call.
 - 85-12: (Note: this should be numbered 84-12.) No terms of call summary or forms included in minutes for missionaries Stephen Kelley, Jim Killgore, Tim Mindling and David Walker.
- 12. Recommendation #45: That the minutes of the <u>Presbytery of the Southeast</u> be approved with the following exceptions:

 - Cooperate with The Session of a particular church in

Mission churches and their members shall have the right of judicial process to the court having oversight of their temporary governing body. It is the further intention of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church that mission churches enjoy the same status as particular churches in relationship to civil government.

C. Minutes

The temporary governing body of the mission church shall record and submit its minutes to the Presbytery Review Committee in the same manner as a particular church. Grounds: Experience in planting churches has shown that this section of the Book of Government needs greater clarity. The proposed substitution clarifies the nature of cooperation expected between Sessions and Presbyteries and the different means by which mission churches are governed. The substitution also clarifies the necessity and means by which membership rolls in mission churches are kept.

 Recommendation #19 "That the National Outreach Master Plan be amended by adding the following:

"The standing committee recommends acceptance of Recommendation #19 by the General Assembly with the following changes:

Following "Strategic Area #5 Home Missions," <u>replace</u> the word "To" with the following words: "In partnership, cooperation with, and/or at the request of Presbytery, we will" (enable etc.)

"Strategic Area #5 HOME MISSIONS: To enable workers to present the love of Christ to English-speaking people groups in the USA, unreached by the established church.

Objectives:

- To identify unreached English-speaking people groups in the USA needing Christ's love:
- 2. To find and nurture qualified missionaries who will live with these groups;
- 3. To assist these workers in securing funds for their ministries:
- To work toward establishing churches among these people groups, or if not possible, to link them with existing churches."

Grounds: Many people within the United States are unserved (or underserved) by the established church, e.g., Native Americans, migrant workers, rural and urban poor, handicapped individuals, families of recent immigrants, homeless people, substance abusers, prison and jail inmates and their families. This will enable NOC to call Home Missionaries to minister to these people and to enable these Home Missionaries to raise necessary support from our congregations.

3. Recommendation #20

That "In response to the 19th General Assembly's instruction to the National Outreach Committee "to propose a plan for funding church planting," that the following Plan for Funding Church Planting be approved:

- A 3-year campaign to raise \$750,000 will be started January 1, 2001.
- 2. Contributions to the Fund will be sought from presbyteries, churches and individuals.
- 3. The Fund will be used as follows:
 - > Two-thirds for church/presbytery/NOC partner projects;
 - One-third for NOC-initiated projects.
- 4. Church planters of NOC-approved projects will be required to raise 50% of their

compensation package for a period of three years. (Part of this may be accomplished by being a bi-vocational church planter.)

Grounds: The \$750,000 is approximately double what has been received through the Church Planting and Key City Benevolence Askings. The Committee believes that with a broad-based campaign that encourages grass roots church planting as well as NOC initiated plants, the church-at-large will respond. Furthermore, when church planters participate in the fundraising effort, several things will occur:

- > They become more fiscally aware;
- Supporting churches identify more closely with people,
- The planter's commitment and aggressiveness is demonstrated.

The standing committee approved the minutes of the permanent National Outreach Committee with minor notations and refers them back to the permanent committee.

The Committee wishes to commend the permanent National Outreach Committee for the quality of their minutes and their hard work this past year.

The initial amount of the vehicle will be held in escrow until the actual purchase of the vehicle. Twenty percent of the cost of the replacement vehicle will be put into the annual terms of call and set aside for future purchase. Vehicle registration and insurance will be in the name of the missionary and operational costs will be assumed by the missionary.

Proposed wording

400.10 Vehicles

World Outreach includes a standard vehicle in the terms of call for career missionaries serving and residing overseas. The assets for such vehicles are for use on the field as well as during Home Service. The initial vehicle will be included in outgoing costs of \$14,000 \$18,000, or an amount approved by the World Outreach Director. The initial amount of the vehicle will be held in escrow until the actual purchase of the vehicle. Twenty percent of the cost of the replacement vehicle will be put into the annual terms of call and set aside for future purchase. Vehicle registration and insurance will be in the name of the missionary and operational costs will be assumed by the missionary.

Grounds: The \$14,000 allowance was established in January, 1995. This increase adjusts for vehicle price increases in the intervening years. The monthly vehicle escrow amount would increase from \$233 to \$300.

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 That Recommendation #30 "that the World Outreach Missions Manual be amended by adding a section 304.5 Extended Home Service" as presented.

Grounds: At present, World Outreach has no clear statement about the length of home service or how it might be extended before a missionary is placed on leave of absence. This policy would require the missionary to request the extension of home service, indicating a reason for the request. The WOC would then act on that request. This is in line with other missions agency policies.

- Approved the formation of a 5-member Search Committee for a Women's Ministries Director.

- Authorized Finance Committee to continue policy of securing regular insurance audit.
- Approved continued administration of Lenten Offering by Stated Clerk's Office.
- Approved frequent review (at least quarterly) of Knox, Medical Benevolence, Ministerial Endowment and Church Loan Funds by the Financial Manager, Stated Clerk and Finance Committee Chairman.
- Granted National Outreach Committee permission to host a church planter's supper at the 20th General Assembly.
- Approved procedure whereby any proposed short term mission trips must first be evaluated and endorsed by the appropriate outreach committee.
- Approved the Advertising Policy for Reflections magazine and acknowledged the high quality and excellence achieved by the magazine.

- Received the report of the Women's Ministries Committee naming Dr. Florence Littauer as speaker for the 2000 Women's Luncheon and the designation of Faith Focus 2000 funds to provide five youth camps for the young people of Kazakhstan.
- Approved the speaker for Summer Jam 2000, the 2001 student mission trips to Argentina and SYAM's distribution of a Youth Membership Curriculum to the churches.
- Approved designation of newly elected Stated Clerk as denominational representative for 2000-2001 to the National Association of Evangelicals.
- Invited the St. Andrews Presbytery to propose an Argentina Relief Fund as part of the General Assembly benevolence askings.
- Conceptually endorsed the 2001 Strategic Plan and requests that the General
 Assembly receive the report as information at this time.
- Received the report from the Theology Committee addressing the matter of officer training and charged the Clerk and Moderator to draft a letter on the subject of officer training for eventual distribution to the churches.
- Approved designation of Moderator's Communion Offering to the Moderator's Scholarship Fund, a fund which assists pastors from smaller churches in financial need to attend General Assembly.
- Approved honoraria for General Assembly keynoters and pre-assembly workshop speaker.
- Approved invitation to Clive Calver, President of World Relief, to be keynote speaker for the 21st (2001) General Assembly.
- Approved the 2000-2002 calendar for permanent committees.

Recommendations:

- That the Proposed 2001 Administration Budget of \$1,094,000 be approved.
- That the 2000 Administration Budget be adjusted to incorporate

Vision 21 is the fulfillment of a mandate given the Committee on Administration by the General Assembly. That mandate recognized the need for "a strategic plan to set the vision, goals, and programs for the next several years."

In its wisdom, the Committee on Administration created the 2001 Committee, Bill Johns and Virginia Patterson have provided stellar leadership for the task group which has labored over three years.

The Committee on Administration now forwards Vision 21 to the larger church, and specifically to the 20th General Assembly. The Assembly as a family of churches will be asked to reflect on the vision for the years ahead. The 21st Assembly, hopefully, will initiate implementation.

Your Moderator and Stated Clerk commend this work to your most serious consideration, being mindful that "without vision, the people perish!"

Attached is the final report of the 2001 Committee for your reflection and thought.

The mandate of the 14th General Assembly stated:

"that the Assembly instruct the permanent Committee on Administration to develop a strategic plan to set forth the vision, goals and programs of the General Assembly for the next several years. This plan should include goals, programs, activities and priorities for the life of the plan. The proposed plan should be distributed to the presbytery level for information prior to the General Assembly."

Accordingly, during 1996, the Committee on Administration put into motion this mandate to wit: A committee known as the 2001 Committee was formed to accomplish the '94 mandate. The committee, chaired by Bill Johns, was to be no larger than seven members. The following names were appointed: Wally Hostetter, Sam Jones, Carl Hassel, Virginia Patterson, Jerry Brundle and Joe Schluchter who subsequently resigned from the committee due to time constraints. The Stated Clerk, Ed Davis, resourced the committee.

As you will see from the following report, the Committee has met often and discussions have covered a wide range of topics, ideas and proposals. We would like for you to realize that the proposals attached are a distillation of many, many hours of discussion. To have included proposals reflecting the full scope of our meetings would have produced an unwieldy and unrealistic package that would have been difficult if not impossible for the Assembly to consider, given the time available.

The 2001 Committee, with great respect and admiration, recognizes the major contribution of our mentor and friend, Ed Davis, ex-officio member of the committee, for his historical and spiritual insights that proved to be of great value in our study and work.

We are grateful for the very significant educational and spiritual experience this work has provided each of us on the Committee and our prayer is that the Assembly will enthusiastically receive our work and commit this denomination to a vigorous plan of action for the glory of God.

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INTRODUCTION TO REPORT

This introduction summarizes what is included in each of the sections that will follow.

Planning Process

This section summarizes the process we followed to complete this strategic plan, including specialists, focus, underlying assumptions, and our motivation to serve the entire church.

Key Assumptions

There were many assumptions which directed our study, some were known and expressed, and others were not recognized during the course of our work. The eight key assumptions that had the greatest impact on the direction of our study and the conclusions are stated in this section.

Who We Are

One of the primary tasks in a strategic planning effort is to determine the organizational identity, or what the organization wants to become. This section of the report contains the description of our self-identification. It consists of four parts: (1) Identity, who we say we are; (2) Mission, what we exist to accomplish; (3) Vision, what we would like to become and accomplish; and (4) Core Values, those values which define the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

Where We Are Going

The heart of the strategic plan describes what the Evangelical Presbyterian Church should do, how to do it, and when it will be done. In this plan we identify goals (what the EPC should do), objectives (those quantifiable and measurable targets against which progress can be measured), and strategies (the specific steps to be taken to accomplish the objectives and goals).

PLANNING PROCESS

Overview

The development of this strategic plan involved considerable effort on the part of the committee, the Stated Clerk, the staff of the Office of the General Assembly, and other resources. The committee of six, plus the Stated Clerk, met on a regular basis for more than three and one-half years. All meetings began with devotions and prayer. We were acutely aware of our responsibility, and our very limited abilities to accomplish what was expected of us. Nevertheless, we believe our efforts were both guided and blessed by the Holy Spirit.

Resource Specialists

Because of the importance of this work to the future of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, we sought the best thinking and experience to assist us. Lyle Schaller, an internationally recognized expert on church growth and church strategy with other denominations. spent considerable time with the committee. He brought his experience to our discussions. His knowledge of the state of the church in today's changing world, and how the various denominations are seeking to cope with that change, was invaluable to us. In addition to Dr. Schaller, we benefited from the experiences of Rev. Leonard

Hoffman, General Secretary Emeritus of the Christian Reformed Church, and Dr. Charles Dunahoo, Coordinator of Christian Education and Publications of the Presbyterian Church in America.

The Stated Clerk, Edward Davis, provided considerable time, insight, and experience. We also had discussions with the directors of National Outreach, World Outreach, Women's Ministries, Single and Young Adult Ministries. In addition, we met with the chairman of the Task Force on Personnel and with the Office Location Sub-committee.

Focus

The focus was on the history of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church within the Church of Jesus Christ, its distinctives, and what we believe those distinctives should be in the future. Focusing on those things which make the EPC both similar and dissimilar to other denominations helped to identify and assess current issues in the larger church that may provide opportunities or obstacles to growth and unity in the years ahead.

Underlying Assumptions

There were a number of underlying assumptions that were made in conducting this work, most of which are reported elsewhere in this document. There are, however, two assumptions that have uniquely underscored our work from its inception. They are stated here because they set a tone for everything we have done. They are:

- A primary role of the Office of the General Assembly will increasingly be to resource presbyteries and congregations.
- The EPC motto, "In Essentials, Unity; in Non-Essentials, Liberty; In All Things, Charity," continues to reflect the value placed on the unity of our family of churches, while enjoying diversity in the nonessential areas of theology and ecclesiology, all sustained and balanced by our love for the Lord and for one another.

Motivation

Our motivation was to serve the entire denomination and all of its parts. It is our hope and prayer that this work, in its entirety, will provide a basis for planning, action, and ministry that will maximize the growth and ministry of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and the proclamation of the gospel around the world.

KEY ASSUMPTIONS

The Evangelical Presbyterian Church:

- Is unique within the family of Presbyterian and Reformed churches, and therefore has a purpose in remaining independent from other denominations.
- Is a family of churches, defined by shared core values, and bonded by the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.
- Having a Presbyterian form
 of government, is an organization, interdependent in its
 parts and mutually accountable. It is, therefore, not an
 association, movement, or a
 network. The three organizational entities congregations,
 presbyteries, and General
 Assembly are mutually
 accountable.
- Believes the middle governing body, the presbytery, is essential to historical Presbyterianism, but presbyteries need to become increasingly effective, relevant, and helpful in the life and mission of the church.

- Is committed to the unchanging truth of God's Word. We will seek to be relevant to the culture in our presentation of the gospel and in our worship, and we will share the gospel of Christ in its historic truth with faithfulness, clarity, and love.
- Is a confessional church, utilizing the Westminster Standards to describe the system of doctrine taught in Scripture.
- Is committed to extending the gospel of Christ in and around the world, requiring a growing number of churches, growing congregations, and greater outreach.
- Is committed to church planting and church revitalization as a mandate which belongs to all its parts without reservation.

WHO WE ARE

Identity

The Evangelical Presbyterian Church is a family of churches, essentially Reformed and Presbyterian, defined by shared core values and bonded by the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

Mission

To be a people of God living and proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ so that lives and cultures are transformed.

"But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light." (I Peter 2:9)

Vision

We envision a family of 350 churches, by 2010, whose 120,000 members comprise Evangelical Presbyterian congregations in 40 states, and who are faithfully proclaiming the Gospel in accordance with Reformed distinctiveness.

Core Values

The following core values have been prayerfully selected from among many acceptable values as those which best represent what the Evangelical Presbyterian Church values as being essential to its existence. These values are listed in alphabetical order as each is equally valuable to the life of our church.

The Evangelical Presbyterian Church values:

- Biblical Authority Biblical authority as the final authority.
- Confessional/Theological A confessional system of belief that is consistent with the theological positions of the Reformed faith and true to the historical tenets of the Christian faith.
- Educated Leadership A biblically educated leadership among all believers in our family of churches.
- Evangelism/Missions Evangelism as our mission locally, nationally, and internationally.
- Family/Community Our family of churches as best expressing the community of faith intrinsic to the Body of Christ.
- Growth/Church Planting A growing church, spiritually and numerically, which is accomplished through church planting and congregational development.
- Prayer Prayer as the expression of our life in the Spirit and as our primary act of dependence upon God.
- Presbyterian in Government The Presbyterian form of government as the means of governance given our church through which the call of God is best accomplished.

WHERE WE ARE GOING

TARGET CATEGORIES

A chievement of the following goals within these target categories will be some measure of the progress toward fulfilling the mission and vision of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

- Increase church membership/ attendance by 5% annually.
 - Challenge each congregation to encourage membership and provide appropriate instruction.
 - Encourage each congregation to provide an assimilation process whereby they introduce the distinctives of the particular church family and the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.
 - Challenge each congregation to aggressively reach out to the unchurched.

Leadership Development

Goal:

To train, mobilize, and nurture the human resources God has given the family for the growth and maturity of the church.





STATED CLERK POSITION DESCRIPTION

I. Position Title: Stated Clerk of the General Assembly

II. Date: January 1, 2001

III. Position Summary:

The Stated Clerk is responsible before God for the work of the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. The Stated Clerk is chief administrative officer of the Office of the General Assembly.

IV. Term:

The Stated Clerk shall be elected by the General Assembly to serve for a definite period as constitutionally defined by the court.

V. Duties:

- A. The general duties and responsibilities of the Stated Clerk are set forth in the Book of Order and Rules for Assembly.
- B. The Stated Clerk shall be responsible for interpreting all constitution-al matters not specifically referred to a General Assembly committee, in which case the General Assembly, by its response to a committee report, will be the final interpreting authority.
- C. The Stated Clerk shall record all Assembly transactions and preserve these records carefully, and in addition, grant extracts from them whenever properly required. Such extracts shall be evidence to any ecclesiastical court, and to every part of the church.
- D. All notices required by civil and ecclesiastical law shall be prepared and forwarded by the Stated Clerk, who shall also take general charge of the corporate books and records.
- E. The Stated Clerk shall sign such instruments as may be required and perform duties as may be assigned by the Committee on administration or members of the corporation in General Assembly. The Stated Clerk shall assist the Moderator in the fulfillment of his office.
- F. The Stated Clerk shall be responsible for the oversight of the Financial Manager who is the custodian of the funds and securities belonging to the Corporation. The Stated Clerk shall oversee the receipts deposits and disbursement of such funds by the Financial Manager as directed by the General Assembly. The Stated Clerk shall oversee the accurate accounting of the finances of the

Corporation by the Financial Manager.

- G. The Stated Clerk shall resource the work of each permanent committee in keeping with those tasks assigned to it by the General Assembly. Each committee that has its own staff executive shall be resourced by that executive. The Stated Clerk is responsible for coordinating the utilization and distribution of the resources of the Corporation.
- H. The Stated Clerk shall be available as need warrants to represent the denomination to the general public and to the churches. Responsibility for official denominational correspondence with all fraternal persons and bodies shall be that of the Stated Clerk.

VI. Organizational Relationships:

- A. <u>Responsible to</u>: The Stated Clerk is responsible to the General Assembly through immediate accountability to the Committee on Administration.
- B. <u>Responsible for</u>: The Stated Clerk is responsible for all professional and clerical staff persons assigned to the Office of the General Assembly, and to coordinate the work of all.
- C. The Stated Clerk is responsible, through various committees and individuals for planning of goals and activities designed to carry out the mission of the denomination and achieve the results anticipated by the vision statement of the General Assembly.

VII. Evaluation:

The personnel committee of the Committee on Administration shall serve as an evaluation committee for the annual evaluation of the Stated Clerk, and review with the Stated Clerk the evaluation of the General Assembly staff. Committee will report annually to the Administration Committee.

The Evaluation Committee shall be enlarged every third year by two persons for that year only, coinciding with the year of the election of the Stated Clerk. This committee shall provide the Committee on Administration a comprehensive evaluation of the Stated Clerk. The Committee on Administration shall provide this evaluation and a nomination to the General Assembly.

DIRECTOR OF CONGREGATIONAL MINISTRIES POSITION DESCRIPTION

I. Position Title: Director of Congregational Ministries

II. Date: To be determined

III. Position Summary:

The Director of Congregational Ministries is responsible for the planning, administration, and execution of all activities related to the General Assembly's role in supporting and resourcing the ministries of the congregations of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church in order that they might more effectively accomplish their programmatic missions. The division, which the Director of Congregational Ministries oversees, is one of support, service, and assistance, not one of compliance or regulation.

IV. Term:

The Director of Congregational Ministries shall serve a three-year term which is renewable. The Director will receive an annual performance review and a corresponding annual compensation review.

V. Duties:

- Recruit, train, and supervise personnel within the Division of Congregational Ministries (DCM).
- B. Oversee the preparation of the annual DCM budget, in compliance with direction from the Stated Clerk and the COA, and ensure fiscal accountability of the Division.
- C. Develop a strategic plan and a vision for the programs and ministries of DCM, consistent with the core values, plans, directions, and resources of the GA.
- D. Develop and provide services to the congregations of the EPC that have real value to those congregations, and which serve to strengthen the family relationships.
- E. To develop a vision for educational ministries in the EPC, as well as a strategy to implement that vision, in all the congregations who choose to adopt that vision.
- F. Resource EPC congregations in their various areas of ministry: children, youth, women's and men's ministries, special ministries, and leadership training.

- G. To evaluate educational and other resources, and to make these evaluations and resources available to the congregations.
- H. Design, prepare, and conduct leadership training and other seminars.
- Relate to EPC publications that are directed to the congregations.
- J. Communicate the purposes and capabilities of the DCM to the congregations of the EPC
- K. Participate with the church at large and other reformed bodies in the areas of Christian education and congregational ministries, including attendance at national conferences, conventions, and seminars.
- Develop a resource library, both physical and on-line, for the benefit of congregations.
- M. Make use of the latest computer and network technology to deliver resources and assistance to congregations at the lowest possible cost.
- N. Fulfill a collegial leadership role at the OGA in conjunction with the directors of the other divisions and with the Stated Clerk.
- Participate on various committees and task forces, as requested by and/or approved by the Stated Clerk.

VI. Organizational Relationships:

- A. <u>Responsible to</u>: The Director of Congregational Ministries is responsible to the Committee on Administration through immediate accountability to the Stated Clerk.
- B. <u>Responsible for</u>: The Director of Congregational Ministries is responsible for all professional and clerical personnel within the CMD, including the Director of Women's Ministries and the Director of Student and Young Adult Ministries.
- C. <u>Coordinates with</u>: The Director of Congregational Ministries coordinates with the directors of all other divisions, and with any other ministries, bodies or persons as directed by the Stated Clerk.

DIRECTOR OF STEWARDSHIP

I. Position Title: Director of Stewardship

II. Date: To Be Determined

III. Position Summary:

The Director of Stewardship is responsible for developing a comprehensive stewardship/fundraising program for the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. This responsibility includes establishing goals, objectives, and implementation activities for helping to accomplish the funding goals approved by the General Assembly.

IV. Term:

The Director of Stewardship shall serve a three-year term, which is renewable. The Director will receive an annual performance review and a corresponding annual compensation review.

V. Duties:

- Develop a long-range plan for effective functioning of a comprehensive stewardship/fundraising program, including annual contributions and deferred giving.
- Keep up with trends in the fundraising field and be knowledgeable of laws applicable to charitable giving.
- Oversee the preparation of an annual budget, in compliance with direction from the COA and the Stated Clerk, and ensure fiscal accountability.
- 4. Recruit, train, and supervise any support staff assigned.
- Identify and evaluate donor prospects-individuals, corporations, foundations.
- Cultivate donors.
- Develop an educational program for EPC members that enables them to plan through insurance, securities, and other assets to aid them and the denomination with future resources.
- Promote the biblical concept of stewardship among sessions and presbyteries as a means of providing the necessary resources for the expansion of the work of the church.

- Be available to sessions and presbyteries in communicating stewardship and planned giving opportunities.
- Oversee gift processing.
- Produce timely reports of gifts, donations, and statistical data as requested by the Stated Clerk and Finance Committee.
- Participate on various committees and task forces, as requested by and/or approved by the Stated Clerk.
- Fulfill a collegial leadership role at the OGA in conjunction with other staff, directors of other divisions, and the Stated Clerk.

VI. Organizational Relationships:

- Responsible to:
 The Director of Stewardship is responsible to the Committee on Administration through the Stated Clerk.
- Responsible for: Any assigned support staff.
- Coordinates with:
 Directors and staff of other divisions and any other ministries, bodies or persons as directed by the Stated Clerk.

NATIONAL OUTREACH MASTER PLAN

Mission:

To labor with God to build a multiplying movement of growing churches. (Psalm 127:1)

Our mission can only be carried out by God's supernatural power as we express our dependence on Him through prayer and His Word.

Key Strategic Area #1

Church Planting

To equip and empower people to plant churches and effectively fulfill the Great Commission.

Strategic objectives:

- To develop pastors with a Reformed commitment and the giftedness to plant churches.
- To see that all church planting candidates are qualified through an effective church planting assessment center.
- To be a resource to presbyteries in the church planting process.
- To plant vibrant churches that will reproduce themselves.

Key Strategic Area #2

Church Vitality

To provide presbyteries and congregations the necessary resources to positively impact church vitality.

Strategic objectives:

- To identify EPC churches which are most likely to benefit from a church vitality process.
- To resource churches, in consultation with presbyteries, in developing a master plan that identifies mission, vision, goals and objectives.
- To identify appropriate resources and materials that will aid churches in enhancing vitality.

Key Strategic Area #3

Evangelism

To equip and encourage churches to effectively reach their communities with the Gospel.

Strategic objectives:

- To understand how God is at work in the United States.
- To equip the church with a Reformed understanding of evangelism as key to successful proclamation of the Gospel.

To provide our churches with effective resources that will allow them to share their faith with the lost.

Key Strategic Area #4

Urban Ministry

To transform urban centers by establishing churches and aiding existing urban ministries to impact their communities for Christ.

Strategic objectives:

- To aid and assist existing urban ministries in whatever way possible.
- To establish churches and ministries in urban centers in consultation with the presbyteries.
- Develop and promote opportunities for racial reconciliation.

WORLD OUTREACH MASTER PLAN

MISSION STATEMENT

The global mission of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church is to establish the Church of Jesus Christ in those cultures and people groups where opportunity and our ability to respond intersect.

VALUES

- The Foundation of World Outreach is the written Word of God, the Westminster Confession and the Book of Order of the EPC.
- We are committed to establish and develop indigenous reformed churches in each people group within its policy areas of the world.
- We are committed to evangelism in both word and deed that results in church planting and eventual presbytery formation.
- We are committed to encouraging the spiritual maturity of indigenous leadership and to affirm those means essential to such development.
- We are building a partnership shaped from the collective support and giftedness of our members under the headship of Christ.
- We are committed to mobilizing every member as the spiritual key to fulfilling our mission.

- We are committed to partnering with other like-minded churches and organizations to demonstrate the unity of the Body of Christ.
- We are committed to administering the resources entrusted to us in an efficient and effective manner with full accountability.
- We are committed to being sensitive and responsive to the Holy Spirit's work throughout the world.
- We are committed to pray for worldwide evangelization.
- We will be faithful in proclaiming the Gospel to the nations until the Lord returns.

STRATEGIC PLANNING

World Outreach is committed to develop its mission program with clear intention. We shall focus our mission on the Muslim World, Latin America, countries of Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union, and North American ethnic and urban ministry.

GOAL STATEMENTS

. MISSION MINISTRIES:

A. Muslim World

Goal: To establish a Christian presence in Muslim cultures and where possible to plant churches.

Objectives: 1998

- Identify a Muslim field and establish a partnership agreement with an approved sending agency.
- Utilize Arab World Ministries and Frontiers as our main cooperative agencies for EPC work in the Muslim world.

Objective: 2001

 To deploy 10 EPC missionaries to the Muslim field.

B. Argentina

<u>Goal</u>: To establish an indigenous Presbyterian Church in Argentina, in consultation with the St. Andrews Presbytery in Buenos Aires.

Objectives: 1998

- Identify and prioritize those areas in Argentina most appropriate for establishing at least two additional presbyteries.
- Identify and help equip Argentine church planting personnel to work in the above areas.

- Identify, train and send at least one missionary churchplanting team.
- C. Eastern Europe/The Former Soviet Union (CIS Nations)

<u>Goal</u>: To develop ways to proclaim the gospel, plant churches, and help build God's kingdom in the region.

Objectives: 1998:

- To complete the team in Kazakhstan.
- To identify an ordained church planter for Tyumen, Siberia.
- To identify like-minded seminaries or institutes for indigenous leadership training.

Objectives: 2001

- To plant three churches in Almaty, Kazakhstan.
- To plant one church in Tyumen, Siberia.

D. North American Ethnic and Urban Ministry

Goal: To initiate ministry and to plant and develop churches in local ethnic and urban communities in partnership with EPC churches and/or presbyteries.

Objective: 1998

To support and assist
 Military Avenue Church in
 inner city Detroit and to use

- this experience as a model for other urban areas.
- To cooperate with EPC churches that desire to work together in ethnic or urban ministries.
- To support with funds and short-term personnel the Appalachian Project in Kentucky, directed to evangelizing rural families.

Objective: 2001

To identify one urban ministry where a cluster of EPC churches are led to cooperate in fulfilling an ethnic or urban project.

E. Bi-Vocational Opportunities

Goal: To send spiritually gifted men and women to serve in restricted access nations, with primary purposes for evangelism, discipleship and church development within the context of business and professional assignments.

Objectives: 1998

- To work with an approved agency to facilitate bivocational work in China.
- WO will assist EPC churches to plan short-term bivocational mission in China.

F. Relief and Development

<u>Goal</u>: To minister in deed and word through emergency relief, especially in areas where EPC missionaries are serving.

Objective: 2001

To annually solicit our churches for a relief or development project.

II. MISSION PARTNER-SHIPS

<u>Goal</u>: To develop partnerships with other evangelical Presbyterian denominations and reformed churches in North America and abroad, and with other compatible agencies.

A. Brazil

Objectives: 1998

- To explore partnership with the IPB (Brazil) in consultation with St. Andrews Presbytery toward fulfilling the goal of establishing an indigenous Presbyterian Church in Argentina.
- To restudy the Articles of Agreement (EPC/IPB) as to the most helpful relationship in ministry for both churches in the 21st Century.

Objective: 2001

To complete Phase I of faculty development of the Andrew Jumper Graduate Center as a key to leadership development in the IPB (Brazil) and throughout Latin America.

B. China Seminary Project

Objective: 2001

To promote and support EPC's commitment to the China

Seminary Project that results in training pastors.

C. EPC Pastoral Network

Objective: 1998

To develop a network of EPC pastoral leadership that encourages dialogue with World Outreach regarding participation in EPC's missions goals and the local churches' vision for missions.

D. WFRC Partnership

Objective: 1998

Become a member of the World Fellowship of Reformed Churches to enhance EPC's work in Latin America.

III. MISSION RESOURCES

A. Missions Education

Goal: To encourage and promote a mission vision for EPC, World Outreach shall nurture mission consciousness and excellence in EPC churches and presbyteries.

Objectives: 1998

- WO will convene an annual missions consultation to provide vision and training to the EPC church family.
- WO will be a resource to EPC churches in developing mission policies, training, and such information that will assist local churches in their missions programs.
- WO shall schedule an annual vision trip for EPC pastors and church members desir-

ing missions exposure and participation in areas of EPC work.

B. Mission Personnel Development

<u>Goal</u>: To assist individuals in churches and presbyteries to adequately prepare for crosscultural service and to provide pastoral care for those in mission service.

Objectives: 2001

- To send 101 missionaries into mission service in EPC teams or through approved cooperative agencies. Thirty-five of these missionaries will be in EPC teams whose ultimate goal is to plant reformed churches.
- To share a synopsis of the annual Uniform Missionary Evaluation with supporting churches.
- To establish a network of mentors for seminarians interested in mission service.
- To identify EPC pastors interested in forming a team to provide pastoral care to EPC foreign missionaries through field visitation on a regular basis.
- To encourage short-term missionary service (one or two years) working alongside WO missionaries.

(Note: The World Outreach Committee will bring recommendations to amend this Master Plan to the 20th General Assembly.)

BOARD OF PENSION AND BENEFITS REPORT

MEDICAL INSURANCE PLAN

The Board of Pension and Benefits has been very active this past year. As most of us are now fully aware, the premium cost of our medical insurance was increased by 49%. Several factors made this a necessity. The good news is that the problems which generated this change are now under control.

Over the past five years, there had been no increase in premiums for health insurance. In actuality, a decrease of 10% was granted two years ago but had to be recovered the following year. To decrease premium cost is virtually unheard of in the medical insurance field and costs of claims simply did not warrant such action.

During this period of time, the cost of claims rose from an average of \$1,792,454 annually for the years of 1995-98 to a claims cost of \$2,659,769 for 1999. This represents an increase of \$867,000. Without a premium

adjustment, the medical reserve funds decreased from approximately \$2,000,000 to \$830,000 with both decrease in principle and the interest income derived from such.

For the first four months of this year the Plan has recognized an excess of \$3,811 of income over total expenses. In projecting this out for the balance of this year we anticipate the Plan will experience a healthy balance.

Included in claims paid through April 30, 2000 of \$982,594.71 was \$299,940.80 in claims for services incurred prior to November 15, 1999. Most of these should have been paid in the prior Plan year. Accordingly, only \$682,649.91 should be considered in evaluating Plan performance for the year 2000.

Premium income reported for the first four months is \$1,141,266. This is based on an average of 559 participants. Assuming this number remains about the same, we can anticipate average income of \$285,000 per month, total Plan income for the year approximating \$3,421,000.

We estimate claims will average \$185,000 per month for the remainder of the year. This is well below the year to date experience of \$245,648 per month. This differential is attributable to the payment of sizable 1999 claims in this Plan year. Included in the projected claims is the cost savings being realized from your discount drug cards. We anticipate total claims paid in 2000 will be \$2.562.595.

It appears the increase in premium to Plan participants beginning January 1, 2000 of approximately 49% will reverse the trend of losses in the previous two years. This increase is more than justified given the trend in the industry.

The Board went three years without an increase in premium. The next year they gave a 10% decrease in premiums which was almost unheard of in the medical insurance field. The following year it was necessary to reinstate that 10%, but this still amounted to five years without an increase in premiums for the health insurance.

The Board has taken a number of steps to correct our position.

We have contracted a new third party administrator (TPA).

 We have negotiated for a new Stop Loss Insurance carrier, again at a savings as compared to our previous coverage.

3) You now have a Prescription Card which saves both you and the Plan a

significant amount of money.

 We have instituted an annual review process whereby the adequacy of our medical reserves shall be evaluated and unwise erosion of such fund precluded.

Other suggestions have been brought forward including (1) a change to a fully insured plan; (2) regionalization of the insurance coverage allowing each presbytery to provide for the medical insurance of their pastors and employees; (3) forcing complete compliance or participation in our plan, and (4) merely keeping the plan as is or decrease benefits. I would like to elaborate on these possibilities and update you on the efforts of your Board to try to provide the best medical insurance plan possible for our Church.

Fully Insured:

During the last six months, we have met with Blue Cross and Blue Shield representatives of Michigan. We found they could provide coverage for our church but only as long as a majority of our covered people were residents of Michigan. This almost definitely would require a change of carrier at some later date. We also found that their premiums had risen 48.7% in the last three years, and that their premium structure was considerably higher than ours when the benefits are the same as what we now have. On the positive side, the Blue Cross network would easily provide services to all of our people no matter where they live in this country.

Regionalization:

The <u>second</u> option could have some meaningful aspects when fully worked out. However, there may be definite drawbacks. Complete portability for our pastors is a concern. Ministers need to be able to move from presbytery to presbytery without any negative implications. If we regionalize our entire program into smaller units, if one person has a catastrophic illness or organ transplant, then fewer people would be paying premiums to cover the loss than if the entire church, nationally, were paying premiums to absorb the cost.

Compliance:

The next solution offered was to enforce participation by all pastors. This is a dilemma since there are so few ways to enforce this. One solution might be "bundling" all insurance and pension into one all-or-nothing package.

Status Quo:

The last possibility is keeping the program as it exists and to continue making those changes which will enhance the program. Decreasing benefits in our medical plan is not a preferred option. We have good people on the Board with a wide variety of experiences. All of us are open to helpful input from reliable sources.

With this intention in mind, the Board recommends the following recommendations:

 That the Medical Plan be amended to cover home health care services when provided within 7 days following discharge from a hospital and for a cause related to the cause of the hospital confinement.

Grounds: This provision is intended to limit unnecessary care. Most plan documents contain this provision and specify "within 7 days following hospital discharge." Home health care services should have provision similar to those for services rendered by a skilled nursing facility.

That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" any medical hospital surgical or loss of time benefits resulting from an automobile accident.

Grounds: If any coverage for auto accidents is offered, the Plan is the primary payer. The automobile insurance carrier should be the primary payer.

- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" conditions arising from or caused by illegal use of narcotics or use of hallucinogens in any forms.
- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" charges in connection with weekend hospital admissions unless deemed medically necessary or unless surgery is performed on the date of admission.
- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" charges made in connection with any surrogate parenting arrangement.
- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" charges for completing a claim form
- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" charges made for professional services of a resident physical or intern.
- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" charges made in connection with surgery rendered to accomplish sex reassignment (sex change) nor for complications arising out of such procedure.
- That the Medical Plan be amended to add to "Exclusions" services of supplies rendered during any period I which the covered employee or covered dependent is not under the continuing care of a physician.

Grounds: The exclusions above (Recommendations 3-10) clarify medical necessity, eliminate unjustified charges and are intended to limit Plan liability. They are common exclusions in group health plans.

 That the Medical Plan be amended to limit coverage of pregnancy expense to the employee or spouse. Grounds: Currently, dependent children of employees are covered the same as a spouse.

That the Medical Plan be amended to add under "Organ and issue transplants," coverage
of expenses attributed to a donor if the recipient is not a covered person.

Grounds: If a covered person volunteers to donate an organ to another person not covered by the EPC Plan, and the recipient's covered benefits do not provide donor coverage, the Plan should specify what, if any, benefits will be paid by the EPC Plan on behalf of the donor.

- That the Medical Plan be amended to include prescription coverage for Viagra, with a maximum of six pills per month reimbursed under the Plan.
- That the Medical Plan be amended to remove the exclusion for prescription coverage of birth control pills.

*The Board will, if necessary, announce this Fall any increases which may be forecast for 2001. Any such increases, if required, will be increases comparable with the industry.

PENSION PLAN

The EPC Pension Plan has made some significant changes this year, with additional opportunities for investment. There are a greater variety of funds available, including some foreign investment possibilities. For those interested, on-line investing is now an option. A representative from Fidelity will present an explanation of these programs at the Assembly and will have a booth in the display area to allow you to actually make some simulated on-line investments as well as answer any questions you may have concerning this program.

 The Board further recommends that its advisory letter (Communication 00-12, p. 27) on Social Security participation be adopted.

NOTE A - PLAN DESCRIPTION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES.

A general description of Evangelical Presbyterian Church Pension Plan (the Plan) and a summary of significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follows:

Basis of Presentation

The accounting records of the Plan are maintained primarily on the cash receipts and disbursements method of accounting whereby revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

NOTE A - PLAN DESCRIPTION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES.

A general description of Evangelical Presbyterian Church Medical Insurance Plan (the Plan) and a summary of significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follows.

Basis of Presentation

The accounting records of the Plan are maintained primarily on the cash receipts and disbursements method of accounting whereby revenue and the related assets are recognized when received rather than when earned, and expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

Eligibility

The Plan is available to any employees of member churches and their families, and clergy and their families of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

Premium Revenues

The plan is fully funded from premiums charged to the participants at rates determined by the Board of Directors. A portion of the premiums collected from the participants is remitted to an insurance company for coverage in excess of the amounts self-insured by the Plan.

NOTE B - TAX STATUS

The Plan is a tax-exempt organization as provided by Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(9).

Christian Education & Publications Committee Report

The Christian Education & Publications Committee met September 24-25, 1999 and March 10-11, 2000 at the General Assembly Offices in Livonia, Michigan. The committee also met by phone on March 23, 2000. Members of the committee are RE John Graham III (Southeast), Sandy Hazelwood (Central South), TE David Ruff (Mid-Atlantic), TE Bruce Spear, Chair (West), and TE David Todd (Central South). Elizabeth Hicks (Midwest) resigned from the committee in a letter to the March 10-11 meeting.

Staff members in attendance all or part of the time were Ed McCallum, Assistant to the Stated Clerk, Edward Davis, Stated Clerk, Lucy McGuire, Reflections Editor, and Marilyn Bartel, News Editor.

Reflections magazine under the innovative leadership of Editor Lucy McGuire opened new avenues of interaction with its readership in the fulfillment of its stated purpose, to encourage people in their devotion to Christ and His Kingdom and to foster an awareness of what God is doing in the EPC family. A website is being developed to further enhance interaction between the magazine and its readership. Marilyn Bartel continues to very capably serve the Reflections News Editor.

The CE&P approved the concept of advertising in *Reflections* magazine not only as a source of revenue but also as an enhancement of the magazine. An Advertising Policy was adopted as well as the job description for an Advertising Director (a volunteer position).

The CE&P has felt that Reflections magazine has been seriously underfunded and has requested budgetary increases in 2000 and 2001 as well as inclusion in the benevolence askings for 2000 and 2001. These increases will allow the magazine as the house organ of the EPC to stay abreast of the changing world of publishing technology as well as enhance its appeal to its current and future readership.

The CE&P has laid plans for a one-day **pre-assembly workshop** with a focus on Congregational Ministries, with Dr. Leith Anderson as keynote speaker. The CE&P is working with the Student and Young Adult Ministries Committees to develop break out sessions featuring instructive presentations on various aspects of a church's ministry to its entire congregation.

Overture 99-A endorsing the development of a training video for use in EPC churches was considered. The CE&P reviewed a promotional video from a sister denomination as well as making inquires into the cost of producing a similar instrument for the EPC, An attractive 10 minute video for use with new members and new church development would probably cost around \$30,000 to produce. The matter was referred to the COA for further guidance.

An EPC Small Group Network continues to grow under the leadership of CE&P committee member TE David Ruff. There will be a meeting of the ESGN at the 20th General

Assembly during the lunch hour on Thursday, June 22. An interactive ESGN website is being developed within the Forest Hill EPC website at minimal cost. This website will allow small group leaders around the denomination to exchange information and resources and enhance the development of a network of small group leaders in the EPC.

Plans for an EPC Children's Ministry Network continue as the CE&P gathers information about children's ministry directors in the EPC who would be willing to serve as resources to those beyond their own congregation.

The CE&P met with representatives of Christian Reformed Publications and developed a working agreement "to remit to the EPC 7% of all its fiscal year sales to EPC churches for the 1999-2000 fiscal year (7/99-6/00). Each fiscal year thereafter for the next three fiscal years, this percentage will increase by 1% per year." The CRC will be permitted to mail promotional materials to EPC churches. CRC Publications has also invited Kathy Brace of Knox Presbyterian Church (EPC) to serve as an EPC representative on their curriculum planning team.

The CE&P renewed the EPC's membership in the National Coalition of Men's Ministries for 2000 and recommends their leadership training conferences to all involved in men's ministry in the EPC.

Upon recommendation by the Standing Committee on CE&P at the 19th General Assembly, the CE&P has arranged for the Larger Catechism to be included in all future editions of the EPC *Book of Order*. The CE&P has also arranged for many of the non-copyrighted EPC forms and documents to be made available to the denomination in electronic form.

The CE&P approved John Sartelle's *Infant Baptism* to be recommended by the EPC General Assembly office along with its present recommendation of the late Francis Schaeffer's booket titled *Baptism*.

The CE&P elected TE David Ruff to serve as chair in the 2000-2001 term. The CE&P greatly appreciates the work of Ed McCallum as GA office resource to the committee.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- That 5 minutes be granted early in the docket of the 20th General Assembly for Reflections Editor Lucy McGuire to give a state of the magazine/web site address and encourage greater participation in and distribution of the magazine.
- That General Assembly endorse the Children's Catechism lessons of Children's Ministry, International in our churches.
- The CE&P requests 5 minutes of General Assembly docket time for Dr. Daniel Erickson, Executive Director of National Coalition of Men's Ministries to bring a report.
- That John Sartelle's Infant Baptism be endorsed by the General Assembly for use in the churches, alongside the late Francis Schaeffer's booklet titled Baptism, approved at a previous Assembly.

BETHANY CHRISTIAN SERVICES REPORT TO THE 20TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY EVANGELICAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Throughout His life on earth, Jesus proclaimed and lived the expectation of our heavenly father. His message was very clear:

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind and soul and love your neighbor as yourself."

What a challenge...to us as a church and to us as individual Christians. With His guidance and grace, we can achieve a small beginning. Bethany is privileged to be one vehicle through which the church as a unified body and as individual Christians can fulfill our commitment to exemplify that love.

Bethany's mission statement commits us to "Manifest the love and compassion of Jesus Christ by protecting and enhancing the lives of children and families."

As Christians, we are the continued embodiment of Christ's love. When we care for others, Jesus is caring for them. When we proclaim His saving grace through our actions and words, we are sharing with others that their ultimate comfort and answer to life's challenges is coming to Him for rest.

Bethany's primary focus is on children and families. Our fervent commitment is to the protection of life prior to and following birth.

This past year the Lord gave us the privilege of ministering with you from 67 offices located throughout the United States and within 14 foreign countries. Through Bethany's efforts, 1,478 children joined their adoptive families. Over 11,000 young people living with unplanned pregnancies received counseling. An additional 10,000+received Christian guidance counseling through our crisis pregnancy hotline (Bethany Lifeline). Each person whose life was touched through Bethany received the clear message that life is precious, that the child developing within the womb is a human life and that the lives of the children whom we parent are loved by the Lord.

Among the 1,478 children who joined their adoptive families were many whose lives were punctuated with unusual challenges and needs. Well over 500 were children who languished in foreign orphanages prior to Bethany's intervention. Over 200 were children who endured the terror of abuse at the hands of their birth family. Three hundred seventy-five (375) were children of color. All were children who are precious to our heavenly father. Their needs and, in some cases their pain, grieved Him. It was

Bethany's privilege to be a vessel through which the lives of these children were transformed.

Bethany is indeed an extension of the Christian body. We don't simply represent you. We are you! You are Bethany! Our ministry is a partnership. Together we fulfill our mission of love.

This partnership of love is expressed in multiple and unique ways. Members of our congregation serve as foster parents. Others adopt. Still others serve on our governing boards or as volunteers. You join us in prayer for those we serve and for those who serve. And you participate with your financial support...\$111,000 last year. Thank you for loving and caring with us.

As we enter this new year and this new millennium. Bethany will be confronted with many challenges and opportunities. We approach those opportunities with excitement and confidence. We will continue to develop additional branch office locations in order to more comprehensively protect the lives of children and families and to proclaim His love to them. We have just opened an office in Traverse City, Michigan, and within the year expect offices to begin in Orlando, Florida and Phoenix, Arizona. Likewise, the extension of Christian mercy through our International Program will continue to expand in locations and in numbers of people served. We will strengthen our Christcentered love and message to them. We will continue to proclaim the importance of and will work to strengthen the Christian family.

Life is fast nowadays. Change happens quickly. Bethany is anticipating and is prepared to meet those challenges. We also, however, live within the assurance of the Lord's unchangeable love. And, we live His unchangeable expectation that we:

"Love the Lord our God with all our heart, our soul, and our mind and that we love our neighbors as ourselves."

With you, we eagerly look forward to practicing that love...in Jesus' name.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In camp this past summer, one of the activities included placing a small seed inside a lump of plaster of paris. Daily the campers looked to see what changes had occurred in their plaster rock formation.

At first, they just saw a small crack in the plaster. A few days later, they discovered the sprout of the seedling they had "planted" in their plaster rock. By the end of the week, the imbedded seed had grown significantly. Everyone marveled at the strength of that small seed.

This year, I think Pioneer Clubs has been like that small seed in the plaster of paris. Much of our energy and focus throughout the year was directed at a strategic planning effort.

We spent a significant amount of time reviewing our past and mapping out plans to ensure a strong future for the ministry of Pioneer Clubs. It was refreshing to recap the past and thank God for watering the small Pioneer Clubs seed that was planted over 60 years ago.

We reflected on how God's gracious hand has been guiding the ministry from the very beginning. We sought his continued guidance throughout our strategic planning process. And just like the seed in the plaster, we began to sense the promise of future fruit in our ministry.

The strategic planning process took place over an eight-month period of time. Each month, our planning team gathered to wrestle with another aspect of the plan.

Excellence: We strive for constant improvement in every aspect of ministry. We want our curriculum, communication, and training to be of the highest quality.

People and relationships: We are a relationship-oriented ministry. We recognize the significance of children building healthy relationships with adults, peers, and children

of other ages in the context of the local church.

We greatly value the people we work with, both within the organization and our constituency at large, as God's creation with important gifts. In our contacts with others, we communicate respect by our courtesy and prompt fulfillment of commitments.

Through our curriculum, we encourage cooperation and gift enhancement. Our staff people will see how much we value themby our focus on personal and professional development.

Christian community: We believe that the church is God's community and the primary channel of his work on earth. We work through churches and other ministries to reach children and youth and to encourage them to get involved in a local church.

Responsible stewardship: We recognize that all we have comes from God. He is the source and owner of all the gifts, resources, and supporters we have. We are merely managers with the responsibility to wisely use all that we have to bring glory to God and expand the boundaries of his kingdom.

While these core values have historically been part of the Pioneer Clubs ethos, it was important for us to write them down and purposefully plan on how we would intentionally continue to live them out in the ministry. They are the "seeds in the plaster" we want to continue growing.

This annual report will update you on what happened during 1998-99. We praise the Lord for his blessing on the ministry of Pioneer Clubs this past year. And we are excited about the strategic planning seeds that have been imbedded into our goals for the future.

I pray that our many friends and supporters will understand that their dedication, prayers, and financial support are helping Pioneer Clubs teach children to put Christ in every aspect of life.





Leadership Training

This year we conducted 17 Leadership Training Seminars across the country. In addition, over 2,700 training videos were distributed to Pioneer Clubs churches

Product Revisions

Revisions in our products centered on three areas—phase 2 of camp curriculum, Voyager (grades 1-2) curriculum, and Trailblazer (grades 5-7) curriculum.

Phase 2 of the three year cycle of camp curriculum followed the new curriculum plan that was implemented in phase 1. The new materials included camper and counselor materials for Pathfinders (grades 2-4), Trailblazers (grades 5-7), and Teens.

The Voyager and Trailblazer revision was designed to provide more elements to help leaders be successful in ministering to and meeting the needs of club members. It also included many changes in the activities and Bible Explorations to help keep club members' interest and excitement in club very high.

New Logo Introduced

In January 1999, we introduced a new corporate look with a new logo designed by Dwight Walles, a graphic designer from Wheaton.

The new logo consists of a stylized flame and book over the Pioneer



Clubs name. The book represents the Bible, which is the foundation of our ministry. The flame is a symbol of our key verse from Psalm119:105: "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto path."

Pioneer Clubs Around the World

The group we have been working with in Lithuania completed the translation of the Pioneer Clubs Urban Edition this year. They are now working to raise the funds to complete

the printing of the materials. This is the same group that translated and began distributing our Scooter program two years ago.

Outside North America, Pioneer Clubs has Englishspeaking club programs in 17 countries. Three countries— Kenya, Korea, and Lithuania have clubs using materials in their own language.

This year Pioneer Clubs Canada ministered to children in 501 churches.





Kids for Kids Hike

The 2nd Amual Kids for Kids Hike raised over \$15,000 to help more kids experience Pioneer Clubs, More than 50 churches participated in the hike at various locations across the U.S.



At the hike sponsored by Pioneer Clubs' headquarters, about 150 kids, leaders, and parents hiked and enjoyed games and a hot dog lunch. They represented eight churches.

Camp Cherith

Over 6,100 campers participated at our 20 Cherith camps last summer. This was a healthy increase from the year before. Another area of growth that Cherith camps are seeing is in the number of campers participating in the Campers in Leadership Training (CHT) program.



The Association of Cherith Camps' Curriculum Committee worked with the Publications Division on two projects this year-Phase 2 of the camp curriculum revision and the revision of the CILT program.

Denominational Endorsements

Pioneer Clubs continues to be the officially recognized club program of both the Presbyterian Church in America and the Evangelical Presbyterian Church denominations.

Over the years we have developed a healthy and growing relationship with these denominations through general assembly exhibits and representation at denomination-sponsored Christian education seminars.

We continue to work to develop ministry partnerships with other denominations.

Scholarships

Pioneer Clubs awarded two college scholarships from the Virginia C. Patterson Continuing Education Fund to former Pioneer Clubs members. The recipients are: Erin Rogers, of Alpharetta, Georgia, who also attended Camp Cherith; and William D. Swenson, of Anaheim, California

The Search Committee was officially notified by the Stated Clerk in February of this year. On March 5th, a letter was mailed to each member announcing our first conference phone call meeting to be held on March 24th. Since that time we have had three conference phone call meetings and four all day meetings in Atlanta.

We have prayerfully approached the development of our process, materials and time schedule. We interviewed Mr. Bruce Dingman and Mr. Jon McRae (Christian Personnel Search Groups) to determine if we should hire such an organization to assist us in our search process. The committee decided that it was our responsibility to search within the EPC. If our search process did not produce a valid candidate we would then consider using an outside resource.

The committee has worked exceptionally well together in developing the following materials:

The committee notified all EPC Teaching Elders, Church Sessions, Presbytery Clerks of our desire to solicit their prayers and recommendations for the position of Stated Clerk. In response to this letter we received 32 recommendations from across our denomination.

All of these nominees were contacted and five of the nominees expressed their desire to be considered for the position. Application Forms were mailed to each candidate. We are presently in the process of receiving those Application Forms and then sending Reference Forms to seven references listed by each candidate. As soon as all Application and Reference Forms are returned a copy of all forms will be mailed to each member of the Search Committee.

We hope to mail all of the materials to committee members by November 15th, and schedule a Conference Phone Meeting soon after Thanksgiving with the intention to have a committee meeting in Atlanta early in December

We should have a much clearer direction by the time we evaluate the Application and Reference materials. One of our goals has been to reach this point in our process by the first of January.

We do request your prayers for the candidates and for the committee.



ANNUAL REPORT

1 March 2000

"Not by Might, Nor by Power, But by My Spirit, Saith the Lord"

The year 1999 was a year of challenge and opportunity for the Commission. As many of you know, we had voted two years ago to take a step of faith and tithe our income to support international efforts to establish or enhance chaptaincy ministry. 1998 saw the launching of the International Association of Evangelical Chaptains (IAEC) as a subsidiary ministry of the Commission. This past October we held our first international conference at Schloss Mittersill, Austria. The Lord blessed us with delegates from 15 nations and four continents. As a result of this conference, new efforts are underway to develop evangelical chaptain ministry in several third-world nations. This first year of the new century will see us moving forward with these initiatives. Much prayer will be required to see these efforts come to fruition. Future conferences will be held in the United States (2000), The Republic of Korea (2001), Latin America (2002) and Africa in 2003. Please pray for this work.

During 1999 we continued to process a large number of candidates for the military chaplaincies though we had fewer applicants for the VA chaplaincy. As 1 mentioned last year, we continue to attract candidates from independent churches who are joining the NAE and the Commission in order to support their candidates. Each year since 1997 we have processed more candidates for the chaplaincies than at any time since World War II. This year has been more of the same, We currently have over 70 men and women at various stages of preparation for the military or VA chaplaincies. They represent 18 of our regular member denominations and churches. Additionally each of our eight affiliate denominational members have processed an increasing number of candidates for the chaplaincies. Together we have placed over 25 new chaplains on active duty and in the reserve components of the three services during 1999.

We are pleased once again to report that our chaplains continue to do well in terms of quality of ministry, and many hold very key leadership positions in each of the services. Unfortunately, the slight decline in the number of selections to the highest grades continues. We have been unable to determine precisely why this is so, but suspect that it is due to the aging of our Evangelical "force" combined with the smaller number of Evangelical Chaplains who entered the chaplaincy immediately after the Viet Nam war (1975-1980), thus reducing the pool of Evangelicals eligible for selection to the highest grades. Additionally, our limited success in placing chaplains on active duty in the early 80's contributes to this inibalance. But in the recent past, we have had more than our share of promotions to these grades, and if the larger numbers of chaplains we are now placing on active duty and in the reserves continue to do well, the future looks very bright indeed, Despite the continual "downsizing" of the military services, we are not only maintaining our numbers, but are actually increasing our percentage of the total chaplaincy. This serves to expand the outreach of the NAE within the government sector.

In February and September of 1999, I was again invited to present training on "Free Exercise of Religion" to US Forces Chaplains and Assistants in Korea, at the request of the Department of Defense. In December of 1999 we conducted our third annual training conference for newly appointed chaplains in connection with our annual Centurion weekend Retreat. Our chaplains received intensive training from a faculty of Evangelical Chaplaincy leaders. Dr. Hudson T. Armerding served as spiritual mentor to faculty and trainees alike.

Our Commission Resource Board continues to wrestle with contemporary issues facing our chaplains and the services. A series of papers, reports and recommendations issues from this advisory board each year. Meanwhile our chaplains continue to speak out forcefully on issues dear to the hearts of all Evangelicals - sometimes at a cost to their careers. We are pleased to report, however, that first and foremost, the Evangelical message is being faithfully proclaimed and soldiers, sailors, airmen & marines are turning to Christ. For this we give thanks.

Our Consolidated Financial Report for 1999 is on the reverse.

- 2. Cumulative Income as of 31 Dec 99 was 14% above budget projections. This increase is due to a number of unbudgeted gifts from Air Force and Navy chapels & the DA Chaplains Fund. Additionally, retreat fees (which are offset by expenses) are included. Giving by Centurion Club members exceeded \$10,000 as of 31 Dec 99.

The following represents an advisory letter from the Ministerial Vocation Committee:

WHEREAS, ministers have been afforded a rather unique privilege of being able to "opt-out" of Social Security, and

WHEREAS, this privilege was provided only because of moral or religious objections to the concept of governmentally provided insurance for individuals, and

WHEREAS, If an individual "opts-out" of Social Security coverage that person is unable to secure future Medicare basic coverage because the opt-out decision is irrevocable, and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE EVANGELICAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH DOES NOT FORMALLY ENDORSE ANY MORAL OR RELIGIOUS BELIEF THAT WOULD PRECLUDE PARTICIPATION IN SOCIAL SECURITY, NOT DOES IT DENY THE RIGHT OF ITS PASTORS TO SO REFUSE TO PARTICIPATE. PROPOSED ARTICLES OF PHASE II OF THE PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT BETWEEN EPC AND IPB

Original Articles and Principles of Faith, 1985-1999: totally reaffirmed

All the projects of Phase I should come to an end within three months and all eventual contributions which may be made by EPC churches to all or any of these projects will be deposited to IPB within 90 (ninety) days. In doing so Phase I will be totally concluded with our deepest and most sincere gratitude to God in the first place for allowing us to work together as sister denominations and to learn from each other how to do and not to do.

Let us together praise God for the Andrew Jumper Presbyterian Graduate Center, now with over 350 students, and now preparing to offer the Doctor of Ministry Program and soon the Doctor of Missiology program. We rejoice in the Lord.

On behalf of the Presbyterian Church of Brazil as its president, I express our most sincere gratitude for all you have done on our behalf. God bless you all - EPC leadership, churches and pastors.

On behalf of the Presbyterian Church of Brazil as its president, I present to you our apologies and deepest regrets for our mistakes. Some projects should have had better results. It is a sign of our humanity and imperfection because of our fallen nature. We move to Phase II, knowing more about each other. We have far more reasons to be grateful than regrets to be sad about. Praise the Lord!

Article I – Areas of cooperation: prayer and intercession for one another, youth exchange program, short term missionary visits, pastors interchange, theological education through Bartlett Hess Theological Week, specific missionary projects, church planting in both countries, the exchange of fraternal delegates every two years.

Article II - Youth Exchange Program (short term): This exchange could be 10-20 days in duration and hosting would involve IPB families and young people from EPC in order to be exposed to IPB church programs, mission activities, social programs and the Brazilian culture. The visiting church will pay its travel expenses and the receiving church will offer housing, food and transportation. There will be a coordinator of such programs from each partner church and we agree to alternate countries on a yearly basis.

Article III – Youth Exchange Program (long term): This exchange would involve areas such as work programs (light) youth choirs and evangelistic teams, as well as learning the language of the host country while attending an educational institution.

Article IV - The following items must be agreed up before the exchange program is approved.

- Itinerary
- · Educational arrangements (when needed)
- Expectations (in writing) from both the young person(s) and their host(s)

The visiting group will pay for its travel costs and the receiving church will offer housing, food and transportation while in the country according to the itinerary eventually approved.

Article V – Leadership Exchange: Pastor and Lay Leaders. Building on our desire to learn from one another and to bless one another, we agree on two additional areas of cooperation. Pastors and Lay Leaders Exchange and choir and music group visits. We believe such an exchange will prove to be a spiritually enriching experience not only for the participating pastor or lay leaders but also for their congregation and for both denominations.

- An exchange would consist of 10-30 days, allowing for observations, exchange of ideas, attending church meetings, and in some cases, preaching;
- B) Ideally, a pastor exchange or visit will involve both the pastor and his wife;
- The moderators from EPC will include one visit to IPB while visiting St. Andrews Presbytery in Argentina;
- D) The Moderator or someone from the Board of the IPB-will be invited to visit the EPC as fraternal delegate for its General Assembly. The IPB will also invite a fraternal delegate from EPC for its National Executive annual Board meeting and for its Supreme Council every four years.
- All these exchanges must go through the church offices and through the Stated Clerk's supervision.
- F) The pastors and lay leaders exchange should always involve itinerary, translators when preaching/teaching is involved, and expectations (in writing) from the pastor and his wife and from the lay leader, ideally from the host congregation (its pastor).

Article VI - The choir and music group exchange program will follow the same pattern regarding hospitality. However, prior to any consideration of exchange, the Music Directors of both churches should receive audio tapes and/or videotapes from the choir or music group and be sure as music director that the style will be acceptable to his congregation. No offense, just caution,.

Article VII - Theological Education: We will dedicate time and effort to organize, on a yearly basis, the Bartlett Hess Theological Week, preferably in the Andrew Jumper Graduate Center. The Bartlett Hess Theological Week could also take place in one of the other theology schools or seminary of IPB.

- EPC will agree with the Director of the Center on which prominent Reformed theologian shall be invited and also help to contact him or her;
- The IPB will offer housing, food and transporation while in Brazil for both the theologian and his wife;
- C) The EPC will cover travel expenses and the agreed upon fee (if such is required) will be paid 50% by each denomination.
- D) The texts of the series of lectures on a specific theme will be published both in Portuguese and in English and should be known as the Bartlett Hess Series. Each church will pay for its own edition.

Article VIII – Specific missionary projects should be examined and adopted by both denominations like the ones in Africa among Muslims, the teachers in the Lubango, Angola Seminary and other upon decision of the Joint Committee and always as partner churches, 50% each.

Article IX - Church Planting in the USA and in Brazil: This is a mutual agreement where each church will help the other begin new congregations in each other's land (in the case of the USA among the Portuguese-speaking communities). Every case should be considered as a project in itself and will include finances, timetable and expected results. Every project must have a beginning, clear steps and a target end.

- IPB will provide the recruitment, training (intensive, one month) and the assessment of the church plants;
- B) EPC will through its church planting division, indicate where in the States to plant a church and why. Providing the demographics that will help the church planter know how many and where to find the Portuguese speaking families if possible.
- C) The costs involved will be previously announced and approved by the Joint Committee case by case. And for every project, we agree that the cost will be 50% each.

Article X - The Joint Committee will continue its existence on the same basis. After each meeting the Committee itself decides where, when and why to meet. With God's help and for God's glory we will continue working together as partner churches.

This draft is to be a working document for the Joint Committee in its future meeting. If possible, I Brazil in the City of Guarapari between November 2 and 5. We will have a National Congress on Evangelism, Mission and Church Planting.

Are these dates convenient for your church? If not, do you have a better suggestion? Thank you.

OVERTURE 00-A

PRESBYTERY OF THE MID-ATLANTIC OVERTURE TO THE 20TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

TO THE 20TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY:

WHEREAS, Book of Discipline 6-1A defines the duty of all church courts to exercise care and discretion in the investigation of reports concerning alleged offenses requiring discipline; and,

WHEREAS, the court must exercise utmost care and discretion in the initial stages of investigating reports of alleged offenses which could lead to an ecclesiastical judicial procedure; and,

WHEREAS, a degree of inexactitude exists in the wording of Book of Discipline, Chapter 6, "Procedures in Action for Discipline," specifically in a determination of what constitutes a report of alleged offenses requiring discipline of the court; and,

WHEREAS, the term "written charges" in 6-1B is ambiguous in that no clear definition is offered, nor is there a requirement for sufficient supporting evidence to be offered to lend credence to such charge(s); and.

WHEREAS, 6-1B (and 5-1A) requires that written charge(s) be filed with the Clerk of the court, and, upon such filing it is presumed that the Clerk shall communicate such charge(s) to the court as a whole without making any determination as to the soundness or credibility of the charge(s); and,

WHEREAS, for the sake of care, discretion, and the overall peace of the Church, there appears to be a need for an intermediate procedural step between the receipt of written charges by the Clerk of the court and the matter being communicated to the court as a whole;

THEREFORE, that the Book of Discipline 6-1 be amended as follows:

 AMEND 6-IB, the first sentence, with the inclusion of the italicized phrase "with attached supporting evidence" so that the sentence reads

"No investigation against an accused offender shall be commenced unless some person files a written charge, with attached supporting evidence, with the Clerk of the court, . . . etc."

2) AMEND 6-1B by adding the following italicized sentences to the end of the section:

"The Clerk shall determine and be satisfied that the person(s) bringing a charge have followed Scriptural procedure required under Matthew 18:15-16, 1 Timothy 5:19 and Galatians 6:1. The Clerk shall then notify the Moderator of the court that a charge has been properly filed against a member of the court."

- 3) AMEND 6-1C by adding the following italicized words, so that the section now reads
- C. Investigative Committee Upon notification by the Clerk that a formal charge has been duly received against a member of the court, the Moderator shall appoint an investigative committee to serve as a finder of fact, which shall report its findings to the court with its recommendations. The committee shall have no authority to act for the court other than as an investigative body. Should a formal charge he filed against an officer of the court, the court as a whole shall receive the charge and elect the investigative committee.
- 4) AMEND 1-6, sentence beginning "No charge involving a personal offense will be received . . ," by changing the phrase "to the court" to read "to the Clerk of the court."

OVERTURE TO THE TWENTIETH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE EVANGELICAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FROM THE PRESBYTERY OF THE CENTTRAL SOUTH [ADOPTED at the Spring Stated Meeting Saturday, April 29, 2000]

WHEREAS the Evangelical Presbyterian Church desires to have a program of benefits to provide a measure of financial security for its ministers and member churches. To satisfy this desire, the Evangelical Presbyterian Church established a fully insured plan of Group Life Insurance, a fully insured plan of Long Term Disability insurance and a partially Self Funded plan of Medical Benefits; and,

WHEREAS the order of the General Assembly 81-06 "Denominational Group Insurance Plan providing health, disability and life coverage shall be mandatory for all ministers within member churches" has not been fully complied with thereby creating the potential for adverse selection against the plan i.e. Group Life, Long Term Disability and Medical Benefits; and,

WHEREAS noncompliance with GA 81-06 would create a lack of contractual requirements for a percentage of participation in Group Life Insurance, Long Term Disability contract and Stop Loss Contract on the Medical Benefit Plan, thereby releasing the Insurance Carrier or Carriers of any contractual obligation to pay claims; and,

WHEREAS it is well known and accepted fact in the world of insurance and risk management that adverse selection has a detrimental effect on any program of Group insurance, and could result in its demise as it sets the plan on a self destruction course. Should noncompliance of GA 81-06 be allowed to continue, all benefits (Life, Disability, Medical) currently in force will be in jeopardy from both noncompliance with contractual participation requirements and adverse selection; and,

WHEREAS those who have opted out of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church's Benefit Plan are in violation of both the General Assembly order 81-06 and the Book of Church Order ordination yows.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we the members of the Presbytery of the Central South Overture the 20th General Assembly to instruct the Permanent Committee On Administration in concert with the Board of Pension and Benefits to bring all churches in compliance with Article of the GA 81-06 ["Denominational Group Insurance providing health, disability and life coverage shall be mandatory for all ministers within member churches"] and the Book of Order. If the individual churches do not comply by January 1, 2001, the presbyteries, to which non-compliant churches belong, will pay the premium to re-enroll the ministers of non-compliant churches. Total compliance to be accomplished by January 1, 2001.

PRESBYTERY OF THE WEST

WHEREAS, the current self-insured medical insurance plan of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church

- exists in an insurance world which is dramatically different from when it was first created and there now exist other viable medical coverage options which can better meet the needs of the participants and
- * involves mandatory participation which has become a divisive issue for pastors within our denomination.
- . is in fiscal crisis which has produced an alarming premium increase in an attempt to ensure the viability of the plan, and
- . does not presently have sufficient member participation to sustain it for any appreciable length of

WHEREAS, a subcommittee of the Ministerial Committee of the Presbytery of the West has learned through consultation with health insurance professionals that

- * small group reform laws both on a state and national level have made access to group health insurance available to groups of 2-50,
 - * state risk pools for the uninsurable are available in many states,
- premium subsidies can be provided by General Assembly or presbyteries in states which do not regulate premiums or which have unfavorable premium levels,
- . insurance brokers familiar with a state's insurance laws and resources can be utilized to prevent any EPC pastor or staff presently covered from losing coverage in a transition to other health insurance coverage.
- * the risk of larger, catastrophic claims can be better absorbed by other much larger insurance pools than the EPC plan is able to sustain, and
- . the trend of associations similar in size and history to EPC's present self-insured plan indicate the EPC plan, by spreading very large claims over a relatively small population, is locked in a downward trend which will result in a bankrupt plan at some point. This is what the health insurance industry calls a "death spiral."

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of the West overtures the 2000 General Assembly to

- permit each presbytery to take the responsibility for development of medical health insurance coverage options, be it local church, regional, or other, for the pastors and staff of churches within that presbytery,
- * accept the responsibility that none of its pastors and staff (including their families) currently on the EPC plan shall be left without medical insurance or expense coverage, and
- work with the presbyteries to develop a system for the EPC to provide assistance in premium subsidies or other financial support for the more costly health insurance options required in some cases,

Motion was unanimously sustained by the Presbytery of the West to approve this overture to the 20th General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church at its 60th stated meeting at Parker Evangelical Presbyterian Church, Parker, Colorado.

Sent to the Presbyteries by order of the 19th General Assembly

OVERTURE 99-A

Shall the *Book of Government*, §10-3F, be amended in the second sentence by <u>adding</u> the word "geographical" between the words "the" and "bounds"? The section would then read (proposed addition underlined):

Present wording 10-3C Evangelist: A Minister may be called by a Presbytery, by some other court, or by some organization to serve as an evangelist. The Presbytery of which the Minister is a member may commission the Minister to share the Gospel and to administer the sacraments outside the bounds of the Presbytery in other parts of the Church or the world. An Evangelist called as missionary shall always have as his primary duty the sharing of the Good News of God in Jesus Christ. When a Presbytery calls an Evangelist as Church Planter, it may entrust to that person the responsibility to develop churches, to conduct preparational meetings of such churches, and to oversee the required preparation of Elders and Deacons. Those special powers given to the Evangelist shall be specified by the Presbytery in writing. That person may be given the power to receive and dismiss members.

Proposed wording 10-3C Evangelist: A Minister may be called by a Presbytery, by some other court, or by some organization to serve as an evangelist. The Presbytery of which the Minister is a member may commission the Minister to share the Gospel and to administer the sacraments outside the geographical bounds of the Presbytery in other parts of the Church or the world. An Evangelist called as missionary shall always have as his primary duty the sharing of the Good News of God in Jesus Christ. When a Presbytery calls an Evangelist as Church Planter, it may entrust to that person the responsibility to develop churches, to conduct preparational meetings of such churches, and to oversee the required preparation of Elders and Deacons. Those special powers given to the Evangelist shall be specified by the Presbytery in writing. That person may be given the power to receive and dismiss members.

Grounds: G.10-3C sets forth three situations in which a minister may be called as an evangelist: 1) as a conference/
crusade evangelist 2) as a missionary serving overseas; 3) as a church planter within the US. The first portion of
G.10-3C describes the case of the missionary serving overseas. The proposed change clarifies the intent of the
paragraph as it relates primarily to the Evangelist/Missionary. The amending language describes that situation in
which an evangelist/missionary is obviously called to minister outside the geographical boundaries of the presbytery
to which the missionary belongs.

 "Cost of pastor's attendance at Presbytery and General Assembly meetings" and

Grounds

The Presbytery of the Southeast overtured the Assembly to amend this section to make provision in the terms of call for funds to cover costs of attendance at Presbytery and General Assembly. It noted that the Evangelical Presbyterian Church is a denomination in which full participation in the courts, as measured by attendance at the Presbytery and General Assembly meetings, gives greater expectation of the congregations being better informed on the issues facing Christians in general and the EPC in particular. The concept of connectionalism suffers when pastors are not able to attend meetings of the church and some pastors seldom or never attend. A number of EPC congregations are small in number of worshipers and some pastors in smaller churches with limited financial resources are not able to personally finance trips to Presbytery and General Assembly meetings.

Shall the Book of Government, §15, be amended as follows:

- Amend G-15-8 by inserting the words "who is not retired" after the word "Minister" in paragraph 2, and after the words "Inactive Status" in paragraph 3.
- Delete from G-15-9 the following sentences: A Minister who is so retired remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership may be transferred to another presbytery.
- 3. Create a new section G.15-10.

15-8 Removal of a Minister to Inactive Status: A Minister may, for reasons deemed valid, request the Presbytery to be placed on Inactive Status. If the Presbytery concurs, the Minister shall be placed on such status. All rights and privileges granted by ordination are temporarily set aside, including the right to vote and participate in the meetings of Presbytery. However, the name of the Minister shall be carried on the Inactive Status Roll of Presbytery. After at least one year, the Minister may request Presbytery to be restored to Active Status. The Presbytery, after careful deliberation, may do so provided the Minister has a valid call that Presbytery approves or provided the Minister is being transferred to another Presbytery in order to receive a call.

When the Minister has been without approved call for a period of one year, the Ministerial Committee will confer with the Minister as to his continued sense of call and his expectations for future ministry. The committee will then recommend to the Presbytery whether the Minister should remain on Active Status in the Presbytery or be placed on Inactive Status. The Presbytery, at its discretion and after judicious consideration, may place the Minister on the Inactive Status Roll involuntarily provided the vote to do so is by a two-thirds majority.

A limit shall be placed on the time during which a Minister on Inactive Status shall remain on the roll of Presbytery, the limit being five years. After five years, the Presbytery has the right to drop that person from the roll without censure.

Ordinarily, a Presbytery shall appoint a special Commission to conduct this service and a record of it inserted in the minutes of Presbytery. A Minister who is so retired remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership may be transferred to another Presbytery. The Presbytery shall be responsible for making an annual review of its retired members to be sure of their welfare and to rectify any deficiencies. Such annual review shall be reported to the court and recorded in its minutes.

(No section 15-10 currently exists.)

15-9 The retirement of a Minister: A Minister may request Presbytery to be placed on the Retired Roll of Presbytery due to age, infirmity, or other debilitating condition. If the Presbytery concurs, a service of appreciation and thanksgiving should be conducted, either at the meeting of Presbytery or at the place of service of the retiring Minister. Ordinarily, a Presbytery shall appoint a special Commission to conduct this service and a record of it inserted in the minutes of Presbytery. A Minister who is so retired remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership may be transferred to another Presbytery. The Presbytery shall be responsible for making an annual review of its retired members to be sure of their welfare and to rectify any deficiencies. Such annual review shall be reported to the court and recorded in its minutes.

15-10 Retired Ministers: A Minister who is retired according to the provision of G.15-9 remains a full member of Presbytery. Membership may be transferred to another Presbytery. A Retired Minister who does not participate in the life of the Presbytery by attending at least one Stated Meeting during a calendar year. may be placed on Inactive Status at the discretion of the Presbytery. After at least one year, the Retired Minister may request Presbytery to be restored to Active Status. The Presbytery shall make the determination based on the Minister's participation in the meetings of the Presbytery and need not require a specific call to be restored to Active Status. A Retired Minister on Inactive Status shall not be removed from the Presbytery rolls for that cause and is to be afforded the same pastoral care as Retired Ministers on Active Status.

Grounds

As the Book of Government is now structured, a retired minister may be completely uninvolved in the life of his presbytery for years and then suddenly appear for a key vote, having no ongoing knowledge of the work of the court. Retired Ministers currently retain the authority and privileges of their office even when they are not participating in the responsibilities and means of accountability required of non-retired ministers.

In many presbyteries, congregations are asked to bear the expenses of sending additional ruling elders to insure parity for retired ministers who never attend presbytery meetings.

Retired ministers not participating in presbytery maintain the authority to administer the sacraments, marry couples, counsel and otherwise engage in ministry but without the supervision of any presbytery. The absence of accountability may present legal liability to the presbytery as well as violating the biblical principle of oversight.

G.15-8 adds the phrase "who is not retired" since a retired minister could remain inactive indefinitely without being removed from the membership of the presbytery.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The Evangelical Presbyterian Church is a church denomination with member churches who are evangelical in spirit.

NOTE 2 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

GENERAL

The financial statements include only the accounts of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and do not include the accounts of affiliated local Presbyteries of member churches.

PROMISES TO GIVE

Contributions are recognized when the donor makes a promise to give to the Organization that is, in substance, unconditional. Contributions that are restricted by the donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions expire in the fiscal year in which the contributions are recognized. All other donor-restricted contributions are reported as increases in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restrictions. When a restriction expires, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets.

ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

INCOME TAXES

The Organization is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Organization is not a private foundation under Code Section 509.

PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Donations of property and equipment are recorded as support at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as unrestricted support unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as restricted support. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long, those donated assets must be maintained, the Organization

reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Organization reclassifies temporarily restricted net assets to unrestricted net assets at that time. Property and equipment are depreciated using the straight-liminethod. Depreciation expense for the years 1999 and 1998 totaled \$25,849 and \$24,49 respectively.

INVENTORY

Inventory consists primarily of books and other publications. Inventory is stated at the lower of cost or market on the first-in, first-out basis.

INVESTMENTS

Investments are carried at market value, including accrued interest.

CONTRIBUTED SERVICES

During the year ended December 31, 1999, the value of contributed services meeting the requirements of recognition in the financial statements was not material and has not been recorded.

NOTE 3 - NOTES RECEIVABLE

Notes receivable consists of loan agreements made to member churches at interest rates below the current market rates. The churches make principal and interest payments on a monthly basis. All notes other than Ashville EPC are included in the Church Loan Fund. Details of this account consist of the following:

NOTE 6 - PENSION PLAN

The General Assembly Office participates in a multi-employer pension plan administered by the Board of Pensions and Benefits as elected by the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. The plan is a defined contribution type. Contributions by the General Assembly Office to the plan for participants for 1999 and 1998 were \$40,113 and \$34,399 respectively. Any employee may participate in the salary reduction aspect of the plan. Also, the Assembly may make contributions for the benefit of employees at its discretion.

NOTE 8 - LEASE AGREEMENT

The Assembly entered into a lease agreement for office space effective February 1, 1993. The lease had a five-year term with monthly rent of \$4,512 during the first year. This lease was extended for three additional years, expiring January 31, 2001. Effective August 1, 1999, additional office space was leased, resulting in a new 5 year lease agreement being entered into. Monthly payments began at \$8,342 and increase annually. The Geneva Statement

Agreement of Cooperation between the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church

Being persuaded from Scripture that all Christians are united together as one body in Christ, we acknowledge our responsibility to God and one another to labor together in the work of Christ so as to promote the peace, purity, and unity of the church and the advancement of Christ's Kingdom in the world.

We share a common understanding of the Scriptures, as expressed in the Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechism for laboring together in ministry. Recognizing that some differences exist between us in our understanding of certain issues concerning God's will for His church, we also recognize that which we hold in common far outweighs that which differentiates us. It is understood that our common labors shall not compromise the consciences of either church. The integrity of each church concerning its standards and policies must be maintained and respected.

We therefore pledge ourselves to labor together in love, to advance the work of Christ in both our common and separate ministries, seeking to maintain the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace.

We promise that if ever we should offend one another in our common labors, we shall do everything possible to resolve the matter and to maintain cooperation. We commit ourselves to labor in support of our church courts, faithfully reporting our activities to the appropriate board or agency, and our respective committees concerning inter-church relations.

We further believe that such practical fraternity, apart from any quest for organizational union, will be pleasing to God and promote the advancement of the Gospel in the world. For these reasons we commit ourselves to this Agreement of Cooperation, which is to be attached to the joint statement previously adopted by our churches.

Adopted June, 1992 12th General Assembly

The 11th General Assembly (1991) together with the General Synod of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church authorized the Interchurch Relations Committees to continue meeting for purposes of finding areas of mutual commitments, discovering areas of differences, and exploring ways of resolving those differences, exploring new and creative ways of working together. They shall report back to the respective parent bodies each year, until such time as either committee may ask to be discharged from this duty, or until the appointing body may discharge the committee from such duty.

Adopted June, 1991 11th General Assembly

MINISTERIAL VOCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

'Christ gave some to be pastors and teachers to prepares God's people for works of service so that the body of Christ may be built up.' (Ephesians 4:11,12) From the human perspective, our Ministers are our greatest assets. The Ministerial Vocation Committee has as its mission to serve the Teaching Elders of our Denomination. We attempt to address issues that pertain to the ministry and health of our pastors. To the question, who pastors the pastor, comes the answer that often very few are available to really pastor our pastor. As much as is possible from an institutional perspective, we seek to serve in this way.

The Ministerial Vocation Committee met at the EPC office on November 18-20, 1999 and again on June 1-3, 2000 Members of this committee are Mr. John Allman, Mr. Jerry Alpert, Mr. Jim Cantey, Chaplain (Commander) Mark Jumper, Dr. William C. Moore, Rev. Paul Rettew. Dr. L. Edward Davis, our Stated Clerk, met with this committee and his counsel was invaluable to us. Rev. Ed. McCallum served as our Committee Clerk and helped us with innumerable occasions of word-smithing and motion-crafting.

THE WORK OF THE COMMITTEE

- The Andy Jumper Fund: It is our hope to complete the funding of the Andy Jumper scholarship fund that assists EPC students attending Reformed Theological Seminary. On Motion: that the benevolence asking be set at \$50,000.
- 2. Candidate Process: The committee met with Mel Conant, a candidate from the Denver area who was recently granted extra-ordinary status. The extra-ordinary status means that some of the formal educational requirements are waived and the Ministerial Vocations Committee is responsible for assigning a course of study in preparation for ordination. Mr. Conant was examined by the Committee and recommendations were finalized regarding his preparation for ordination. Every candidate under the extra-ordinary clause will be asked to meet personally with the Ministerial Vocations Committee before final recommendations are developed. The Committee also conducted a phone interview with the Rev. Buck Oliphant regarding Mr. Allen White, an extra-ordinary candidate serving under World Outreach in Kazakhstan. In lieu of taking an EPC Polity Course, Bill Moore and Ed McCallum will meet with Allen White during the week of June 19, 2000 for an oral examination on church polity.
- 3. Chaplain's Subcommittee: TE Jumper reported the following actions: Brian Hill has completed chaplaincy school and was approved to receive ecclesiastical approval to serve as a Chaplain in the U.S. Navy Reserve. The Chaplain's Subcommittee initiated an annual reporting process for all chaplains and reports from each chaplain are being collected. Commander Jumper attended the meetings of the Endorsers Conference for Veterans Affairs Chaplaincy (ECVAC), National Conference on Ministry to the Armed Forces (NCMAF) and the National Association of Evangelicals Commission on Chaplains..
- 4. General Assembly Events: Mark Jumper will speak briefly when Chaplains are introduced at the 20th General Assembly encouraging pastors to consider military chaplaincy. He will secure recruiting materials from each branch of the Armed Services and arrange a "duty rotation" at the MVC exhibit table for military chaplains attending the Assembly. The MVC will

invite ministers and their spouses ordained in the past two years to a dinner Thursday, June 22 with the Moderators of the 19th and 20th General Assemblies, the MVC Chairman and the Stated Clerk. A dinner for Chaplains will be arranged at Ward Church on Thursday, June 22. Paul Rettew will lead the Face to Face portion of the 20th General Assembly. The forms used at the 19th General Assembly will be used again. Information from Face to Face forms will be combined and reproduced as one packet and placed on the MVC table in the exhibit area. MVC Exhibit Table will include the following items: D.Min. information from Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary, Reformed Theological Seminary, Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, Fuller Theological Seminary Westminster Seminary, Covenant Seminary, and Erskine Seminary; Face to Face packet; Articles from Leadership and Net Results; Material on military chaplaincy. Members of the MVC and military chaplains will staff the table.

- 5. Procedure Manual (revision for 2000): The committee solicited feedback from Ministerial and Candidates Chairmen and Presbytery Clerks in preparation for revising the Ministerial/Candidates Committee Manual. The entire manual was closely edited and the proposed amendments and additions can be found at the end of this report.
- 6. The PIF and the CIF Forms: We have permission from the Christian Reformed Church to adapt their Church Profile and Minister Profile which will become our Personal Information Form(PIF) and Church Information Form (CIF). On motion: to approve the Church Information Form as a document for use in the EPC.
- 7. Problematic Portion of the BOG: Three areas of the BOG were discussed G.5-3 dealing with the formation of a new church and BOG 11.6 dealing with associate pastors being called to pastor with the pastor leaves the church and G-11-33 dealing with a Minister accepting a call not approved by Presbytery . Recommendations are listed at the end of this document.
- 8. The Personnel Management Task Force: Many of the ideas developed by this task force were placed in the Vision 21 2001 EPC Strategic Plan. On motion: That a task group be formed and charged with implementation of those elements having to do with the office of minister. The task group be composed of Bill Moore, Ed Davis and John Allman, convened by Bill Moore, with the understanding that a second person from the Committee (fourth task group member) will be added in the future.

G.11-6 A congregation may call a Minister to serve as Associate Pastor and shall proceed in the same fashion as indicated above, with the exception that the call of the congregation shall stipulate the primary responsibilities to be exercised by the Associate. However, if by a three-fourths vote of the Church Session, request is made to Presbytery through the Ministerial Committee for an exclusion, the Presbytery may approve the Search Committee of the congregation to nominate the Associate to the congregation as Pastor. Ordinarily An Associate Pastor is not eligible to succeed the Pastor.

Grounds:

- 1. Most Reformed bodies prohibit the possibility of succession.
- Although there are occasional apparent exceptions, the General Assembly Office is aware of numerous situations in which the possibility of succession has resulted in turbulence, unrest, conflict or disruption within congregations.
- Some have suggested that prohibiting succession binds the Spirit in his work of calling to
 ministry. However, the fact that the Holy Spirit works through the orderly processes of our
 church courts is a basic principle of our constitutional system of church governance.
- Scripture affirms that God does not author confusion (1 Cor. 14). In our experience, the
 possibility of succession from within is more likely to generate unrest conflict and discord
 than it is the peace, unity and purity of the church.

7. That G.5-1 and G.5-2 be amended as follows:

Present wording

G.5-1 Presbytery has the exclusive right to organize, dissolve, dismiss or to receive from some other body a particular Church. While a Church Session has the duty and right to establish missions of the congregation or initiate extension work, this should be done always in consultation with the Presbytery. However, to organize into a particular Church is a right reserved

to the Presbytery.

G.5-2 The development of a mission church: A mission church consists of a number of professing Christians, with their children, associated together for divine worship and godly living, agreeable to the Scriptures, and submitting to the lawful government and discipline of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

The mission church, because of its transitional nature, requires a temporary system of government. Depending on the circumstances, and at its own discretion, Presbytery shall provide for such government in one of several ways:

Proposed wording

G.5-1 Presbytery has the exclusive right to organize, dissolve, dismiss or to receive from some other body a particular Church. While a Church Session has the duty and right to establish missions of the congregation or initiate extension work, this should be done always in consultation cooperation with the Presbytery. Such cooperation includes informing Presbytery as early as possible of Session's intent and proposed location for a mission church (G.16-16.E). However, to organize into a particular Church is a right reserved to the Presbytery.

G.5-2 The development of a mission church: A mission church consists of a number of professing Christians, with their children, associated together for divine worship and godly living, agreeable to the Scriptures, and submitting to the lawful government and discipline of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

A mission church is distinguished from a particular church in that it has no permanent governing body, and thus must be governed or supervised by others. However, its goal is to mature and be organized as a particular church as soon as this can be done in good order.

A. Governance: The mission church, because of its transitional nature, requires a temporary system of government.

Depending on the circumstances, and at its own discretion,

Presbytery government shall be provided for such government in

- A. Appoint an Evangelist as prescribed in 10-3C of the Book of Government and entrust appropriate powers to that person.
- B. Cooperate with the Session of a particular church in arranging a mother-daughter relationship with a mission church. The Session may then serve as the temporary governing body of the mission church.
- Appoint a commission to serve as a temporary Session of the mission church.

At the discretion of the temporary governing body, members may be received into the mission church as prescribed in Chapter 9. These persons then become confirmed or baptized members of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. Mission churches shall maintain membership rolls in the same manner as, but separate from other particular churches.

Mission churches and their members shall have the right of judicial process to the court having oversight of their temporary governing body. It is the further intention of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church that mission churches enjoy the same status as particular churches in relationship to civil government.

7. Steps In the Presentation of the Applicant to the Presbytery by the Ministerial Candidates Committee

The following are requirements in the acceptance process for Presbytery's Ministerial/ Candidates Committee.

Under Care of the Presbytery - G.12-2B)

- The Committee should notify the applicant of the time requirements before Presbytery can act on the application. See G.12-2A.
- The Committee should inform the applicant of the various required written documents that are needed (see Appendix - Attachment *, "Candidates Check List - Items Sent and Received"):
 - 1. Session Approval Form(see Appendix Attachment 6)
 - 2. Assessment Evaluation
 - 3. Physical Examination
 - 4. Transcripts from all schools above secondary level;
 - Statement in writing of applicant's personal Christian experience and the events which had led to a sense of God's call to the ministry.
 - The application to come under care (See Appendix Attachment *, "Application to Come under Care of Presbytery")
 - 7. PU
 - 8. Preliminary Questionnaire Statement of Faith Final Questionnaire. The Committee may wish to ask the applicant to fill out the Preliminary Questionnaire as another way of gaining information from the candidate regarding his/her understanding of his/her call to ministry. As the candidate moves toward ordination, the Committee may wish to ask the candidate to complete the Statement of Faith and the Final Questionnaire. Each of these forms are found in the appendix.
 - 9. Background Check: Note the following Act of the Assembly

 98-15 Presbyteries shall perform a background investigation on all individuals seeking candidacy or membership in their Presbytery. The investigation of public records shall include at least a verification of social security number, criminal history and motor vehicle driving history. Also, as part of the reception process, references must be checked.

Our first concern is to protect the safety of the flock under our care, and better secure the integrity of the household of faith. We are also concerned to strengthen the integrity of all information which is presented in the process of a call. We also note that by judicial precedent, any employer which fails to exercise due diligence and reasonable care to hire safe and competent employees exposes itself to legal liability for damages caused by employees so hired. We would thus protect the stewardship of the gifts given by God's people for the work of the Kingdom. The information requested in the background check is not confidential and is readily available on the public record, so violates no one's privacy.

13. Termination of Candidacy

The normal process of candidacy is to shepherd the candidate through the appropriate steps that will lead him/her to ordination. Sometimes, however, a candidacy must be terminated.

a Reasons for terminating candidacy:

1. The candidate decides he/she no longer wishes to pursue ordination;

 The candidate decides he/she no longer wishes to pursue ordination within the EPC;

 The candidate engages in behavior or embraces beliefs which would not be acceptable to the EPC

 The candidate is making no progress over an extended period of time in pursuing ordination.

b. Steps in Termination

 If it is the intent of the candidate to terminate his/her candidacy, he/she should be asked to put in writing to the Ministerial/Candidate Committee his/her desire to terminate candidacy;

 If it is the intent of the Ministerial/Candidate Committee to terminate a candidate who has not requested termination, the Ministerial/Candidate Committee should put in writing its intent to the candidate with a listing of its reasons for seeking termination;

 The Ministerial/Candidate Committee or one of its representatives should seek to meet with the candidate and discuss with him/her the intent to terminate candidacy;

The Ministerial/Candidate Committee should bring to Presbytery a
motion to terminate the candidacy of the candidate;

 If the candidate was accepted under care with extra-ordinary status the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery should inform the MVC of the decision of Presbytery to terminate candidacy (see Appendix - Attachment *.
 "Termination of Candidacy Form").

V. DISSOLUTION OF PASTORAL RELATIONSHIPS

A. When the Pastor Intends to Resign His/Her Pastorate

- The first public knowledge of a Minister's intention to "resign his/her pastorate" shall be given by him to the Session of the church. He should advise the members of the Session of his/her intention to leave his/her present church and ask the Session to call a congregational meeting for the purpose of deciding whether to concur in his/her request.
 - The Session should proceed to arrange for such a congregational meeting immediately, care being taken to observe the required "two Sundays notice" (Book of Government, §8-1B and §15-2)

V. DISSOLUTION OF PASTORAL RELATIONSHIPS

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- The Session should proceed to arrange for such a congregational meeting immediately, care being taken to observe the required "two Sundays notice" (Book of Government, §8-1B and §15-2)
- Normally a reception would be planned for the Minister and his/her family so that the congregation can express its appreciation publically to them.
- 4. Usually a Minister resigns his/her pastorate in order to respond to a call to serve in another pastorate or ministry. If the Minister has expressed his/her intention of not serving within the church as a Minister or in some other ministry approved by the EPC in the near future. Presbytery may consider placing him/her on inactive status (see pages 52 53 for limitations placed on an inactive minister). If the Minister will be actively seeking another call to ministry, the Presbytery may keep him/her on active roll as a Minister without call.
 - G.8-1B Notice of meeting: At least two Sundays notice shall be given. The purpose of the meeting must be stated in the call.
 - G.15-2 The dissolution of a pastoral relationship: This relationship may be dissolved only by Presbytery. A congregational meeting shall be duly called and the congregation requested to concur with the Pastor in the request for the dissolution of the pastoral relationship. If the congregation declines to concur, it shall appoint representatives to Presbytery to explain its action. The Presbytery shall then be the sole judge of whether or not to dissolve the relationship. In the event the congregation, in a duly called congregational meeting, votes to dissolve the relationship and the Pastor declines to concur, the congregational shall appoint representatives to Presbytery to explain its action. The Presbytery shall be the sole judge of whether or not to dissolve the relationship. The Presbytery may appoint an appropriate commission of Presbytery with authority to dissolve pastoral relationships.

B. Procedures To Be Followed When Pastor Reaches the Age of 70.

1. When a Minister serving in any capacity in the Church reaches the age of 70, that relationship shall be terminated. The Minister is obligated to notify the Presbytery six months prior to his/her 70th birthday. The Minister is then eligible to be reelected in the same relationship yearly with the approval of the Church Session and the Presbytery.

- Normally a reception would be planned for the Minister and his/her family so that the congregation can express its appreciation publically to them.
- 4. Usually a Minister resigns his/her pastorate in order to respond to a call to serve in another pastorate or ministry. If the Minister has expressed his/her intention of not serving within the church as a Minister or in some other ministry approved by the EPC in the near future. Presbytery may consider placing him/her on inactive status (see pages 52 53 for limitations placed on an inactive minister). If the Minister will be actively seeking another call to ministry, the Presbytery may keep him/her on active roll as a Minister without call.

H. Regarding Request for Guidance for Out of Bounds

- Presbyteries should give serious attention to G.10-3F, which cautions Presbyteries to be fully satisfied that each calling reflects the centrality of the ministry of Word and Sacrament, and is consistent with the variety of callings within the office of minister (G.10-3 A-F), (see Appendix Attachment *).
- Presbyteries shall make diligent annual use of the form 'Call to a Validated Ministry Outside the Bounds of Presbytery.' The call to a ministry outside the bounds of Presbytery should not be renewed when it is determined that the member's calling is not consistent with the ministry of the Word and Sacrament.
- Presbytery members who desire to transfer within the bounds of Presbytery to a calling not consistent with the ministry of Word and Sacrament should not be approved;
- When an out of bounds call is not approved, and the minister persists in that call, the procedures in G.15-8 apply. (See Acts of the Assembly, 99-11)

C. Missionaries and The Out Of Bounds Status

EPC members who serve as missionaries are in a unique position because of their geographical distance from EPC Presbyteries. Some EPC missionaries are ordained and some are not. Some EPC missionaries serve under the direct oversight of the EPC World Outreach department, and some do not. In practice it might appear that all missionaries ordained within the EPC are serving "out of bounds." In reality, however, those EPC missionaries ordained and serving under the direct oversight of EPC's World Outreach department are serving under both the legal and the ecclesiastical authority of the church and would be within the boundaries of the EPC.

Ordained EPC missionaries who serve under the direct oversight of some other missions agency are serving "out of bounds." They serve under the ecclesiastical, but not under the legal, authority of the EPC. Their legal relationship lies with the agency under whose direct supervision they serve. This relationship with their primary mission agency is understood as the legal relationship which governs their ministry.

ATTACHMENT 7

SESSION ENDORSEMENT FORM

The normal process in which an EPC member moves toward becoming a candidate for the Gospel ministry includes the following initial steps:

- a A member senses God's leading to pursue the Gospel Ministry. This member talks to his/her pastor about his/her sense of call.

- The member who is approved by Session is recommended to the Candidates Committee to be taken under care of the Presbytery. This form should be used to communicate to the Ministerial/Candidate Committee of Session's approval of the applicant.

'STUDY LEAVE'

Ministerial Vocations Committee - June 2000

BACK GROUND

The 'Study Leave' provision is part of the Minister's Terms of Call. It represents a commitment on the part of the church and on the part of the minister to continue his education. Sometimes this provision has been abused; and in other occasions it has been neglected. Some consider 'Study Leave' simply an extended vacation time; others use it for inspiration but not for professional development.. The MVC suggests the following guidelines

- The 'Study Leave' should be used to assist the Minister in doing a better job of his/her ministry. It is not an entitlement; but should produce results in skill/knowledge development useful in the church.
- The Minister should be asked to put in writing for Session: where and what and why the 'Study Leave' will be used, and afterwards, a written report of what was studied; and how it will benefit the church as well as pastor
 - 3. The concept of a 'Study Leave' should be viewed as 'Professional Development', since the basic question to be asked is how this proposed study help the Minister do his/her job in a more effective and productive way.

DEFINITIONS

The concept of a 'Study Leave' represents a long history in the Reformed Tradition. It walks hand in hand with the commitment of providing an educated clergy as leaders in the church.(I Tim. 3:15) Although historical experience has evidenced the peril of the pendulum, swinging between scholarship and piety, the Bible allows for no such divergence. We are commanded to grow both in the knowledge and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ. (2 Pet. 3:18). Peter commands us to add to our faith, knowledge and to our knowledge godliness. (2 Pet. 1:5-7). Both Calvin and Knox were known for their scholarship and their devotion to Jesus Christ.

A 'Study Leave' is a leave of absence from the formal ministry for the purpose of study and renewal. It is a period of time set aside for personal and professional growth. One of the core values of the EPC is to continue a 'biblically educated leadership'. This value is incarnated in the provision for study and development through the Terms of Call document that requests time and resources for a 'Study Leave' for each ordained Minister.

The category of Professional Development' is very helpful in thinking through how to utilize the provisions of a 'Study Leave'. A 'Study Leave' should reflect the goals of professional development. It should contribute to effectiveness in ministry. Many courses, seminars, and classes have been developed that may help increase the competency of the pastor. Topics such as conflict management, administration, goal-setting and decision making, leadership development, crisis counseling and a host of others may be taken as a means of professional

development. At the same time, we must not think that a study of the mechanics and machinery of church ministry is sufficient for the Minister's needs. Ministry is a ministry of the Word and a ministry in the Spirit. Times that enhance our Biblical understanding, ministry skills and our walk of faith must continually be a part of our 'Study Leave' plans.

QUALIFICATIONS

In the E.P.C., the Minister's terms of call include 2 weeks for 'Study Leave' annually. The Minister is encouraged to invest them each year for study. The Acts of the Assembly permit for 'Study Leave' to be accumulated for up for three years. Missionaries may accumulate up to 4 years of Study Leave and monies to be used in their 5th year. Except for Missionaries, 'Study Leave monies may not be accumulated.

Many denominations make no provision for the continued education of their clergy. We are fortunate to be a part of an historical tradition that places a priority on the cultivation, development and continuing education of its Ministers. However, some have misunderstood the purpose of the 'Study Leave' and not used it in the way it was designed. The 'Study Leave' is not designed to be additional vacation time. It is not designed to be used as time to read a few good books or catch up on the magazines unread during the year. It is designed for focused study that will further the Minister's spiritual formation, deepen his/her Biblical understanding and enhance his/her ministry skills.

FINANCING THE 'STUDY LEAVE'

Regardless of the amount, money placed in the 'Study Leave' account should be treated as a 'Reimbursable Expense Account'. Money used from this account is not taxable. IRS requirements include documenting expenses and any money not used by the end of the year is returned to the general fund of the church. This means that the Minister would keep a record of expenses for each 'Study Leave' event and submit them to his treasurer for reimbursement within a month after the event. This also means that any money left in the 'Study Leave' account at the end of the year would revert back into the church's general fund. Use of 'Study Leave' money for purposes other than a study leave should be discouraged.

How much should be placed in the 'Study Leave' account? The tuition for attending a week long class or seminar, including the cost of room and board is expensive. Even with cost cutting measures, the expense will run \$500 - \$1000. The local church may not be able to cover the entire expense of such a study leave. But some minimum amount will pay high dividends to the Minister who feels esteemed by his congregation and encouraged to continue his ministry with excellence. Perhaps an amount of \$400 - \$500 would be a suggested minimum.

ACCOUNTABILITIES

A 'Study Leave' provision can be a great blessing to the church and to the Minister. As with all blessings, some boundaries need to be established to ensure that this provision is being properly

used. Every church should have a Personnel Committee (Personnel and Policy, or Pastor/Staff) that will work with the Minister and staff in church-related matters. The Minister should discuss with this committee the philosophy, practices and expectations regarding his/her 'Study Leave'. Often the Minister will need to take the high road in this matter for he/she may know more about the provisions for his/her 'Study Leave' than does the committee or Session members. He/she will want to work through the Personnel Committee to keep his/her Session informed of his/her 'Study Leave' plans.

BEFORE THE 'STUDY LEAVE'

The Minister should consult with the Personnel Committee in concert with his/her plans for a study leave. Some form of request that includes the date, purpose, nature of the 'Study Leave' should be forwarded to the Committee and through the Committee brought to Session. The following might be a form to be used for this purpose.

The Personnel Committee should bring the request for 'Study Leave' to the Session for information and/or approval. In the absence of such a committee, the above report should be presented directly to Session.

AFTER THE STUDY LEAVE

A brief report should be presented to the Personnel Committee on the completion of the Study Leave. Such a report should include comments about the value of the study leave, insights, personal renewal, skills learned. A summary of this report could be presented to Session by the Personnel Committee.

CONSIDERATIONS

Many Ministers lose their cutting edge because they stop learning and growing. A properly administered 'Study Leave' can help keep the Minister from stagnating. Many Ministers have invested their 'Study Leave' into a D. Min program. Many such programs are available. Most of them are modular in nature, usually requiring a reading assignment before class, a week of classes, and then a post-class project often worked out in the structure of the local church Although the cost for the D.Min program is greater than the annual 'Study Leave' allowance, if the student is patient, he can spread his studies and its costs over a number of years.

For the secure pastor, it might be advisable to interact with his Personnel Committee, asking them for suggestions of the areas of study they might suggest to improve his ministry. The local Presbytery might also be a good resource for ideas about 'Study Leave' possibilities.

'SABBATICAL'

Ministerial Vocations Committee - June 2000

INTRODUCTION

A Sabbatical is a concept that traces its roots deep into the soil of the Scriptures. God created the world in 6 days and rested on the 7th. Old Testament regulations also informed farmers to give their land a year's rest after 6 years of productivity. Although the practice has been followed more closely in the academic community, Ministers from a wide diversity of denominational backgrounds are finding encouragement to consider a Sabbatical. Typically a Sabbatical is a paid leave of absence that facilitates further study, research, renewal prevention or recovery from burnout, writing, and/or the development of some appropriate project or undertaking that would be impossible under the current schedule. The 18th Assembly asked the Ministerial Vocations Committee to study the feasibility, effectiveness and benefits of a periodic sabbatical for Teaching Elders. A questionnaire was mailed to each E.P.C. church to solicit information about Sabbaticals as they were practiced on the level of the local church.

DEFINITION

A Sabbatical is a period of time during which the Minister or staff person is relieved of his/her vocational responsibilities so he may experience new areas of ministry skills, education, exposure to the larger work of God in the Kingdom as well as find a measure of recovery from burnout and weariness in the ministry. It is neither vacation nor Study Leave. A vacation provides opportunities for the family for rest, enjoyment, renewal. A Study Leave provides opportunity for professional development, spiritual formation and growthin biblical understanding. A Sabbatical may include both rest and study, but its focus is on taking an extended period of time to recover from burnout, renew his/her walk with Christ, investigate a new area of ministry skills or study, undertake some project that will be incorporated into the local church. Normally it is granted after 6-7 years of ministry in the same place, hence the title 'Sabbatical'.

A Sabbatical is not an entitlement for the Minister that comes with ordination. Often the wise use of vacations and Study Leave, as well as the judicious following of appropriate time and work boundaries in the ministry will contribute to the continuing well being of the Minister. But the Presbytery and the Session of the local church may recommend a Sabbatical if they truly deem it important for the Minister and for the church.

SABBATICAL CONCEPTS

David Carder, Assistant Pastor of Counseling Ministries at the First Evangelical Free Church of Fullerton CA, conducted a series of interviews with pastors who took a Sabbatical. He distilled from these interviews the following concepts which he presented at the Moody Pastor's Conference a few years ago:

 A Sabbatical should take the Minister away from his place of ministry so he is disengaged from personnel, worship, programs and people of his church.

- A Sabbatical should include a requirement that the Minister will return and serve at his place of ministry for a set number of years(2-4) after the Sabbatical is completed.
 It is agreed that neither pastor nor church will seek to make a change of pastorate during this time.
- The ideal length of a Sabbatical appears to be between 10 and 15 weeks. Such a time
 period allows for disengagement from ministry and for focused study, spiritual
 formation, rest and renewal.
- Additional funds may be needed to help with the costs of a Sabbatical. During a
 Sabbatical, the Minister is paid his full salary. But additional compensation may help
 with the cost of study, travel, and other expenses associated with a Sabbatical.
- A Sabbatical may lead to the participant returning with a desire to shift or change the emphasis of his/her job description. Church leadership should be aware and prepared to discuss such thoughts with the Minister.
 - 6. The highest levels of satisfaction appear to come from Sabbaticals that took the participants outside the usual realm of their past or present experiences. To visit the same old places for longer period of time is not as invigorating as doing at least some things differently during the sabbatical period.
 - A Sabbatical should be renewable. Sabbatical programs that may be repeated create less of a need to cram a 'once in a lifetime experience' into the first outing.

GUIDELINES

In order to be granted a Sabbatical, the Minster should submit to Session a detailed proposal of how the time will be used. Approval of the Sabbatical rests with Session or appropriate judicatory. The request should be submitted at least 6 months prior to the beginning of the Sabbatical. The proposal should indicate:

- The nature of the Sabbatical experience.
- The specific goals of the Sabbatical.
- The benefits of the Sabbatical to the Minister, his ministry and the local body of believers where he serves.
- 4. The time and duration of the Sabbatical.
- Suggestions for filling the ministerial responsibilities during the Sabbatical.

FEASIBILITY OF SABBATICALS

Survey responses from E.P.C. churches indicate that very few of them offer Sabbaticals to their staff. Some of them had never considered the possibility. Others indicated that the nature of their congregation would be such as to have great difficulty understanding why a Minister would be granted such an extended leave of absence from his/her work with pay. Churches that have a high percentage of professionals in the congregation seem to have greater proclivity to understand and provide Sabbatical opportunities.

Jay Beuoy, in the Summer 99 edition of 'Leadership Magazine', mentioned the importance in addressing attitudes about Sabbatical on three levels:

- With the Leadership Board: He reported that most on the Leadership Board were neither for or against a Sabbatical; they were basically uninformed of its purpose and importance. He suggests giving a pamphlet to the leaders which will help them understand a Sabbatical. Such a pamphlet would:
 - a. Outline the unique nature of the Minister's work load: 6 day workweeks, no free weekends, week nights away from family, few free holidays, with the results that ministry can be stressful, wearisome, and discouraging.
 - b. List the benefits of a Sabbatical: a grateful Minister with a renewed vision, a more grateful Minister's wife, happier children, enhanced training, a deepening awareness of the love of the congregation for the Minister.

Jay noted two lessons he had learned from the educating his leadership board; first, to use the help of an outside source such a pamphlet from denominational headquarters, and secondly, to give enough lead time for the leadership to process the information and request. A pamphlet entitled 'Sabbatical Policy for Pastors' is available from the Evangelical Free Church at Great Lakes District, 1120 S. Calumet Rd., Unit 1. Chesterton, In, 46304

- With the Congregation: The congregation will know even less than the Board about Sabbaticals. One of Jay's members came to an elder and said: 'I work two jobs to support my family and no one give me two months paid leave. I question Pastor Jay's work ethic.' Jay suggests distributing the same information to the congregation, directly, through the Newsletter, in discussions with members of the congregation.
- 3. With the Minister himself: Some ministers feel that the church will falter if they leave for a Sabbatical. Certainly the timing needs to be considered in light of the activities of the church. But with adequate planning, the church will continue its ministry during the absence of the Minister.

Jay concludes his Leadership article: "A Sabbatical may seem too good to be true. As pastors, we're used to struggle and weariness. Yet, with a slight change of attitude on these three levels, you can get that needed rest. You, your family and your church will appreciate it."

TESTIMONY

Erik Ohman is the pastor of Parker Presbyterian Church in Parker Colorado. He had just returned from his Sabbatical when H. B London interviewed him on the 'Pastor to Pastor' program of Focus on the Family (tape # 33). Eric had gone on a Sabbatical for three months during the summer. He spent some time in mountains above Parker, in Scotland, traveling, resting, reading, praying and journaling. The following notes are summarized from his interview by H. B. London:

- What led up to the plans for a Sabbatical? His wife noted that he looked tired all of the time. Others began to notice some classic symptoms of burnout- anger, frustration, weariness, loss of joy. He began to pray about a Sabbatical. The goals he clarified for a Sabbatical were to rest and to go deeper in his walk with Jesus Christ. Erik mentioned the importance of the pastor sharing with his leadership and laity his need for such a rest/recovery/renewal time in his ministry.
- 2. How would a Sabbatical be worked out in other and perhaps smaller churches? First talk with your spouse. Get her counsel regarding whether she thinks a Sabbatical is necessary. Discuss the concept with the Session and congregation. Build up to it. Talk about it down the road. Start planning for the contingencies during your absence. The people of God can do the work of God with appropriate training. In short, plan ahead; sell it to the leadership, make a case for its importance; trust leadership to carry on the ministry of the church.
- 3. What changes have taken place as a result of the Sabbatical? Erik said that the first change was that he has fallen more deeply in love with Jesus Christ. It is his opinion that the very best pastor, the most holy pastor is someone who is in love with Jesus Christ. Secondly he indicated that the Sabbatical has renewed his love for people. He finds himself more patient, more attentive, more focused in serving others for Christ's sake.

CONCLUSION

A Sabbatical is a period of time during which the Minister or staff person is relieved of his/her vocational responsibilities so he may experience new areas of ministry skills, education, exposure to the larger work of God in the Kingdom as well as find a measure of recovery from burnout and weariness in the ministry. A Sabbatical is not an entitlement for the Minister that comes with ordination. Ordinarily the wise use of vacations and Study Leave, as well as the judicious following of appropriate time and work boundaries in the ministry will contribute to the continuing well being of the Minister. But the Presbytery and the Session of the local church may recommend a Sabbatical if they truly deem it important for the well-being of the Minister and for the church. The experience of Ministers from many Denominational backgrounds testify to the value and feasibility of a Sabbatical.

PERFORMANCE REVIEW AND SALARY

Working Draft
Ministerial Vocations Committee-June 2000



HISTORY

The Standing Ministerial Committee of the 18th General Assembly discussed a number of issues related to the Minister in the local church. One of these dealt with the issue of the 'Performance Review' of the Minister and its relationship to salary recommendation for the coming year. GA asked the Ministerial Vocations Committee to investigate this area and come with some recommendations. The M.V.C. mailed a questionnaire to each E.P.C. church to solicit information about the annual performance review.

Although many of our larger E.P.C. churches have a fairly sophisticated 'Performance Review' process in place, some of our churches grapple each year with the practice of evaluating its Minister and staff as well with the issue of recommendations for annual increase (or decrease) in salaries. How and when should the Minister be evaluated? Who should conduct such an evaluation? Since the Minister is seeking to serve Christ, is a 'Performance Review' biblical? How should recommendations for salary increases be handled? Should equal increases be given to each staff of the same local church? Should increase be wedded to needs rather than performance? Should the annual cost of living increase be a factor of consideration? Should salary increases be wedded only to merit increases? Many questions and each one calls for serious and wise deliberation.

DEFINITIONS

The 'Performance Review' is a formal evaluation of the performance of the Minister(s) and other staff members. It is an evaluation of the work that has been accomplished, typically since the last evaluation period. The 'Performance Review' is conducted on the backdrop of the position description which spells out the expectations of the church toward its Minister(s) and other staff members. It is not a judgment regarding the ultimate spiritual life and God-directed service of the individual. As Paul so aptly said: 'who are you to judge someone else's servant.? To his own master he stands or falls. And he will stand for the Lord is able to make him stand' (Rom. 14:4). Furthermore Paul wrote to the Corinthians - I care very little if I am judged by you ... I do not even judge myself. It is the Lord who judges me.' I Cor. 4:3. Regardless of our career or vacation or employment, each of us will give an account to God of the way we have used our time, talents and treasure for His Kingdom.

The performance review, however, focuses on the work related to employment in the local church. It is a reality check. It is an opportunity to give and receive feedback about the major responsibilities, goals, projects, accomplishments and skills involved in related to the Minister or staff member's work. It is a time to speak the truth in love about the work of the ministry over the past evaluation period. In the parables, Jesus often taught the importance of accountability

Paul (2 Thes. 3:6-10) was hardest on those who thought they could draw on the resources of the Christian community without working. Accountability is unpopular today. None of us really likes to have his/her work evaluated by someone else. We don't mind being commended, but we don't really want to hear anything negative about our performance. When we receive pay from a church, however, we understand that we are being paid for the work that we are asked to do. And implicit in such an arrangement is an understanding that our work will naturally be evaluated.

The value of a regular 'Performance Review' are obvious:

- 1. It encourages a close examination of the original position description and an evaluation of the major responsibilities that came with the position. The following questions are preparatory for such an performance review: Why was the staff member brought to this local church? What was he/she asked to do? How well is he/she doing in accomplishing the responsibilities of his/her position description? Has his/her role in the church changed? Does his/her position description need to be changed to reflect new or different responsibilities assigned to him/her?
- 2. It permits discussion of expectations; the expectations of the church and the expectation of the staff member. In this setting, an honest exchange of how well these expectations are being met can be processed. Sometimes the staff member thinks he/she is doing a great job but his supervision has a different perspective. Or the opposite might be true. The 'Performance Review' provides a forum for discussing expectations and clearing the 'pipe lines' for open communication.
- 3. It fosters an evaluation of results within a limited time period. Every position description contains implicit and explicit responsibilities that will be undertaken during the time of ministry at the local church. A 'Performance Review' is an opportunity to reflect on these results as they have been carried out during the past 6 months 1 year, to discuss accomplishments and failures, successes and frustrations, and to set goals for the next work period. Ultimately we are called to faithfulness in our ministry to the Lord. But faithfulness is wedded to fruitfulness. The 'Performance Review' sets the stage for evaluating not only the time and plans invested in work, but also the fruit or lack of fruit in the assigned areas of ministry.
- 4. It provides a protection for the staff person. God looks with great disfavor on those who are lax in doing the Lord's work (Jer. 48.10). As iron sharpens iron, so one may sharpen another. A 'Performance Review' can be the occasion of sharpening the vision, skills, and commitment to diligently serving the Lord in the life of the Minister and other staff members. It also provides a 'paper trail' of evaluation in case a Minister or staff person were to come under the criticism of members of the congregation as to the effectiveness of his/her work.

PROCESS

The process of 'Performance Review' differs among our E.P.C. churches. The review of the Minister is handled by the Session or a sub-set of Session. In some cases, each Session member is asked to complete an evaluation form about the Minister, and the results are summarized and communicated to the Minister by the Personnel Committee or an Executive Committee composed of the Clerk, the chair of Finance Committee and the chair of the Personnel Committee. In other churches, the 'Performance Review' of the Minister is conducted by an Executive Committee composed of a smaller number of elders such as the sub-set mentioned above. It would be the advice of the MVC that the Minister be evaluated by a sub-set of Session, a few elders who would approach this task with great sensitivity and seriousness.

When there are other staff members, the Minister or immediate supervisor conducts their evaluation. In some cases, the Minister performs the review of all other pastors and program staff. Or there may be a division of labor within the staff for such reviews. A music director might evaluate the choir director and organist. An assistant Minister might evaluate program staff under his oversight. It would be the advice of the MVC that each staff person be evaluated by his/her immediate supervisor. To complete an adequate performance review, every church should be able to answer in the affirmative the following questions:

- Does each staff person, including the (Sr.) Pastor have a position description?
- 2. Does each staff person have goals that have emerged from the position description, which both the staff person and his/her supervisor understand and to which both have agreed should be pursued within the time period to be evaluated.

The results of all evaluations are usually communicated to the Personnel Committee. That Committee can present this information to Session when appropriate.

FORMS

The forms used in E.P.C. churches for the annual 'Performance Review' vary from simple to sophisticated. In general a performance form will provide space for comments on the following areas:

- Key result area: major responsibilities as mentioned in the Position Description.
 Space may also be allotted beside each major responsibility for specific duties related to each responsibility and comments about the achievement of these duties...
- 2. Key projects and initiatives new programs or events that were initiated in concert with goals and objectives. What are the new areas of ministry that are being undertaken? Was there a major event or program that was initiated this past year? How successful were they?
 - 3. General Factors and skills related to ministry. This includes a listing of areas

that impact the work of the ministry and may be focal points for evaluation and discussion. The following areas are typically included quantity of work, quality of work, motivation level, vision, goal setting, spiritual life, staff relationships, congregational relationships, problem solving, communication skills, public preaching and teaching, initiative, creativity, work habits, leadership, administration, mentoring/leadership development, planning and decision making.

- 4. Specific goals, ideas, emphases or changes for the next year. One of the major results of the 'Performance Review' should be to establish goals and objectives for the next year. As the position description is reviewed, as the projects and activities of the past year are evaluated, and as the needs, opportunities and vision for the coming year are assessed, specific goals should emerge that can be put in writing. To a large degree, these goals become the checkpoints for discussion at the next performance review.
- 5. Measurements of performance should be conducted on some type of scale. Some may use a three fold scale below average, average and above average; others may use a five-fold scale; unacceptable; unsatisfactory, satisfactory; above average; excellent. Most of us like to be 'feel-good' people who only affirm and commend our staff members. But for the sake of improvement and in a commitment to the good stewardship of our resources, E.P.C. churches through their Session and Minister are called to give honest feedback and evaluation to staff members. Some scale will need to be utilized that reflects a straight-forward evaluation. See the suggested form at the end of this article.
- 6. Other considerations. Often an evaluation form is used by both the evaluator and the evaluatee. Both are instructed to complete the form and then meet to discuss their observations. This process encourages the staff member to evaluate himself/herself and it also provides a basis for the evaluator to record his evaluation and interact with the evaluatee. The performance evaluation may also serve as an opportunity to discuss in more detail the personal development of the staff member. Under this heading, the following questions may be explored:

* what are your ministry aspirations for the next 3-5 years?

* what goals would you articulate for your personal and professional development during the next year?

* what plans might you formulate to accomplish goals mentioned above?

* how would you like to spend your next study leave?

The Performance Review should also be curtailed to deal with the staff person under evaluation. Sr. Leadership would be evaluated on issues related to vision, staff development, and over-all leadership of the church. Other program staff would be evaluated with a greater focus placed on the accomplishment of goals that were established at the beginning of the evaluation process. Support Staff would be evaluated with a priority placed on their work skills.

TIMING

The timing of a 'Performance Review' is important to the purposes of the review. Typically a

church year follows the momentum of the school year. Plans for programs and ministries are designed to be implemented during unfolding of the year, often beginning in September as families return from their summer vacation and as school calls children back to their studies.

A major 'Performance Review' should therefore be scheduled sometime in the late Spring. During this review, the work of the previous year can be evaluated and plans for the new year can be discussed. Some churches also conduct a mid-year review, during the early winter. A mid-year review gives a platform for feedback on the progress to date and for helpful discussion that might assist in the work that has been planned.

SALARY CONSIDERATIONS

Most churches have developed some form of salary review for their Minister and staff. The larger churches often have a written policy that informs such a process. But many churches wade through hours of discussion each year about the appropriate ways to handle salary increases(or decreases) for the Minister(s) and staff. Some of our churches are struggling to survive financially and would love to pay their Minister and staff a larger salary but can not. And some churches are paying their Minister and staff a very generous salary.

Salary considerations address two major issues. The first speaks to the adequacy of the base salary of the Minister and other staff members. Geography, size of church, and years of ministry will all impact this figure. Information showing average salary figures for churches correlated to church position and church size are compiled annually. A copy may be available at the E.P.C. office and would show you the range of salaries paid for church positions in comparable churches.

The second salary consideration speaks to the annual adjustment in compensation. How does the Session make these decisions? What is a reasonable process to follow in arriving at the recommendations for annual salary adjustments for the staff at a local church?

Each church will develop its own methods of processing these important decisions. One way would be to connect the annual 'Performance Review' with salary recommendations. If measurements on the 'Performance Review' were on a scale of say 1-5, then the Personnel Committee could ask that it be provided with a number (1-5) representing the summary of the 'Performance Review' for each Minister and staff person. In conjunction with the Finance Committee, the Personnel Committee could decide what amount of money would be available for increase in staff compensation.

Some churches take into consideration the annual cost of living increase by making it equal to a satisfactory rating on the review. The staff person who received a rating higher than satisfactory would receive a merit increase above the annual cost of living increase; and the staff person who received a rating lower than satisfactory would receive less than the annual cost of living increase.

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MODERATOR'S REPORT

Dear Christian Friends,

Lucy and I are profoundly grateful for the past year's opportunity to represent you across our great United States as well as in Brazil and Argentina. The Ward Church family has been very gracious to support our work and absence on behalf of the Assembly, and to support us in prayer. In the Providence of God, we were able to visit every presbytery. I discovered a good spirit of unity and cooperation, and an agreement on the real "essentials" which ought to occupy our time. Our Book of Government (1-5) states that there are four vital characteristics of the Church:

- 1. Rightly preaching the Word of God;
- 2. Rightly observing the Sacraments:
- 3. Practicing biblical discipline;
- 4. Maintaining loving fellowship.

I have found these healthy characteristics in every presbytery.

Several issues currently occupy our corporate and private concerns: the relationship of the Essentials of our Faith to the Westminster Confession of Faith; affordable major medical coverage; aggressive planting of new churches, and women in ministry. Of them all, the first two create the most discussion, the third we all agree on, and the last, so far, we have refused to allow to become a separating issue.

Regarding the Essentials issue, we have an Ad Interim Committee that will bring a recommendation to the 21st Assembly. On the major medical issue, we know in the end we will find the best and most agreeable way to assure affordable, quality care for us all. On the planting of new churches, every presbytery and several individual churches are pressing to make things happen, and the leadership within the presbyteries and from Bill Meyer, our National Outreach Director, is paying off. The final issue of ordination of women as teaching elders is focused at the presbytery level, where the authority to ordain teaching elders resides.

Some churches choose to ordain women, and some do not. Some presbyteries seem closed to women as teaching elders, while others are open. What if your church believes calling women as teaching elders is improper, and you are in a presbytery which ordains women? What if your church believes it should call a woman as a teaching elder, but you are in a presbytery which will not allow you to do so? A large part of the resolution of this issue lies in your understanding of God's leading through the jointly made decisions of presbytery. But there is also another part not to be left unsaid: are you able to allow that another church in your presbytery just might be led by God to accomplish its particular mission in a way which you believe is not your way? And, are you open to

granting that church the freedom to pursue that mission with your love? This question applies to both those for women's ordination and those against.

This issue has practical implications for the already difficult task of church planting. Some want to support new church plants that have only men as ruling and teaching elders, and some want to support new church plants that allow women as ruling and teaching elders. The question for presbyteries to answer is "How can our churches walk together in this matter and give real support to each other in planting new churches?"

Remember, the EPC has determined constitutionally that women's ordination is a nonessential. My plea is for vigilance to keep it so.

"In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all things, charity."

D. Presbytery Church Development Committee Chairman

January 7-8 saw the chairmen of the Presbytery CDC's gather in Detroit with the National Outreach Director to interact with each other, share ideas & plans, and generally discuss the state of church planting in their Presbyteries and the denomination as a whole. One of the conclusions reached was that we operate most often as individuals rather than as a family—individual larger churches actively doing their thing, individual Presbyteries doing their thing, the General Assembly through the NOC doing its thing. One of the commitments made by this group was to seek to accomplish more by doing more things together.

II. CHURCH VITALITY: To provide presbyteries and congregations the necessary resources to positively impact church vitality.

A. The Need

"85% of churches in America are on a growth plateau or are declining," ASCG

B. Bartlett Hess Award for Church Vitality

The Award was established by the General Assembly to recognize churches that are examples of Church Vitality. The NOC announces that Forest Hill Church, Charlotte, NC has been chosen for this Award. Several years ago the Lord gave the church a vision for outreach. At the same time there was a need for a new worship facility. Believing that the Lord could accomplish both, they contributed financially to a inner-city church, committed to planting daughter churches every 18 months. (Lake Forest Community and Warehouse 242 are two that have been planted, and a third is in the works.) Forest Hill also built the new worship facility. We commend them for fully committing to the vision the Lord has given them, and encourage all our churches to follow their example.

C. Resources for Church Vitality

There are many resources available. Churches are encouraged to contact Bill Meyer for ideas and suggestions that may be of help to your congregation.

- III. EVANGELISM: To equip and encourage churches to effectively reach their communities with the Gospel.
 - A. The Need

"Evangelical Churches have failed to gain an additional two percent of the American population in the past fifty years. In other words, we are not even reaching our own children." G. Barna, American Profile

B. Lighthouses - Houses of Prayer Everywhere

The NOC recommends this method as a way of involving every family in the congregation in personal evangelism. It follows the simple formula of Pray, Care and Share. Materials are available at the display area or contact Bill Meyer.

- IV. URBAN MINISTRY: To transform urban centers by establishing churches and aiding existing urban ministries to impact their communities for Christ. Urban ministry is providing hope by turning our hearts and extending our hands to the poor in urban centers with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.
 - A. The Need

It is estimated that 90% of the approximately 40 million urban poor in the USA are unchurched. This is a people group of 36 million people.

B. We have two urban EPC churches—New Hope, Pittsburgh, PA pastored by Rodger Woodworth, and Military Ave., Detroit, MI pastored by Randy Brown. You are encouraged to contact these pastors and learn of their ministries and the opportunities in the urban centers.

V. RECOMMENDATIONS

 In response to the 18th General Assembly's instruction that the NOC "develop a provision for national home missions," the NOC recommends that the Master Plan for National Outreach be amended by adding:

"Strategic Area #5 HOME MISSIONS: To enable workers to present the love of Christ to English-speaking people groups in the USA unreached by the established church.

Objectives:

- To identify unreached English-speaking people groups in the USA needing Christ's love.
- 2. To find and nurture qualified missionaries who will live with these groups.
- 3. To assist these workers in securing funds for their ministries;
- To work toward establishing churches among these peoples, or, if not possible, to link them with existing churches.

Rationale: Many people within the USA are unserved (or under-served) by the established church. For example, Native Americans, migrant workers, rural & urban poor, handicapped individuals, families of recent immigrants, homeless people, substance abusers, prison & jail inmates and their families. This will enable NOC to call Home Missionaries to minister to these peoples and to enable these Home Missionaries to raise necessary support from our congregations.

- In response to the 19th General Assembly's instructions to the NOC "to propose a plan for funding church planting" the NOC recommends the approval of this Plan for Funding Church Planting:
 - 1. A 3-year campaign to raise \$750,000 be started January 1, 2001;
 - Contributions to the fund will be sought from Presbyteries, churches and individuals;
 - 3. The Fund will be used as follows:
 - · Two-thirds for church/Presbytery/NOC partner projects.
 - · One-third for NOC initiated projects.
 - Church planters of NOC approved projects will be required to raise 50% of their compensation package for a period of three years. (Part of this may be accomplished by being a bi-vocational church planter.)

Rationale: The \$750,000 is approximately double what has been received through the Church Planting and Key City Benevolence Askings. The Committee believes that with a broad-based campaign that encourages grass-roots church planting as well as NOC-initiated plants, the church-at-large will respond. Furthermore, when church planters participate in the fundraising effort, several benefits are derived:

- · They become more fiscally aware:
- Supporting churches identify more closely with people;
- . The planter's commitment & aggressiveness is demonstrated.

MINUTES OF THE PERMANENT JUDICIAL COMMISSION OF THE EVANGELICAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH EPC Headquarters MAY 12, 2000

Members present: James Rimmel, chairman, Robert Hess, Darryl "Bud" Sparling, Dave Shira, Evelyn Cisney, Barry Smith, Leonard Pilgrim, and Reese Baker. One member absent—Don Mason.

- Opening: Introduction of members; prayer by Bud Sparling; Quorum of members determined and made by chairman Jim Rimmel.
- 2. Review of matters to be covered--Agenda
 - A. Insurance coverage
 - B. Overtures
 - C. Forms for Book of Discipline
 - D. Review of Book of Order §16-27 B on the responsibilities of the PJC
- 3. Overtures of Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic (undated)

Preliminary Comments: The PJC carefully reviewed and considered the overtures of the Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic. After careful review, the PJC believes that the suggestions are well intended and designed to maintain confidentiality, however the PJC believes that the dangers of possible abuse far outweigh this intent.

A. Overture Number 1:

Amend 6-1B [of the Book of Discipline], the first sentence, with the inclusion of the italicized phrase "with attached supporting evidence" so that the sentence reads

"No investigation against an accused offender shall be commenced unless some person files a written charge, with attached supporting evidence, with the Clerk of the court, ... etc."

The current version of 6-1B of the Book of Discipline reads as follows:

"No investigation against an accused offender shall be commenced unless some person files a written charge with the Clerk of the court, or unless the court finds it necessary under Book of Discipline §1-5 and §1-6 for itself to undertake an investigation."

A motion was made and seconded that overture number 1 be rejected by the General Assembly. After discussion, the motion was unanimously adopted by the commission recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 1.

The reasons for recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 1 are as follows:

 The language creates more ambiguity in the procedure. What is "supporting evidence?"

 The language creates a chilling effect on people who may be allegedly injured and may adversely affect their ability to obtain redress. The court is the accuser, not the injured person. The court is responsible for developing the evidence and determining if an indictment should issue.

indictment should issue.

4. The PIC disagrees that "written charges" is ambiguous. The written charges means that the injured person is simply to put the matter in

writing.

B. Overture Number 2:

Amend 6-1B by adding the following italicized sentences to the end of the section:

"The Clerk shall determine and he satisfied [sic] that the person(s) bringing a charge have followed Scriptural procedure required under Matthew 18:15-16, I Timothy 5:19 and Galatians 6:1. The Clerk shall then notify the Moderator of the court that a charge has been properly filed against a member of the court."

The current version of 6-1B of the Book of Discipline reads as follows:

"No investigation against an accused offender shall be commenced unless some person files a written charge with the Clerk of the court, or unless the court finds it necessary under Book of Discipline §1-5 and §1-6 for itself to undertake an investigation."

A motion was made and seconded that overture number 2 be rejected by the General Assembly. After discussion, the motion was unanimously adopted by the commission recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 2.

The reasons for recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 2 are as follows:

The Clerk does not have the authority to act for the court.

 The inquiry as to such actions should be made by the court in order to determine if the court will assume jurisdiction over the matter. See, Book of Discipline §1-6.

The suggested language does not allow for an appeal if the Clerk rejects the offended individual's statements as to his or her actions.

C. Overture Number 3

Amend 6-1C by adding the following italicized words, so that the section now reads:

C. Investigative Committee

Upon notification by the Clerk that a formal charge has been duly received against a member of the court, the Moderator shall appoint an investigative committee to serve as a finder of fact, which shall report its findings to the court with its recommendations. The committee shall have no authority to act for the court other than as an investigative body. Should a formal charge be filed against an officer of the court, the court as a whole shall receive the charge and elect the investigative committee.

The current version of 6-1C of the Book of Discipline reads as follows:

"C. Judicial Committee

The court may appoint a judicial committee to serve as a finder of fact, which shall report its findings to the court with its recommendations. The committee shall have no authority to act for the court other than as an investigative body."

A motion was made and seconded that overture number 3 be rejected by the General Assembly. After discussion, the motion was unanimously adopted by the commission recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 3.

The reasons for recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 3 are as follows:

1. The Moderator does not have the authority to act for the court.

The EPC / Presbyterian system is designed to function with courts
and bodies of elders making decisions, not individuals. The polity
of our system is to govern by collective wisdom in bodies. This
overture would allow an individual the ability to make significant
decisions instead of a body.

D. Overture Number 4

Amend 1-6, sentence beginning "No change involving a personal offense will be received . . . " by changing the phrase "to the court" to read "to the Clerk of the court,"

The current version of 1-6 of the Book of Discipline reads as follows:

"No charge involving a personal offense will be received unless the offended person alleges and proves to the court evidence demonstrating that the has followed the procedures required under Matthew 18:15-16 and Galatians 1:6."

A motion was made and seconded that overture number 4 be rejected by the General Assembly. After discussion, the motion was unanimously adopted by the commission recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 4.

The reasons for recommending that the General Assembly NOT adopt overture number 3 are as follows:

1. The Moderator does not have the authority to act for the court.

 The EPC and Presbyterian system is designed to function with cours and bodies of elders making decisions, not individuals. The polity of our system is to govern by collective wisdom in bodies. This overture would allow an individual the ability to make significant decisions instead of a body.

 Oversure of the Presbytery of the West dated May 6, 2000 (re-ordered in minutes at the decision of the PJC).

Recommendation adopted unanimously by the PJC:

The PJC believes that the overture from the Presbytery of the West raises no constitutional issues in its present form. The PJC suggests that such overture be referred by the Stated Clerk to appropriate committees for further study and/or action.

The PJC also suggests that this overture be presented to the General Assembly for consideration before the overture on insurance issues from the Presbytery of the Central South.

Overture of the Presbytery of the Central South dated April 29, 2000.

A motion was made that the PJC has reviewed and determined that it has jurisdiction to review of the Overture of the Central South adopted at the spring stated meeting Saturday, April 29, 2000 ("Central South Overture"). The motion was seconded. The Motion that the PJC has jurisdiction to review the overture was adopted by a vote of 7 to 1. (Bud Sparling voted against the motion.)

A motion was made to adopt the Central South Overture. Discussion occurred on the motion. No action was taken on such motion

[Lunch break]

After lunch, the PJC further reviewed the overture. After further discussion, the PJC unanimously adopted the following recommendation to the General Assembly:

This overture is premature inasmuch as it is in reality a disciplinary matter growing out of Chapter 13, Part 1.A 5 and 6 of the Book of Government. The Presbyteries have original jurisdiction in such matters. (See, Book of Discipline Section 3-2) The General Assembly has not provided notice to the appropriate Presbyteries that action is in order to insure compliance with Assembly Act 81.06 (See, Book of Discipline Sections 3-2 and 3-3). Unless and until the General Assembly provides notice to the Presbyteries and the Presbyteries fail to act after thirty days, the General Assembly does not have jurisdiction to act.

It is also beyond the scope of the General Assembly's authority to the extent that it mandates a Presbytery to "pay the premiums to re-enroll the ministers of non-compliant churches" under the EPC Group Insurance Plan. In other words, the Commission believes the issue of whether a Presbytery is obligated to pay insurance premiums within its boundaries is not within the scope of churches of the General Assembly as set forth under the Book of Government Section 16-22.

In addition to the above, the recommendation places two permanent committees with responsibility to deal with the matter. Committees do not have the authority to act for the General Assembly. Judicial committees may act as a finder of fact but not do not have the authority to act for the court. (See, Book of Discipline, Section 6-IC) The General Assembly could appoint a judicial commission under the Book of Discipline, Section 9-5, to act for the General Assembly, but no such request or motion has been made.

Finally, the General Assembly does not have the authority to require Presbyteries to pay funds.

 Review of the opinion of the Stated Clerk as to the Mid America action on David Baer.

The PJC reviewed extensive papers on the matter and discussed in depth the issues related to David Baer and his admission to the Presbytery of Mid-America. After such discussion among the PJC and discussions with the Stated Clerk, the following motion was made by Robert Hess and seconded by Dave Shira:

Motion to sustain the provisional opinion of the Stated Clerk dated April 6, 2000. The motion was adopted unanimously by the PJC.

Rational:

The action of Mid America Presbytery in receiving the Reverend David Baer was not in violation of §13-5 of the Book of Government.

Comments: Presbyteries are granted the right under §16-16 A of the Book of Government to receive, install and ordain ministers.

PJC notes that this matter is not before the PJC in the form of a complaint.

PIC recommends the part of the NAPARC policy paper that deals with ministers fleeing from justice, or some other action to give comity to other denominations actions, be considered for adoption by the EPC.

7. Development of Forms for Book of Discipline.

The PJC appointed Jim Rimmel and Reese Baker to develop forms for use under the Book of Discipline for further review by the PJC. The PJC adjourned until Saturday morning.

8. Adoption of Forms.

The PJC reviewed, altered and adopted the forms attached to this report for use under the Book of Discipline. The PJC recommends that the General Assembly adopt such forms and incorporate such forms into the Book of Discipline.

9. Designation of Meeting of PJC

Bob Hess made a motion that the PJC meet after all Presbyteries have met in May. The motion was seconded and unanimously adopted by the PJC.

10. Change in Book of Discipline

Jim Rimmel made a motion that Section 7-5 C of the Book of Discipline change the reference from Section 7-6 B to Section 7-5 B. The motion was adopted unanimously and is to be presented to the General Assembly for action.

Final Decision of the Standing Judicial Commission on the Baer Case

Attached you will find a copy of the Final Decision of the Standing Judicial Commission of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in America in Case 98-9, Appeal of Teaching Elder David Baer v. Illiana Presbytery. The Judicial Panel that heard the case unanimously denied Mr. Baer's appeal June 8, 1999, According to our judicial procedure, a panel's decision is reviewed by the full SJC. The Standing Judicial Commission met March 2 and unanimously approved the panel's decision. According to our polity, this is a final decision to which there may be no further complaint or appeal.

We await your response regarding your receiving Mr. Baer into the EPC as a minister in good standing when he was under judicial process in the PCA.

Minutes and Report of the Presbytery Review Committee

The Presbytery Review Committee (PRC) met at the General Assembly Office from 9:00 a.m. Thursday, June 8 to 4:15 p.m. June 9, 2000. Committee members present were RE Buck Russell (Chairman), TE Steven Riser and TE George Woodcock. Also attending were TE Ed Davis (Stated Clerk) and TE Ed McCallum (Assistant to the Stated Clerk).

Buck Russell opened the meeting with prayer at 9:10 a.m. June 8.

A. Review of Responses to Exceptions from 19th General Assembly

The Committee reviewed the responses by the various Presbyteries to the exceptions conveyed by the 19th General Assembly.

Presbytery of the Central South (TE Dennis Flach, Stated Clerk)

 No record of session endorsement and no advisor appointed for candidates (44-11 and 45-21) (G.12-2,A and G.12-2,D) (Bristol, Eubank, Land, Masterson, Pekary and Roberts).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Concur that minutes did not fully reflect that sessions have indeed endorsed these candidates and that advisors were appointed for each. The Presbytery Minutes have subsequently included what had been noted.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

 No indication that congregation approved dissolution of pastoral relationship with David Hicks, David Keyser and David Monela (45-19) (G.15-2)

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: In each case, pastors and congregations concurred. The B.O.G. citation explains a variety of dissolution scenarios between ministers and congregations. It remains the practice of presbytery to specify only exceptions to otherwise agreeable dissolution.

The committee considered the response to be inadequate. Minutes should specifically indicate that all requirements of 15-2 have been met. Without such detail the Assembly cannot properly review Presbytery minutes for conformity to constitutional standards.

Recommendation #1: That the Assembly refer the minutes of the 45th Stated Meeting (section 19) to the Presbytery of the Central South for correction

 Three commissions appointed by Presbytery to examine candidates for ordination, however they should have been committees. They made recommendations and did not take action for the Presbytery. Therefore no written report would be required (46-23).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: This exception comes as a relief in record keeping for Presbytery and has subsequently become the practice of examining incoming candidates and ministers.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

No indication that candidates Rufus Smith, Chris Pekary, Brian Land, Adam Roberts and Tom Masterson
had preached a sermon (G.13-2) or passed written exams (G.13-2). The commissions to ordain and install
them did not include the record of the churches of the commission members (46-23) (G.16-26.B-2.e)

<u>Presbytery's Response.</u> These candidates preached sermons, passed written exams; hence their presbytery examinations proceeded. Subsequent recording of minutes will carefully include those steps. Likewise, presbytery minutes will be careful to record churches represented by commissioners appointed by presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

Presbytery of the East (RE Frank Johnson, Stated Clerk)

 For three meetings (52, 53 and 54) there were no unexcused absences reported even though there were absences not approved by the Council (Rules for Assembly 8-11.6-1).

Presbytery's Response: There are persons reported as excused for meeting 54. For meetings 52 and 53 add the name of Rev. Ebenezer Afful as being unexcused absent.

 There is no record that there was any type of recognition or appreciation for TE David Hadden upon his retirement (p. 171) (G.15-9).

Presbytery's Response: The exception is accurate. However, the then Chairman of the Ministerial Committee, Rev. Nancy Stewart, spoke with Dr. Hadden and wished him well. The Ministerial Committee will invite Dr. Hadden to the January, 2000 meeting of the Presbytery whereupon recognition will be given for his service to the Kingdom. Should Dr. Hadden be unable to attend the meeting the Ministerial Committee shall compose a letter of recognition for Dr. Hadden to be signed by the Moderator and Stated Clerk.

3. No record of terms of call for John Torres or Rick Stauffer (pp. 171-2) (Rules for Assembly 8-11.G-9)

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The terms of call (approved by the Presbytery but not in the minutes) at the time the two pastors assumed their current positions will be spread in the minutes of the Presbytery meeting of October 2, 1999 with reference to their omission in the minutes of the meetings in which they were approved for ordination and/or installation.

4. No record that a commission was approved to ordain / install John Torres (p. 171) (G-14.1; G.16-26,B.2-a).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The names of the Commission originally approved by the Presbytery will be spread in the minutes of the Presbytery meeting of October 2, 1999 with reference to their omission in the minutes in which Rev. Torres was examined and approved for ordination and installation.

 Moderator does not have authority to appoint a commission (p. 172 Stauffer and p. 177 Winship). Only Presbytery has this authority (G.16-26,B).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The action of the Moderator in the two instances cited will be confirmed at the Presbytery meeting of October 2, 1999.

6. There is no approved call for Dr. Sam Rowen (p. 182, D-3) (G.11-1 and G.11-4).

Presbytery's Response: There is an approved call in the minutes of September 26, 1998.

7. No indication that there was 10 day notice of the called meeting June 26, 1998 and its purpose (G.16-17).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Agreed. A docket was prepared and approved, however, by the Presbytery at the meeting. The Presbytery of the East will not proceed in this manner again.

 No written report from commission appointed to ordain / install John Torres, to install TE Mike Winship and to install TE Rick Stauffer (G.16-26.B).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The appropriate form containing the minutes of each service will be appended to the minutes of the meetings in which the ordination and/or installation was approved for each pastor by the Presbytery.

 No record of annual review of active, inactive out-of-bounds or retired ministers (G.16-27,A.1 and p. 54 of Procedure Manual for Ministerial and Candidates Committees).

Presbytery's Response: Such a review has been conducted by the Ministerial Committee but no written report was spread in the minutes. The current Committee is in the midst of a review utilizing the appropriate forms of the General Assembly. At the January meeting of the Presbytery each year, a report will be given by the Ministerial Committee including a copy of the completed review and report and include in the minutes a y disagreements over calls and action taken about them by the Presbytery.

10. Terms of call forms have not been utilized (Acts of the Assembly 98-03).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: While the forms have not been used in each instance, the format regarding the components has been used. Each pastor has been assured that a call includes the items listed on the form. Forms will be used in the future and will be initially and annually distributed by the Ministerial Committee and received by them for inclusion in the annual report.

The Committee accepted all the above responses as adequate.

Recommendation #2: Because corrections noted in Presbytery's responses to exceptions issued by the 19th Assembly were <u>not</u> spread in the certified minutes as indicated, the 20th General Assembly instructs the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of the East to include the corrections in the minutes of the Fall 2000 meeting.

Presbytery of Florida (TE Bob Garment, Stated Clerk)

 Commission reports were received but written reports were not inserted in the minutes (24.08 and 26.09) (G.16-26,B)

<u>Presbytery's response</u>: (24:09) The Commission to install Jim Letizia as pastor of New Covenant EPC did not present a written report. In lieu of such, the minutes of that commission are inserted in and made a part of the minutes of the 28th Stated Meeting of Florida Presbytery.

(26.09) The Administrative Commission to Cypress Pointe EPC did make a report which is found in 26.28.

The Committee considers this response to be <u>inadequate</u>. There is no evidence that this has been done because the certified copy of minutes ends with 26.24.

Recommendation #3: That the 20th General Assembly instruct the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Florida to submit the relevant section of minutes (all sections following 26.24) to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly by July 31, 2000.

 The Presbytery does not have the right to drop a person from the role without censure before the person has been on the inactive role for 5 years (TE Henry Braga, 24.15) (G.15-8). The PRC recommends that the Assembly remand this issue to the Presbytery for correction and to restore his membership in the Presbytery.

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Florida Presbytery has corrected its premature action and restored TE Henry Braga to the Inactive Roll until the 5-year waiting period expires.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

 Terms of call forms not utilized for TE's Dan Lacich, Bruce Gimbal, Jonathan Tagg and Dave Franklin (26.01, 26.14) (Acts of Assembly 98-03; see attachments 2 & 17 in Procedure Manual for Ministerial and Candidate Committees)

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Acts of Assembly 98-03 requires the use of specific forms. It does not require replication of those forms in the minutes. The minutes accurately report the terms in a manner we feel is constitutional and clear.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

4. No indication that Tagg, Gimbal or Franklin had successfully passed written examinations (26.14) (G.13-2).

Presbytery's Response: Mr. Tagg, Mr. Gimbal, and Mr. Franklin all passed the required written exams and that information is included in the minutes of the 28th Stated Meeting of Florida Presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

The moderator is not authorized to appoint or dismiss commissions (26.14, 24.09) (G.16-26.B).

Presbytery's Response: (24.09) Since G.16-26,B requires that Commissions be appointed for a specified duration, there should be no need for formal dismissal of a commission to install once the installation is accomplished and reported back to Presbytery. The wording of 24.09 should more accurately state that "the Work of the Commission being complete, it was dissolved with the thanks of the court." That correction is noted in the minutes of the 28th Stated Meeting of Florida Presbytery.

(26.14) The court appointed the Commission and authorized the Moderator to name members to that commission. The corrected wording is noted in the minutes of the 28th Stated Meeting of Florida Presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. While the practice of Presbytery forming a commission but leaving the responsibility of appointing members to an officer of the court (26.14) appears to be constitutional, the Committee has reservations about the wisdom of the procedure, especially if it becomes a standard practice.

6. There is no record that the requirements of G.5-3, B have been met (Cypress Pointe, 26-01)

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The information requested by PRC was not received from the Administrative Commission. The Church Development Committee has been instructed to investigate the omission of this information and report back to the 29th Stated Meeting.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

 There is no record of annual review of the work of the minister (active, inactive, out of bounds and retired) (G.16-27,A.1; G.15-9).

Presbytery's Response: The Ministerial Committee did review the needs of retired ministers during the period of June 1998 to June 1999 but failed to make a formal report to Presbytery. That information can be found in the minutes of the 28th Stated Meeting of Florida Presbytery. Florida Presbytery has no Out of Bounds ministers. Florida Presbytery was unaware that it had any inactive ministers until the PRC noted the error in Exception 2. The Presbytery of Florida has instructed the Ministerial Committee to review the work of active and inactive ministers and report back to the February 2000 Stated Meeting. Those instructions are recorded in the minutes of the 28th Stated Meeting of Florida Presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

8. Terms of call forms have not been utilized (Acts of the Assembly 98-03)

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Acts of Assembly 98-03 requires the use of specific forms. It does not require replication of those forms in the minutes. The minutes accurately report the terms in a manner we feel is constitutional and clear.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

Presbytery of Mid America (RE Dexter Kuhlman, Stated Clerk)

- No indication that the called meeting of August 11, 1998 was given 10 days notice and the purpose of the meeting specified (p. 137) (G.16-17).
- Committee Chairman does not have authority to change the composition of the committee (p. 138) (G. 16-27.a).
- There is no such designation as "student pastor" (p. 138). Mr. Taylor's status need to be clarified (G.10-3; G.11-6, 7, 8).
- It is not clear whether Michael Taylor is a candidate for ordination. If so, no approval by Presbytery has been recorded (p. 138) (G.12-2).
- It is not clear whether Brad Buescher is being examined as a candidate for ordination (p. 138; G.13-7) or by transfer (G.13-4, 5). No indication of approval for either ordination or transfer.

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: (Exceptions 1-5 and 8): These all pertain to the minutes of the August 6, 1999.
Called Meeting of Presbytery. The Presbytery Review Committee requested the Clerk to rewrite the minutes to better reflect what actions had taken place.

Recommendation #4: That the Assembly instruct the Clerk of the Mid-America Presbytery to forward a certified copy of the rewritten and approved minutes of the Aug. 6, 1999 Called Meeting to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly by July 31, 2000.

 Terms of call forms not utilized (p. 139 Buescher, p. 140 Heyward, p. 145 Werner) (Acts of Assembly 98-03).

Presbytery's Response: In the future we will use the denomination call form.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

7. No indication of whether TE Heyward was examined under G.13-2, 13-4 or 13-5 (p. 139).

Presbytery's Response: Mr. Heyward was examined under BOG 13-5. Noted on page 3 paragraph 5.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

8. No written commission report to install TE Doug Graham (p. 140) (G.16-26, B).

See Recommendation #4 above.

 Commission is not properly constituted (p. 143). There was no purpose stated, only 3 members appointed (minimum is 5) with no indication of which churches they represent (G.16-26.B.2-a).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Current Commission members for Trinity Fellowship are Corb Heimburger, TE Central, Dave Boswell, TE New Harvest, Stan Davis, RE Sutter. Presbytery will appoint two additional RE at its fall meeting and so report this action in the minutes. The purpose of the commission is to serve as an oversight commission of the mission church (BOG 16-26, G 5-2).

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

No indication that the congregation approved dissolution of pastoral relationships with TE Tom Ricks (p. 144) or TE John Splinter (p. 143) (G.15-2).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The congregation approved dissolving the pastoral relationship between TE Tom Ricks and TE John Splinter at a congregation meeting October 11, 1998. Copy of the congregational minutes is attached to the fall 1998 stated meeting of presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

Commission for Trinity Fellowship is improperly constituted (minimum 5 members) (pp. 143, 149) (G.5-2;
 G.16-26,B.2-a).

See #9 above.

12. No indication that Brad Werner had successfully completed written exams (p. 145; G.13-2). Call and terms of call not approved by Presbytery (G.11-7). The commission to ordain / install did not include home churches of commission members (G.16-26,B.2-e).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The commission to install Brad Werner were as follows: Bill Vogler, TE Grace EPC, Doug Graham, TE Central, Barney Heyward, TE Central, Larry Swinson, RE Grace EPC, Mike Auon, RE Central and Alan Shaffer, RE Central. Brad passed his written exams. Terms of call are attached to the October 16-17, 1998 meeting of presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

No record of annual review of work of ministers (active, inactive, out of bounds and retired) (G.16-27, A.1;
 G.15-9).

Presbytery's Response: This is recorded in the April 1999 minutes of presbytery.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic (TE Howard Shockley, Stated Clerk)

 No indication that Peter Bowell, Keith Cobb or Grady Davidson had successfully completed the written exams for ordination (29-21; 31-23) (G.13-2).

Presbytery's Response: Minutes corrected to include this information.

2. Terms of call forms not used (29.25.1.B, E; 29.25.1.I, Q; 30.21.B) (Acts of Assembly 98-03).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Future Minutes will show specifically that official terms of call forms are used. It should be noted that while it has not been recorded in its Minutes, Presbytery has used these forms since their inception.

3. Home church for commission members not included (G.16-26,B.2-e).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Future Minutes will show home church for Ruling Elder Commissioners. Teaching Elder commissioners are members of Presbytery unless otherwise indicated.

4. Ministerial Committee cannot constitute itself as a commission (29.25, last motion p. 22) (G.16-27,A.10).

Presbytery's Response: That Presbytery amend its Bylaws by deleting Section 3-A.3 of Article IV.

Exception #5:A committee cannot constitute a commission (29.26.1 & 10; 30.21.1.0) (G.16-26,B).
 Presbytery by-laws (Article IV, Section 3 C.b), which allow for the Church Development Committee to form commissions need to be brought into conformity with G.16-26.

Presbytery's Response: That Presbytery amend its Bylaws by deleting Section 3-A,3 of Article IV.

 No indication that the commission formed for the disposition of Christ EPC was appointed by Presbytery (31.13.A.1) (G.16-26,B).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Presbytery believes the PRC may have made an incorrect reading of Minutes 31.13.A.1, which read, in part, as follows:

"That Presbytery approved disposition of the Christ EPC property as follows: 1. That a commission be created, composed of the following members: Don Creamer (Chairman), Cheryl Angus, David Dwight,

Knox Sherer and Jerry Thompson; that said commission be authorized to complete the sale of Christ EPC property, except property being leased to Sprint Communications."

We would submit that while the word "appoint" could have been used, the committee was in order by its use of the word "create" in the immediate and overall context of the threefold recommended action presented to Presbytery. We would also submit that Presbytery acted upon a clear contextual understanding of synonymy to create/appoint an administrative commission to dispose of the Christ EPC property in accord with BG 16-16.B.

Minutes corrected to show the home church of commission members as follows (PRC Exception 3, above): RE Don Creamer (Chairman, Grace), RE Cheryl Angus (Hope), TE David Dwight, RE Knox Sherer (Forest Hill), RE Jerry Thompson (Abundant Life).

 The Presbytery to which the inactive member belongs should restore him to the active roll and then transfer him to another Presbytery at their request to receive a valid call (30,21,2) (G.15-8).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Minutes corrected to indicate TE Robert Bryan restored to Active Status as of October 17, 1998 (BG 15-8) prior to his being transferred to the Presbytery of the Southeast.

The Committee accepted all the responses above as adequate.

Presbytery of the Midwest (RE Alton Bennett, Stated Clerk)

 No indication of which church endorsed the candidacy of Scott Poblenz (p. 88) (G.12-2,A). No advisor appointed (G.12-2,D).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: At the time of Scott Poblenz' examination, his pastor, Dr. Don Giesmann, attested to "his life and love for the work of Christ and the church." Dr. Giesmann was pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Trenton, MI (p. 88). The advisor for Scott Poblenz was TE Dr. Thomas Burbridge and was approved in the 78th Stated Meeting.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

No indication that Herb Frost had successfully passed written exams (p. 89; G.13-2). No indication that he
preached a sermon (G.13-2), no approval for ordination. Page 186 says he was called to Ward Church, p.
191 says he was called to Immanuel Church.

Presbytery's Response: The completion of written exams is under the jurisdiction of the Candidates Care Committee. It is the policy of the Presbytery, that all preliminary work must be approved before presentation for ordination/examination. Herb Frost preached during the worship service as indicated on the Order of Worship attachment (p. 95). Herb Frost was called as an Assistant Pastor of Ward Church. The reference in the report of annual review – terms of call (p. 191) indicates his assignment is to Immanuel Church, Ward's daughter church.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. The body of the Minutes, at the point of action being taken, should be clear and explicit in showing that all constitutional requirements have been met.

 Terms of call forms not utilized (p. 90, Reynolds; p. 91, Hicks; p. 223, Brown; p. 224, Mattis) (Acts of the Assembly 98-03). <u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The Terms of Call are recorded in the minutes and the Terms of Call forms are filed in their personnel file. The Ministerial Committee and Presbytery will consider the alteration of this practice.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate,

4. No record of any recognition or ceremony upon retirement of TE Hugh Gowman (p. 91) (G.15-9).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: None was held, since the church he pastored withdrew from the EPC denomination at the same time he retired. Due to the circumstances, it did not seem appropriate.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. The withdrawal of a church has no relation to the status of a minister being placed on the retired roll. It is appropriate to honor his years of service on the floor of Presbytery.

5. Committees do not have authority to appoint commissions (p. 91, Hicks) (G.16-26,B).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The question was addressed in response to the 1998 Presbytery Review Committee. These minutes were already recorded in the permanent record at that time.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

No indication that 10 days notice and purpose for a called meeting was provided (p. 116) (G.16-17).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The practice of the Presbytery is to include Presbytery notices as an attachment to the called meeting. This was an oversight by the Stated Clerk.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate

7. No indication of which church endorsed Paul Burr as a candidate for ministry (p. 173) (G.12-2,A).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The previous Candidates Care Chairman included this information in his approved report. The Stated Clerk failed to notice the change in procedure by the new committee chair.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. Minutes should be corrected to include the name of the church.

 There was no motion to approve Douglas Walker for ordination (p. 174). Terms of call form not utilized (Acts of Assembly 98-03).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Douglas Walker was approved ON MOTION (p. 174). The oral examination for Douglas Walker for ordination was sustained. See number 3 re: Terms of Call Form.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. In the case of examination for ordination, a specific motion should be made to approve the person for ordination pending a call.

9. No indication of the provision under which Steve Brown was examined (p. 222) (G.13-2, 4 or 5).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: TE Steve Brown was examined under G.13-4 as indicated by the statement "the Rev. Steve Brown was introduced to be examined on views by the Presbytery pursuant to the call of North Oaks Community Church.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. Minutes should be explicit about the status of a minister prior to their examinations and the constitutional authority for the particular examination administered. The minutes remain unclear about whether TE Brown was transferred from another Reformed body.

10. No advisor appointed for James Cupschalk (p. 225) (G.12-2,D).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: No advisor was appointed due to the fact that James Cupschalk was transferred with all studies completed. He is completing his examinations at the present time as Assistant Pastor at Mt. Pleasant Community Church.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate

11. Minutes not signed by Moderator (p. 226).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The moderator was not available prior to submitting the certified copy. The signature was obtained prior to the General Assembly report.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

12. No annual report of status of retired ministers (G. 15-9).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: This report was delayed due to the lack of response by the ministers. The 1999 report was completed and mailed on 8/10/99 and the Presbytery has been notified that the annual publishing date of this report will be in March.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

13. No record of review of Out of Bounds ministers (G.10-3,F).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: This report was delayed due to the lack of response by the ministers. The 1999 report was completed and mailed on 8/10/99 and the Presbytery has been notified that the annual publishing date of this report will be in March.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

Presbytery of the Southeast (TE Russell Ragon, Stated Clerk)

 Reporting of attendance needs to be improved, especially as it pertains to excused and unexcused absences (44-19; 45-19) (Rules for Assembly 8-11-G-1).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Excused absences are noted beginning with the 48th stated meeting all others are unexcused.

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. For clarity, minutes should use the formal agreed to at the Stated Clerk's workshop.

2. The form for the out of bounds call for Cobby Ware is missing. (44-21,45-21) (Acts of the Assembly 98-03)

Presbytery's Response: The needed form has been included in the minutes for the 48th stated meeting.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

The assets and church property discussed in 45-11 were not disposed of in accordance G.5-5 (Hope and 1st Presbyterian, Louisville).

Presbytery's Response: Not True, Dear Brothers and Sisters. At its 37th stated meeting in Cartersville GA on Feb. 10, 1996 the property of First Presbyterian Church, Louisville, KY was disposed of properly. (37.21). The title of the remaining property was transferred to the Presbytery of the Southeast by motion of Presbytery. However, since First – Louisville was unwilling to convey its property and assets to the Presbytery, the trustees of the presbytery attempted to take a pastoral role in dealing with the aging congregation (41.11) During this time, the congregation sold its property and gave the funds earned from the sale away. (43.12). After the congregation had illegally sold all of its property and disposed of it without the permission of presbytery and contrary to the Book of Order, the presbytery consciously made the decision not to file suit in secular court. Such was our decision based on scripture. They, not we, were in error. "Why not rather be wronged?"

The Committee accepted the response as <u>adequate</u> but with comment. It appears that Presbytery acted properly in 1996. However, it also appears that Presbytery's delay in implementing constitutional polity resulted in assets being disposed of in a manner contrary to G.5-5. The Committee recognizes the prerogative of Presbytery not to file suit. However, it also urges Presbytery to be more diligent in its stewardship of its assets.

 Church Revitalization Committee acting as a commission did not provide a written report of their action to be inserted in the minutes (45-23) (G.16-26,B).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The Commission to dissolve Hope Church provided minutes as of October 8, 1999, and they are inserted into the minutes of the 48th stated meeting.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

There is no indication that Dan Gilchrist and Jack Piers were examined by Presbytery, that they responded
to questions from the Moderator, that a charge was given to them or that advisors were appointed. (45-21)
(G.12-2,C, D).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Dan Gilchrist and Jack Piers were examined by Presbytery, they responded to questions from the Moderator, a charge was given to them and advisors were appointed. That such was the case has been noted in the minutes (45.21).

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

 Ruling #3 of the Stated Clerk is in error (46-11). Parity is adjusted annually, not whenever the roll of teaching elders changes (G.16-14). Ruling #4 is not clear and should be rewritten (46-11).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: Ruling 99-3 has been deleted from the minutes. Ruling 99-4 has been rewritten and attached to the minutes of the 48th.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate

7. No indication of which EPC church endorsed Alan Wallace as a candidate for ministry (46-12) (G.12-2,A).

Presbytery's Response: The fact that Alan Wallace was endorsed by Brainerd Presbyterian has been noted in the minutes.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

8. No terms of call or form included for Tommy Jordan (G.11-5, E; Acts of Assembly 98-03).

Presbytery's Response: Form has been attached to the minutes of the 48th stated meeting.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

9. No indication that 10 days notice was provided for the called meeting of Dec. 4, 1998 (G.16-17).

Presbytery's Response: Ten days notice was given and the fact has been noted in the minutes

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

10. Churches of commission members were not included (46-33) (G.16-26,B.2-e).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: The churches of the commission members were: TE Julian Reese, RE Augie Barker, RE Kent Ivey, RE John Green, all of Christ Presbyterian, Knoxville, and TE Jim Hoilman and RE Dan Wells, both of Lynn Garden Presbyterian, Kingsport.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate.

11. There is no record of annual review of the status of retired ministers (G.15-9).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: In the minutes (44.21-6) there is a record of the annual review of the status of retired ministers.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate

12. At the Dec. 4, 1998 called meeting, the Ministerial Committee was appointed as a Judicial Commission was formed. There is no subsequent written report from the Commission inserted in the minutes (G.16-26,B). As the summary is currently written in the minutes, it is unclear what actions have been taken.

Presbytery's Response: A copy of the minutes of the commission for Dec. 4, 1998 have been included in the minutes of the 48th stated meeting.

The Committee accepted the response as adequate

Recommendation #5: Because corrections noted in Presbytery's responses to exceptions issued by the 19th Assembly were <u>not</u> included in the certified minutes of the 48th Stated Meeting as indicated, the 20th General Assembly instructs the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of the Southeast to include the corrections in the minutes of the Fall 2000 meeting.

Presbytery of St. Andrews, Argentina (TE Juan Jose Meijas, Stated Clerk)

The 14th General Assembly took action requiring that all Presbyteries keep records in English in addition to any other language used. A computer translation program has been used which has not rendered satisfactory minutes. This year a translation of one set of Minutes was furnished to the Committee. The Committee commends St. Andrews and looks forward to a complete set of English minutes subject to review in 2001.

Presbytery of the West (TE Marc Huebl, Stated Clerk)

 No indication that Ramona Spilman successfully completed the written exams for ordination (54-10) (G.13-2).

Presbytery's Response: Please know that the Care of Candidates Committee would never have allowed a Candidate for Ordination to be examined by the Presbytery if they had failed their written exams. Nor would the Presbytery's Stated Clerk. However, to be helpful in your review, the Presbytery will do its best to record such information in its Minutes when candidates are examined by the Presbytery in future record keeping.

2. Many reports not opened in prayer.

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: We will be more diligent to have the presenter of the report be sure to open their report in prayer, and have the Clerk more diligent to be sure to record it when they do.

 At the June 11, 1998 called meeting the Moderator and Stated Clerk were authorized to appoint an administrative commission. Only the presbytery can appoint commissions (G.16-26,B).

<u>Presbytery's Response</u>: There is no argument and so the motion is out of order and needs to be corrected by the <u>Presbytery</u>.

 Attachment 16 to the 56th Stated meeting minutes should have included the Out of Bounds Call Form (Attachment 17, Procedure Manual for Ministerial and Candidates Committees; Acts of Assembly 98-03)

Presbytery's Response: Since the call was unchanged, just the geographical location of the Ministry's business office, the need to have this call on its proper form was overlooked. We will be more circumspect and have the minister and his calling agency send us a new Outside the Boundaries Call form.

The Committee accepted all the responses above as adequate.

- Called Meeting 8/28/99 Attendance does not contain excused or unexcused absences (Rules for Assembly 8.11.G.I)
- Attachment 6 for the 48th Stated meeting is missing from the certified copies. The Clerk is instructed to forward the attachment to the Office of the Stated Clerk no later than July 31, 2000.
- 7. 48.22 Insufficient information in minutes to determine if actions taken conform to constitutional standards: 1) status of Dr. Overton prior to being "reestablished" is not indicated, 2) no record present of actions to dissolve pastoral relationship of Christ EPC and Rev. Petterson, 3) no basis cited for moving Rev. Roberts to inactive roll, 4) no record present of actions taken to dismiss Rev. Roberts as Assistant Pastor, 5) no record that Allan Thompson is ordained, 6) no record of actions taken to dissolve pastoral relationship of Rev. Werner and Marshall EPC.
- Signatures are missing from copies of certified minutes submitted for review (minutes of stated meetings and commission reports). The Clerk is instructed to submit copies of completed signature pages to the Office of the Stated Clerk by July 31, 2000.
- 48: Attachment 9 (second page, section E): Administrative Commission acted unconstitutionally to restrict
 whom a congregation could elect as its own officers, thereby violating the rights of Crossroads Community
 Church held in perpetuity (G.17-5; 7-2). This action is remanded to Presbytery for correction.
- 10. 49.19 No terms of call form included for Ron Horgan or Frank Varro.
- 11. 49 (attachment 7) Terms of call for TE Permenter are out of order. A call as pastor has no definite period of time. There is no provision for 2 weeks of study leave.

Presbytery of the East

- Responses to exceptions in a letter from the Clerk (spreading information in the October 2, 1999 minutes)
 have not been fulfilled. Presbytery of the East is directed to include the required information in the Fall
 2000 meeting.
- Appendices referred to in minutes of the 56th Stated Meeting are not included in the certified copies. Clerk is instructed to forward these Appendices to the Office of the Stated Clerk by July 31, 2000.

Presbytery of Florida

Recommendation #8: That the minutes of the Presbytery of Florida be approved with the following exceptions:

- 27:16 Presbytery has no constitutional authority to divest Richard Adelman without censure without using disciplinary procedures in the Book of Discipline.
- Record of the 28th Stated Meeting appears to be inaccurate. Provisional Minutes of the 28th Stated Minutes have significant differences from the certified copies, yet there is no record of corrections at the 29th Stated Meeting.
- 28:14 Ministerial Committee report is missing in the certified minutes. Presbytery is directed to correct
 the minutes and forward corrections to the Office of the Stated Clerk immediately following their Fall 2000
 meeting.

- 28:15 Judicial Committee report is missing in the certified minutes. Presbytery is directed to correct the minutes and forward corrections to the Office of the Stated Clerk immediately following their Fall 2000 meeting.
- Session Review Committee report is missing, including admonishment of Dan Lacich. Presbytery is directed
 to correct the minutes and forward corrections to the Office of the Stated Clerk immediately following their
 Fall 2000 meeting.
- 28:14 The Presbytery appears to have ordained Jonathan Tagg improperly, without having official terms
 of call forms in hand (Acts of the Assembly 98-03).
- 7. General: Permanent record lacks signatures.
- 8. 29:14 Presbytery has no constitutional authority to divest Michael Eubanks of office without censure. Presbytery took action based on a misstatement of fact: "The EPC does not transfer to non-reformed denominations." There is no such constitutional prohibition, Neither is there a constitutional provision for a de facto renunciation of jurisdiction. This matter is referred to the Presbytery of Florida for reconsideration.
- Ministerial Committee did not make the required annual report on the work of Ministers of the Word (G.16-27.A.1). This requirement is not fulfilled by reporting changes in terms of call (G.16-27.A. 8).

Presbytery of Mid-America

Recommendation #9: That the minutes of the Presbytery of Mid-America be approved with the following exceptions:

- 1. 24.03, 25.03 No record of unexcused absences (Rules for Assembly 8-11-G.1)
- 2. 25.04 No copy of rewritten minutes included in certified copy.

- 25.20.4 No service of appreciation and thanksgiving was conducted upon the retirement of Paul Westberg (G.15-9).
- 5. 25.20.7 There is no office of co-pastor in the EPC (Acts of the Assembly 85-05).
- 25.20.09 Call and terms of call for David Baer as evangelist were not used. Powers of evangelist were not specified (G.10-3,C).
- 25.20.10 Required forms for minutes of commission to ordain/install have not been used (Attachment 14, Procedure Manual) (Acts of the Assembly 98-03).
- 8. 25,20,10 No record that Presbytery approved new call or terms of call for Corbett Heimburger.
- 25.21 A ruling elder was assigned as advisor for candidates Book of Government requires a teaching elder (12.2 D).
- 26.16 -- Required forms for minutes of commission to ordain/install have not been used (Acts of the Assembly 98-03).
- 26.16.01 Required forms for minutes of commission to ordain/install have not been used (Acts of the Assembly 90-03).
- 12, 26,16.03 No call or terms of call for Rev. Plant were approved by Presbytery.
- 26.16.05 Minutes do not indicate that proper steps for receiving a church from another body or independency have been followed: installation of pastor, election or recognition of officers, reception of members (G.5-4).
- 26.16.07 Minutes do not indicate that membership of Greentree Community Church were received according to G.5-3.B.
- 15. 26.16.12 Minutes do not contain required out of bounds call forms (Acts of Assembly 98-03).
- 16. 26.16.14 Presbytery acted unconstitutionally to set aside the term limit requirement of officers. It is the right of the congregation, not the presbytery to determine if it has lifetime officers or to have limited terms (G.15-6). The issue is remanded to the Presbytery of Mid-America for correction.

Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic

Commendations: Excellent Stated Clerk's and Treasurer's Report to 32nd Stated Meeting The work of the Spiritual Outreach Committee in providing workshops for ministry enrichment is commended as an example to other Presbyteries. Minutes of the 34th Stated Meeting are excellent.

Recommendation #10: That the minutes of the Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic be approved with the following exceptions:

- 1. 32.02 Forest Hill is authorized to have 8 ruling elder commissioners but 10 are registered.
- 32.27 The pension for Robert Buchanan is below the 10% minimum requirement.
 32.27 M Required out of bounds call form is omitted for Doug Murphy (Acts of the Assembly 98-03)
 32.31 Presbytery appointed a commission, but no members are named.
- 5 7C Excused and unexcused absences are not recorded (Rules of Assembly 8.11 G.1).
- 6. 7C.07 E Call and terms of call for Jeff Parks not approved by Presbytery. No definite period of time for service is specified (G.16-27.A-6).

Presbytery of the Midwest

Recommendation #11: That the minutes of the Presbytery of the Midwest be approved with the following exceptions:

- P. 265: Pension for TE Bill Meyer is below the 10% minimum (Acts of the Assembly 81-05).
 - 2. P. 266: Call to Larry Schmoekel is out of order. There is no constitutional provision for a 2 year out of bounds call. Out of bounds calls are approved annually (G.10-3.F)

- 4. Pp. 271 272: No summary of terms of call or terms of call form for Armistead and Ytterock included in the certified copy of the minutes.
- 5. Pp. 276, 279 No advisor appointed for Jeff Juday or Tim McCracken (G. 12-2.D).
- 6. P. 279 Terms of call for Doug Thompson are missing. If a call changes there must be new terms of call (the call comes from a different body even if the numbers are the same).
- 7. P. 280 The call to Bob Stauffer is unclear (no agency specified). No terms of call appear in the minutes There is no record of church or Presbytery actions to dissolve Bob Stauffer's pastoral relationship with Tabernacle EPC.
- 8. P. 280 Terms of call for Ron Amos are missing.
- 9. Pp. 281-282 Members of a dissolved church were not commended to another congregation by the Presbytery (G.5-5).
- 10. P. 284 No indication that the required 10-day notice was given for a Called Meeting.
- 11. 83-8 A Commission reports are missing.
- 12. 83-11 No advisor appointed for Tim Brown.
- 13. 83-13 Call and terms of call for Jamie Cupschalk was approved, but no record of his prior status, no record that he was examined and approved for ordination.
- 14. 83-13 Call and terms of call for Craig Van Biber was approved, but no record of his prior status, no indication that he was examined and no record of signing the Ministerial Obligation.
- 15. 85-12 (Note: this should be numbered 84-12) No out of bounds call or terms of call form included for TE Gebhard.
- 16. 85-12 (Note: this should be numbered 84-12) No record of previous status of David Hicks or dissolution of his call.

 85-12 – (Note: this should be numbered 84-12) No terms of call summary or forms included in minutes for Missionaries Kelley, Killgore, Mindling and Walker.

Presbytery of the Southeast

Commendations: 47:11 Attachment B - The Clerk is commended for a fine Annual Report.

Recommendation #12: That the minutes of the Presbytery of the Southeast be approved with the following exceptions

- 1. 47:11, 28, 29, 30 Reports not begun with prayer
- 47:12 Service of appreciation and thanksgiving not conducted for either TE Gainey or TE Schussler (G.15-9)
- 47:12 (4) Four teaching elders removed from roll with no indication for constitutional provisions for removal.
- 4. 47:12 No advisor appointed for Thomas Covington.
- 5. 47, Attachment C/1 Terms of call forms for William Swafford are inadequate.
- 6. 47:19 -- People who are not members of the court (Martha Roden) cannot make motions.
- 7. 47:28 Ministerial Committee report did not begin with prayer.
- 8. 47th Stated Meeting -- Attachments C, D and E lack signatures.
- 48, Attachment C -- No definite period of time is part of the call as Assistant Pastor for John Piers (G.11-7).
 Terms of call form is incomplete.
- 10. 47, 48, 49: Signature of Moderator is missing.

Presbytery of St. Andrews

Commendations: The Presbytery Review Committee commends the Presbytery of St. Andrews for beginning the process of maintaining official records in English and for their work in moving toward organizing as a denomination in Argentina.

Recommendation #13: That the minutes of the Presbytery of St. Andrews be approved with the following exceptions:

- 55.4.2.4 and 55.4.3.1.2 An important Book of Government distinction between committees and commissions is blurred. The Presbytery is instructed to take note of Government 16.26.A and 16.26.B and make this distinction clear in the future.
- Translations of the 54th and 53rd Stated Meetings were not submitted. The Stated Clerk is instructed to submit those minutes by Dec. 31, 2000.

Presbytery of the West

Commendation: Minutes are excellent. They show clarity, thoroughness, and a diligence for applying constitutional procedures.

Recommendation #14: That the minutes of the Presbytery of the West be approved without exceptions.

C. General observations of Presbytery Minutes

- The Committee noted a trend to form commissions complying with the minimum standards for
 representation from 2 churches. While this is constitutional and probably expedient, Presbyteries should
 give due consideration to composing commissions (especially to ordain and install) with broader
 representation, demonstrating our connectionalism.
- When members of commissions being formed are listed, minutes should include the churches to which commissioners belong.
- 3. At times it is appropriate to include people who are not members of the Presbytery on a commission to ordain / install. Presbyteries should take care to see that these people are either from other EPC presbyteries or ruling/teaching elders from other reformed bodies. Minutes should state that these people are enrolled as corresponding members. These members are not counted in the minimum constitutional requirements for forming commissions (5 members, 2 churches).
- When ministers are receiving a call Clerks should take care to note the prior status of the Minister (candidate, Presbytery membership, previous place of service, etc.).
- Clerks are reminded that Presbytery must approve <u>both</u> a pastor's call and a pastor's terms of call. The two are not synonymous.
- Clerks should consistently use terminology from the Book of Order, e.g., "Out of Bounds" rather than "outside of boundaries," "retired," rather than "honorably retired," "without call," not "active without call."
 - There appears to be a discrepancy between Acts of the Assembly 89-03 and 89-04 regarding the use of Attachments. Guidance from the Office of the Stated Clerk is needed on this issue.
- We note a wide disparity in the information given in treasurers' reports ranging from complete details to a
 cursory statement of money in the bank account. Guidance from the Office of the Stated Clerk is needed on
 this issue.
- Required annual reporting by the Ministerial Committees in our Presbyteries is lacking. Most Presbyteries secure (often with difficulty), approve and report changes in terms of call (G.16-27.A.8). The Committee did not observe any Presbytery reporting the Ministerial Committee's required annual report on the work of the Ministers of the Word (see G.16-27.A.8). Guidance from the Office of the Stated Clerk is needed on these issues.
- 10. In accordance with Acts of the Assembly 98-03, the approval of the call by Presbytery should be included in the minutes with reference to the terms of call as an attachment. The terms of call should be presented using the appropriate form from the Procedure Manual for Ministerial and Candidates Committees (attachments 2, 3, 4 and 17).

11. If the Assembly approves the recommendations below which deal with standardizing the form of Presbytery Minutes, the Committee encourages the Office of the Stated Clerk to consider assembling a Presbytery Clerk's Handbook utilizing the checklists below.

D. Additional Recommendations

Recommendation #15: That the following standardization method of numbering sections and subsections of the Presbytery Minutes be approved:

Each Main section should identify the number of the meeting and the section, i.e., 76-10 identifies the 76th Stated Meeting, 10th section. Letter or number subsections as appropriate (e.g., 76-10 A.1).

Grounds: This will insure that all Presbyteries use the same format, making it easier to identify and refer to specific actions.

Recommendation #16: That the following standardized method of reporting attendance be initiated in all Presbyteries:

- B. Examination of a candidate for ordination (Attachment #2)
- C. Examination of an ordained minister transferring to a Presbytery (Attachment #3)
- Examination of an ordained minister coming from another denomination from within the Reformed family (Attachment #4).
- E. Examination of an ordained minister coming from any other tradition (Attachment #5)
- F. Appointing commissions (Attachment #6)
- G. Special called meetings (Attachment #7)
- H. Dissolution of a pastoral relationship (Attachment #8)

Grounds: Following a checklist will insure that all required actions have been taken and using the standard format will insure proper reporting of actions taken.

Recommendation #18: That the following standardized method be used by all Presbyteries to show that corrections to exceptions and notations to Presbytery Minutes have been made:

Grounds: Once minutes have been approved and placed in a Presbytery's permanent record they may not be altered. This provides a clear, standardized method to make necessary changes to approved minutes.

- Use of attachments in Presbytery Minutes, addressing the inconsistency in Acts of the Assembly 89-03 and 89-04.
- Annual reporting on the work of Ministers of the Word and changes in terms of call (G. 16.27.A.1, 8)

Grounds: The Presbytery Review Committee observed wide variation in practice and thoroughness in these matters.



I. Active Membership reported this Assembly year is 59,369, a 5% increase. In the inclusive membership, small decreases were reported on the baptized roll and on the numbers of ministers enrolled in presbyteries.




II. <u>Number of churches</u> reported this Assembly year is 197, a net increase of 10 churches (+5.3%) including both particular and mission churches.




III. <u>Internal Growth</u>. 117 churches reported gains in membership in 1999. 59 reported losses and 21 reported no change.


IV. <u>Distribution of congregations by size and membership (1999)</u>: Lyle Schaller has observed that the EPC is a denomination of large churches. That trend has not changed over the past year. Although only 12 churches (6%) exceed 1000 members, those churches



contain 46% of the denomination's membership. On the other hand, one half of our churches report membership of less than 100. Size does not always indicate health. A church may be small and healthy or large and unhealthy. Both face challenges, but of a different nature. Both have opportunities for ministry unique to each.

V. <u>Giving</u>: Giving to both General Assembly and Presbytery has shown a healthy increase in 1999. Per member giving to the General Assembly totaled \$810,427. Churches reported giving \$692,171 to Presbytery causes. Benevolence giving to the General Assembly (including missionary support) was up 27% in the past year.



After a small, one year decline, missionary support in 1991 rose 21%. Giving toward General Assembly Benevolence Askings attained 71% of the goal, compared to 48% in 1998. To some extent this represents more realistic targets (\$589,000 as compared to \$650,000 in 1998), but that should not take away from a generous 32% increase in actual giving (from \$315,123 to \$415,850). Following action of the 18th General Assembly, two ongoing benevolence askings (Military Avenue and the Appalachian Project) were placed in the National Outreach category, accounting for some of the 213% increase. There is also much reason to give thanks to churches and individuals who have given significant financial support to the Key City Project, Hope Church in San Antonio, Texas. During 1999 EPC churches responded with open hearts to special appeals for relief from hurricane damage in North Carolina and Honduras, an earthquake in Turkey, and the refugee crisis in Honduras.



In summary, in 1999 our membership gave an average of \$45.96 per member toward the total work of the General Assembly (see chart below). This represents a 12% increase over. The per member asking for the administration of the General Assembly Office is \$18. Actual giving toward that goal in 1999 was \$14.28 per member, up from \$14.10 per member in 1998.

Conclusion:

Times of change and transition confront us at every corner. The 90s challenged us to clarify from whence we have come and who we are. I believe the understanding and value of being a family, evangelical and Reformed, has experienced greater clarity and significance with each assembly.

The future offers us, as a family of churches, the challenge to integrate the best of our historical heritage with the ministry challenges of the 21st century. Some people describe the EPC as a pastoral people. So be it. It does not mean—let no one mistake— that we have forsaken

theology. We simply, with the Spirit's enabling, determine to practice our theology with a pastoral heart.

For this Clerk, the Assembly closes out twenty years. Above all else, it has been a privilege given me by the Lord. My life verse across many years of ministry remains St. Paul's words in II Corinthians 4: "Since God in his mercy has given us this wonderful ministry, we never give up...we do not distort the word of God. We tell the truth before God, and all who are honest know that." Of myself, I have not earned the privilege of the years past, but God has graciously given the blessing. To him alone be the glory!

I close with one concern, one commendation, and one delight. I am concerned about presbyteries. Variables such as participation and growth in mission are changing and perplexing. I commend to our church family an outstanding General Assembly staff who work with unbelievable faithfulness and diligence. And I delight in the nomination of an outstanding person who follows me in this office. The Stated Clerk Search Committee has served us well!

In an Assembly year filled with transition and change for the Student & Young Adult Ministries Office it was wonderful to see and remember the steadfast faithfulness of the Lord manifested in so many ways. The Spirit of God is at work in the lives of young people and youth ministries in EPC congregations across the denomination. In churches both large and small, in big cities and small towns, from middle school students through young adults, Jesus Christ is indeed the same yesterday, today and forever! The wonderful gospel of his grace and mercy is impacting young lives in our churches on a daily basis. Worship among our youth is authentic and rich. They exhibit a desire to serve God with their lives in meaningful and practical ways. Their thirst for a deep and meaningful spiritual experience is an excellent example to the whole Body of Christ.

The Committee

The SYAM Committee convened twice this assembly year, October 1-2, 1999 and March 3-4, 2000, at the Office of the General Assembly in Livonia, Michigan. The committee received the resignation of Sue Werner (Youth Worker) at the fall meeting. The vacancy created by Sue Werner's resignation was filled at the Spring meeting by Fred Albaugh (Youth Worker). SYAM Committee Membership: Reg Smith (RE), Sonny Flowers (RE), Smokey Ridgley (RE), Jim Byrne (TE), and Rick Stauffer (TE) - Chair. God has blessed the committee with a group of willing and talented servants with great devotion to the cause of Christ and an enthusiasm to use their gifts in his service.

In addition, the Interim Director of SYAM, Bob Watson, is an ex-officio member of the committee. The SYAM Executive Secretary, Sue Ferrell, also sat in on the meetings and took the minutes. The Committee took special note of the exceptional service rendered throughout the busy late spring and summer months of 1999 by Sue Ferrell during the absence of a SYAM Director. Sue filled the gap and enabled the trips and events to go on as planned, her

service was a great blessing to our SYAM programs and was much appreciated.

The Summer of 1999 in Review

The Lord was at work in wonderful ways in the lives of EPC students and their leaders throughout the summer of 1999. Through the Summer Jam conferences for high school students and the multiple mission trip opportunities for various age groups a great deal was accomplished as a result of SYAM summer ministries during this Assembly year.

Mission Trips:

A total of 548 people from 50 churches participated in the SYAM Mission Trips offered in 1999, an increase of 145 people over the 403 participants in 1998 trips. The 1999 destinations included Appalachia (3 trips), Mexico and Brazil. The physical work accomplished, while it is always great, is so often exceeded by the changed hearts and new perspectives which God brings to the participants. Frequently students and leaders tell of their intention to "go and serve" and how in the process they received more from the Lord than they were able to give! Houses were built, roofs were repaired, walls were painted, Vacation Bible Schools were held, and in the process hearts were changed for the Kingdom of God!

Summer Jam Conferences:

Three fantastic weeks of ministry among 750 students and leaders from 29 different churches took place as a result of the EPC's annual high school conferences called Summer Jam. The locations for the 1999 Jams were Gunnison, Colorado (Western State College), Panama City Beach, Florida (Ramada Beach Resort) and Davis, West Virginia (Cannan Valley Conference Center). Although the speakers and recreational opportunities differed at each location, they shared the common purposes of evangelism and discipleship. Feedback gathered at each location indicated that both goals were being accomplished.

Mission Opportunities Summer 2000

Mission trips seem to have an unequalled ability to be used of God to change and challenge young people to put their faith in action. As teams participate in some aspect of service to others they are forced to face the priorities and values in their own lives. The SYAM Committee has established a commitment to keep missions as a high priority and respond to the growing interest in mission trip participation from among our EPC congregations. The trips being offered for the summer of 2000 are as follows:

Appalachian Impact June 18 – 24, 2000
Appalachian Impact July 2 – 8, 2000
Appalachian Impact July 9 – 15, 2000
Appalachian Impact July 23 – 29, 2000
North Carolina Coastal Care July 16 – 22, 2000
Mission Mexico June 25 – July 1, 2000

At the time of this writing over 600 students from 40 congregations have registered to participate in the SYAM summer 2000 mission trips.

Summer Jam 2000 A.D.

Summer Jam has proven to be a powerful time in the lives of many students and youth

groups. Jam includes quality programming, outstanding speakers, vital worship, teaching and excellent opportunities for developing relationships. Several years ago the SYAM Committee determined that there should be a single, national gathered "Super Summer Jam" in the summer of the year 2000. The campus of Lee University in Cleveland, Tennessee was selected as an ideal location for the event. The theme selected for this year is "Sold Out To Jesus". Brett Ray, an Immensely popular past Jam speaker and Pam Stenzel, a nationally recognized communicator are scheduled to keynote this year's Jam. Excellent recreational opportunities and easy access from many locations are also great benefits of this year's location. At the time of this printing 550 persons from 25 congregations have registered for Super Summer Jam 2000 AD

Many EPC youth workers have stepped up to leadership roles for summer trips. The SYAM committee wishes to thank God for each of the willing servants who must lead their own groups on one or more of the above trips as well as take an overall leadership role in the trip.

Future Summer Plans

As the SYAM Committee looked ahead to the summer of 2001 it anticipated holding a single Jam for a second consecutive year while the overall future of the event is evaluated and reviewed. It is the Committee's desire to offer programs that are effective, economical and responsive to the needs of the congregations throughout the EPC. Several outstanding locations are under consideration and availability of nationally known speakers has been confirmed for the event. In addition, several new and exciting possibilities are currently under investigation as Mission Trip destinations both within the U.S. and abroad.

Youth Worker Retreat

An ever growing number of EPC congregations are demonstrating their commitment to young people by the addition of youth staff at the local church level. Youth workers often face a wide variety of challenges and expectations without a corresponding source of encouragement and training. The SYAM Committee is committed to serve as a resource to those involved in ministry with youth in a variety of ways, including an annual gathering for persons involved in ministry with students. In 1999, Scott Brewer and the staff and people of Brainerd Presbyterian Church in Chattanooga, Tennessee hosted the Youth Worker's Retreat. Our keynote speaker was author (*The Family Friendly Church*) Ben Freudenburg from St. Louis. Our 2000 Youth Worker Retreat will be hosted by Fourth Presbyterian Church, Bethesda, Maryland, (D.C. area) October 19-21, 2000. It promises to be an enjoyable time of refreshment and renewal.

Denominational Youth Ministry Meeting

In January, 2000 Bob Watson met with 15 student and young adult leaders of various denominations for the second annual meeting of its kind hosted by Sonlife Ministries in Elburn, Illinois. Each of the denominations and ministries represented are highly concerned with reaching young people in our culture in the new millennium with the gospel of Jesus Christ. Sonlife as an organization is committed to serving the church by providing practical support and cutting edge resources for sharpening the effectiveness of ministry.

Youth Church Membership Curriculum

A continuing project of the SYAM Committee is the Church Membership Curriculum for Youth. A revised working draft version has now been completed and is available on a limited basis for review and testing. The current version is designed for use over 10 sessions and includes the following topics:

Copies of the draft version are available from the SYAM office. Feedback is not only welcome but actively desired during this stage of pre-publication revision of this material.

Final Thoughts

The unity of the Spirit and the common commitment to the faithful proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ exist literally from coast to coast and border to border in our churches. From small church-plant fellowships to large, well established mega-churches, the message of God's amazing grace is the same across the denomination. There is also a broadly shared commitment to establishing and maintaining effective ministries among students and young adults as a priority in many of our churches. There is a growing awareness and increasing commitment to effective youth ministry at the presbytery level as well. The enthusiasm and vitality of youth is a tremendous resource in our congregations and one which is well worth the investment of our time and effort. Each member of the EPC family of churches brings a unique and valuable perspective to the task of effectively communicating the gospel to the next generation. Trusting not in ourselves, but in the mighty power of the Spirit of God, we can look to the future with hope and confidence, anticipating the great things God will do in our midst.

Recommendation 1:

That the General Assembly endorse the Student & Young Adult Ministries Youth Curriculum for use in church membership programs for youth and young adults.

Grounds: Student & Young Adult Ministries has received numerous inquiries from churches for youth membership material. After extensive review of existing curricula, it was determined that the development of such material would be a valuable asset to EPC congregations and a worthwhile undertaking. A great challenge for the church in every age is to pass on the life-changing message of the gospel of Jesus in a way that is both powerful and meaningful to the next generation. Teens and young adults must be nurtured in their understanding of the great truths of the Christian faith. This curriculum is offered as one possible part in the process of accomplishing that vital goal.

THEOLOGY COMMITTEE REPORT

This is the report on the work of the permanent Committee on Theology, done between September and June of 1999-2000. Our committee consisted of TE Tom Ricks, (chairman), TE Mike Glodo, (recording clerk), TE Bruce Demarest, RE Charles Haden, RE George Schneider and RE Bob Warburton. The committee met at the General Assembly Office December 10-11, 1999 and then via conference call in March, 2000. Having completed our assigned tasks, I pass this report to you for your consideration.

Our first order of business was to respond to the request of the Committee on Administration regarding the training of officers in the tenets of the reformed faith. I have attached that response for your perusal. Second, the committee considered the position papers on the Christian view of marriage and theology of children that have been tabled since March, 1998. It is the request of this committee that the 20th General Assembly release us from this responsibility. The formal request and the reasoning behind it are as follows:

Recommendation:

Due to the scope of the issue, the lack of significant disagreement within the EPC
on these matters, the degree to which our standards and existing position papers
address the subject, the abundant resources already available, we hereby request
to be relieved of the general assignment of developing position papers on
marriage and the family.

Grounds: Because our assignment does not focus on a particular problem or problems and because the subject matter is extremely broad, we have found it difficult to provide a response that would add anything beyond the vast amounts of excellent material available in the broader evangelical community.

Having acted on these two items, our committee has completed its work for the past year. We look forward to the opportunities that will arise is the coming year for this committee to serve our Lord and his people in the EPC.

INPUT FROM THEOLOGY COMMITTEE TO COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION REGARDING PASTORAL LETTER ON OFFICER TRAINING

Recommendations regarding content and extent of elder training as prescribed by 12-3-B.

Evaluate content, provide explanation of biblical bases for polity.

The Book of Government 12-3-B makes the church session responsible for courses of instruction in several subjects that are important for church officers. But 12-3-B does not give any indication of the content and extent of those subjects, nor does it give any guidance on the amount of time and attention that should be given to each subject. In order for an officer to be effective, he must have a good grasp of each of the subjects in 12-3-B.

II. Time and attention for each subject on which candidates are examined.

In the area of church history, the training should give the candidates an understanding of the line in which we stand as the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. The EPC is one of many Presbyterian and Reformed denominations. Our roots go back to the Reformation, then to the Western Church, and back to Israel and Abraham. An officer should know about the church councils, the heresies with which they dealt and their results, as well as the schisms and what they mean to the Church. This does not require a two-semester course in church history, but it will require more than a couple of brief sessions looking at the family tree of the Presbyterian denominations. As leaders in the local church, the elders and deacons should be able to give to church members an adequate explanation of who we are and how did we get here.

Closely related to church history is the subject of the faith of the church. The EPC is in the Reformed tradition and on some issues, the EPC is not in line with the evangelical community. Our constitution includes the Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechisms. Many church members do not know much about the WCF and Catechisms, and they never will unless they are trained. The teaching elders cannot be expected to carry this load alone. Ruling elders are supposed to be able to teach. The Session is responsible for the spiritual health of the local church, and that responsibility is shared by teaching and ruling elders. Since many ruling elders come from non-Reformed backgrounds, training in this area is crucial. The church will not continue to be Reformed unless the officers are Reformed and teach the people.

The Book of Order contains the Book of Government, the Book of Discipline, and the Book of Worship. In order to function within the courts of the church, an elder has to know how the church works. He should know the structure of the church, the rights of churches and courts, how the constitution is amended, the function of committees and commissions, and how meetings are structured. The training should seek to cover not only the content of the Book of Government, but also the reasons for the rules. In the area of discipline, and elder needs to know its purpose and generally how it is accomplished in 340the EPC, even if he is not intimately familiar with all the details of judicial procedure.

The Book of Worship sets forth how the EPC understands and carries out worship. Chapter three is important in the training process because it covers the Sacraments. Each officer should know how the EPC understands the meaning and effect of the Sacraments, and why we baptize infants. The Reformed understanding of the Sacraments is different from the Western Church out of which we came, and different from the understanding of many in the evangelical church today. These differences are important and are tied to our understanding of the Covenant of Grace.

The church will not be able to be true to its biblical roots unless the people are taught diligently, and that will not happen unless the officers are properly trained. The training cannot be done properly with a couple of sessions on church history, a couple on systematic theology, and a couple on church government. Our teaching elders have extensive knowledge in these areas, and some of that knowledge must be passed on to our ruling elders and deacons. It would be reasonable to spread this training over a year to give the candidates an opportunity to study the Book of Order and the Westminster Confession of Faith and Scripture references.

III. Ensuring that sessions are upholding their responsibility according to BoG 11-3.

While each congregation, "has the right to elect its own officers." (7-2) The Session of each church has the responsibility to determine the fitness of each candidate for office. (see 11-3) It is incumbent upon the church Session to test each elder elect using the following criteria.

- 1. Ability to "watch over the spiritual welfare" (10-4) of the congregation.
- Ability to "participate diligently in the working of that portion of the Church to which they are commissioned." (10-4)
- That they be "blameless in life, sound in the faith, wise in the things of God and ...
 exhibit a lifestyle that is an example to all." (10-5)
- Able to lead in worship and prayer, visit the sick, encourage members in their spiritual growth and exercise discipline when necessary. (see 10-6)

To that end each church Session should not only provide training and accountability in theology and doctrine, but it must also determine the candidate's ability and desire to humbly shepherd the people of God.

Should the Session determine, according to Scripture, that an elder elect fails to meet the criteria to care for God's flock, it must not confirm that individual to the office of Ruling Elder. This decision is the sole right and responsibility of the local church court.

IV. Inquiring into evaluation procedures used to evaluate candidate fitness.

Each session is urged to develop a method of evaluation within its officer training program. Within each course or area of instruction the session should develop a method of reviewing the essential questions of study and determining each candidate's basic understanding. Such a method of evaluation should be a means of encouraging a higher level of comprehension and commitment to the ministries of ruling elder and deacon, and of determining the readiness of those who are sufficiently prepared to serve in these offices.

V. Are candidates' exceptions to the standards documented and to what extent are they permitted to take exception?

We recommend that, as standard practice, elder and deacon candidates be asked to provide the session with a written list of any known exceptions they may have to the Westminster Confession and Catechisms and to the Book of Order. By "known exception" we mean according to the candidate's level of knowledge in accordance with the training process provided by the session.

This will allow the candidate to take his officer vows in full integrity. Optimally, this should be done after the training period is concluded. But absolutely must be done before the session makes examination of the candidates according to BoG 11-3 (cf. also 13-??)

The latter portion of this question is something the session must determine. We would, however, remind sessions of what was approved by the 18th General Assembly in the paper regarding the "Essentials" and the Westminster standards.

Therefore, it is the conclusion of the [Theology] Committee that a relationship of substantial subscription exists between all ruling and teaching elders and the Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechisms. [sec. 4.2]

Further, an act of the 17th General Assembly stated

To "...receive and adopt the Westminster Confession of Faith and the Catechisms of this Church, as containing the system of doctrine taught in the Holy Scriptures..." means that the ordained holds these teachings as his own, and will teach them as truth. And finally, an act of the 13th General Assembly (AoA 93-17) stated

The purpose of the Essentials of the Faith is to provide an explicit and concise expression of the essentials of the Christian faith, but also leave room for Christians to disagree on non-essentials. It is never to be used as an explicit standard for a minimal core of beliefs for candidates, ordination, or ministerial exams. It is not to duplicate the Westminster Confession of Faith, or to be construed as a substitute for the WCF. Because it is not part of the Constitution, it is never to be used as such. Theoretically, a person could affirm the Essentials, as all knowledgeable

Christians would do, but disagree with the WCF. Such a person would be unacceptable as a Teaching or Ruling Elder in the EPC, being out of accord with its Constitution. On the other hand, a person cannot affirm the WCF and disbelieve any part of the Essentials.

Therefore, the session should not adjudge exceptions by using the "Essentials" as the minimum standard but should employ some holistic or "substantial" conception of the Confession and catechisms.

Pastors should, as part of their ongoing teaching of the session, help establish and improve upon the session's ability to make these determinations.

VI. Are officer responsibilities outlined adequately for candidates?

Within the training program, church sessions should provide information, clarification, and a better understanding of the specific responsibilities, duties, and characteristics of the offices of elder and deacon as outlined in sections 10-4 through 10-8 in the Book of Government. Whatever materials, courses, or methods of instruction are used by sessions, a practical system of evaluation of the understanding of each candidate should also be included to determine a sufficient level of understanding and readiness by each candidate to serve in the offices of ruling elder and deacon.

VII. Resource materials for officer training.

VIII. Possible pre-assembly conference providing instruction and motivation for officer training.

Besides supplying a pastoral letter on officer training, the Committee on Administration may wish to consider, for some future assembly, a pre-assembly conference on officer training. Such a conference may be well attended and very productive if it included elements such as the following.

The nature of the offices of elder and deacon.

Survey of practices and resources for officer training.

Panel discussion among ministers and/or elders whose churches have developed and maintained an excellent officer training program.

The role of confessions in the community life of a church.

Presently pre-assembly conferences tend to focus on church program oriented workshops. The Theology Committee recommends that these helpful resources be alternated with some seminars that would assist our congregations in the elder training process.

IX. Survey of EPC practices with respect to officer training.

Introduction: The Permanent Committee on Theology, in response to a request of the Committee on Administration, has sought to ascertain how E.P.C. churches are selecting and training men and women for the office of Ruling Elder. In February of 2000 surveys were mailed to the 178 churches within our denomination. The results are listed below.

- Of the 178 surveys mailed out 91 churches responded. This response rate of 50 %, is an excellent return that should provide conclusive information about the denomination as a whole.
- 2. Three questions were asked on the survey. They were as follows:
 - a) How does your church conduct the officer nomination process for Ruling Elders?
 - b) What training do you provide for your Ruling Elders elect?

- c) What materials do you use in training your Ruling Elders elect?
- The following information was gathered from the first question. (How does your church conduct the officer nomination process for Ruling Elders?) 100% of the respondents answered this question.
 - a) 74% of all churches use some form of a Nominating Committee. 55% of these respondents allow the congregation to select the Nominating Committee.
 - b) 16% of respondents used a Nominating Committee that was selected by the Session.
 - c) 3% of respondents used a Nominating Committee chosen by the congregation and approved by the Pastor.
 - d) 26 % of all churches do not use a Nominating Committee for the selection of Ruling Elders.
 - e) 13% of these churches use the Session as a Nominating Committee and the congregation gives final approval of the Ruling Elders chosen to serve.
 - 6% of these churches allow the Session to nominate and elect without congregational approval.
 - g) 6% of the congregations chose their Ruling Elders without a Nominating Committee or input from the Session.
 - h) One church allows the Session to select Ruling Elders contingent upon approval of the Pastor.
- The following information was gathered from the second question. (What training do you provide for your Ruling Elders elect?) 82% of respondents answered this question.
 - a) In 62% of the churches the Pastor does all of the training.
 - b) In 12% of the churches the Pastor and current Ruling Elders share the training responsibilities.
 - c) In 8% of the churches Ruling Elders elect sit in on two Session meetings prior to beginning their term of office. This was noted as "on the job training."
 - d) One church used four different teachers with specific areas of expertise. (i.e. Pastor teaches theology, Business Manager trains in the area of finance, etc).

Length of Instruction:

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- a) 21 % of the churches held classes for Ruling Elders once per week for a 3-6 month period. Classes were 1-2 hours each in length.
- b) 19 % of the churches met twice with Ruling Elders elect for a total of 4-8 hours.
- c) 12% of the churches met weekly for 6-8 weeks. Each class lasted 1-2 hours.
- d) 10% of the churches met weekly for 4-5 weeks. Each class lasted 1-2 hours.
- a) 3% of churches met regularly for 8 months to 1 year for training newly elected Ruling Elders.
- The following information was gathered from the third question. (What materials do
 you use in training your Ruling Elders elect?) 65% of the respondents answered this
 question. * Note: 88% of churches were using a combination of the materials listed
 below.
 - a) 46% used The Westminster Confession of Faith.
 - b) 44% use The Evangelical Presbyterian Church Book of Church Order.
 - 40% used Andy Jumper's <u>Officer Training: Presbyterian History and</u> Government.
 - d) 29% used Scripture (specifically mentioned 1 Timothy 3 & Titus 1)
 - e) 7% used the document known as "The Essentials of the Faith" (my quotation marks)
 - f) 3% used Maxwell's Leadership Training Videos Series, In Joy.
 - g) Sixteen other books, articles and video series were listed as resource material.

Conclusions: While this is not a scientific study several conclusions can safely be drawn.

- a) Some form of a Nominating Committee is the prevalent tool being used by E.P.C. churches to aid in the Ruling Elder selection process.
- b) Pastors are doing the majority of the teaching in Ruling Elder training classes.

- c) Although it was the most widely used resource, less than half of all churches use <u>The Westminster Confession of Faith</u> as a tool for training Ruling Elders.
- d) The majority of E.P.C. churches do not use the document known as "The Essentials of the Faith" (my quotations) as a tool for training Ruling Elders.
- e) Since 40% of respondents use Andy Jumper's material it should be reviewed and perhaps updated with permission of the author's estate.
- f) Only 36% of all respondents are giving Ruling Elders elect 8 hours or more of training.
- g) Some of selection and training processes indicate a lack of understanding or adherence to the <u>Book of Government</u> instructions on the nomination, election and training of officers.

WOMEN'S MINISTRIES COMMITTEE REPORT

With this past year now written in the chronicles of EPC Women's Ministries, we give thanks for the blessings and opportunities that have been ours as we have served on the permanent committee.

The Women's Ministries Committee convened twice since the 19th General Assembly; October 25-26, 1999 and April 6-7, 2000. The following is a summary of reports submitted, plans made, and communications sent to the local Women's Ministries.

Woman To Woman - Women's Ministries Newsletter

One issue of our newsletter has been published this past year. Each article written and ministry idea shared all reflect God's faithfulness to Women's Ministries.

We are pleased that the newsletter Woman to Woman received the 1999 Renaissance Award from the International Association of Business Communicators Detroit Chapter. This award is a tribute to Jan Juday, former Director of Women's Ministries and editor of the newsletter.

Women's Ministries Handbook

Our women's Ministries Handbook, revised and approved by the 19th General Assembly, has been printed and distributed to each pastor and Women's Ministries in our EPC churches. Additional copies may be obtained from the General Assembly office for a price of \$7 each. How thankful we are to have a tool of communication that shares our goals, structure, history and components of an active, healthy Women's Ministries.

Faith Focus Projects 1998

On August 16-31, 1999 our 1998 Faith Focus Project was fulfilled by the hosting of a conference in Almaty, Kazakhstan on behalf of the persecuted church. Forty-two EPC women traveled halfway across the world to offer themselves in service with the seven EPC missionaries serving in Kazakhstan and Russia who assisted in planning this conference. Through our giving goal, scholarships were provided for 157 nationals representing 11 countries.

Another goal of our conference was to do humanitarian dental work for these Christian sisters. A dental team lead by Dr. Kitsie Hendrix and Dr. Linda Juday had a total of 233 encounters including root canals, gum surgeries and general dentistry.

Our speakers were Mary Whelchel, Iqbal Massey, Jean Mobley, and Barbara Neuman. It was through the many areas of ministry and service we saw a glimpse of what it meant to be ministered to by Jesus, for we saw Him in the:

- . J-oy radiating from the hearts of the women
 - . E-xcitement and enthusiasm of their faith in Jesus Christ
 - . S-incerity and simplicity of their faith and desire to share with all
- . U-nity in the Spirit we were blessed by
 - S-ervanthood of US team and missionaries who went to invest their hearts, yet came away with a greater investment in our hearts receiving more than they gave.

1999

Our 1999 Faith Focus Project has been "Bringing the Missionaries Home" for the 20th Anniversary Celebration of the EPC at General Assembly 2000. Our goal of \$35,000 has been reached and exceeded and we rejoice in being able to contribute to the financial expenses of our EPC missionaries for the 20th (2000) General Assembly.

2000

As a continuation of our involvement in the needs of Kazakhstan, we chose as our 2000 Faith Focus "A Message of Hope for the Youth of Kazakhstan." With a giving goal of \$15,000, it is our desire to provide funds to support four one-week camps for difficult youth, and a one week camp for handicapped youth with cerebral palsy. The "difficult youth" could be a gang member, one affected by the growing drug culture, someone from a broken home or who lives in poverty, or one from an atheistic family.

These camps are designed to give youth an opportunity to hear the truth of the gospel outside the pressures and temptations of city life and to encourage young believers to grow in their faith. These camps will be sponsored by Almagul Church in Almaty, Kazakhstan and will under the leadership and supervision of the EPC mission team serving the Almagul Church. The team is composed of Reverend and Mrs. Dan Burns, Reverend and Mrs. Bill Hampton, and Mr.

and Mrs. Allen White.

2001

With a mission goal and commitment to minister to Central Asian women in Kazakhstan and surrounding countries, our Faith Focus Project for 2001 will be to raise funds to host another Women's Conference in Almaty, Kazakhstan. Our EPC missionary team serving in Kazakhstan, the Burnses, Hamptons and Whites will assist with the on site arrangements. A US team of EPC women will travel to Kazakhstan to serve on various committees such as leadership, administration, hospitality, prayer, and worship.

Women's National Conference

The sky and seas rejoiced October 7-10, 1999 on the shores of southeast Virginia as 341 EPC women gathered together from all over the US to attend the 6th EPC National Conference. The Founder's Inn Conference Center in Virginia Beach, VA, and our host, the Mid-Atlantic Presbytery, welcomed us with genuine Southern hospitality. Through the ministry of keynote speaker Mary Glynn Peeples, Peggy Miller's drama portrayal of Fanny Crosby, eight interesting and informative workshops, and the excellent leadership of our conference director, Nancy Larsen, we found the fulfillment of our theme "You Will Go Out In Joy," and so we did, with renewed visions and refreshed spirits.

General Assembly Planning

The Women's Ministries program at our General Assembly is a wonderful opportunity to inform and be informed, to encourage and be encouraged, to inspire and be inspired, to affirm one another and be affirmed. As the Women's Ministries Committee planned the program for the 20th General Assembly it was our desire and prayer to:

- Inform and communicate through the distribution of an information packet given to the women at registration. This packet will include recommended Bible studies for 2000/2001, Faith Focus material, and ministry information.
- Encourage through the Thursday afternoon's presentation of ministry highlights/displays and small group sharing entitled "Dream With A Vision."

- Inspire by a message from Florence Littauer, nationally known speaker and author, at our Friday Women's Luncheon. Recommended Bible studies, the exciting Kazakhstan report and current and future Faith Focus projects will be announced during our afternoon session.
 - Affirm the women in their ministry on Saturday morning through a time of questions and answers, a time to share their hopes and visions, and pray for one another.

Resignation of Jan Juday

We are reminded by Ecclesiastes 3:1 that "to everything there is a season . . . " and how thankful we are for the season of ministry in which Jan Juday served as Director of EPC Women's Ministries. Through her five years of quality leadership we have experienced growth and unity among the women of our denomination. Jim and Sally Foote changed agencies from WO to Footprints, International on September 1, 1999. They continue to evangelize and disciple people in Tyumen, Siberia under their new agency.

Approved Candidates

We are working with several candidates who have applied to the World Outreach Committee and are in the process of completing their requirements.

- Steve and Madeline Grossman are awaiting assignment to serve under cooperative agreement with Arab World Ministries among Muslims in France. They are members of Fourth Presbyterian in Bethesda, MD.
- Randy and Martha Halbedl have been received as approved candidates interested in serving under cooperative agreement with Frontiers on a church planting team among Muslims in Southeast Asia.
 They are also members of Fourth Presbyterian.
- Brian and Ginny Holt have been received as approved candidates serving under cooperative
 agreement with SIM at a seminary and international church in Ethiopia. Brian is a member of the
 Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic and Ginny is a member of Forest Hill Presbyterian in Charlotte, NC.
- Jane Loyda has been received as an approved candidate and is seeking a team to join. She is a
 member of Cherry Hills Presbyterian in Highlands Ranch, CO.
- Two additional couples and one single woman have expressed interest in working under World Outreach. Their application papers are under review.

Fields of Service

• Kazakhstan: The Almaty team is increasingly involved in training national leaders and preparing to organize a presbytery. National leaders now fill all ministry positions at Almagul church except pastor, and have initiated several new outreach ministries. Dan Burns hopes to have a national pastor or pastoral candidate in place by summer 2001. One sister church, Orbita, is fully organized with national leadership. Two new church plants are underway. The first is a Kazakh language group. The second, a group for Russian speakers with a strong Kazakh cultural identity, has been growing well under the leadership of a national intern and Bill Hampton. The Whites have settled in well and are studying Russian and assisting with small group leadership.

- Argentina: We are partnering closely with our brethren in Argentina to establish a national Presbyterian denomination in the year 2001. All decisions on World Outreach personnel appointments and assignments in Argentina are now made in consultation with the Presbytery of St. Andrews Mission Committee. Miguel and Azucena Robles continue working to revitalize the Belgrano Church. Marcelo Robles continues as pastor of La Misión (Flores) with his new wife, Miriam. He plans to remain there, leaving World Outreach at the end of 2000. Chris and Gina Meeks have been assisting at La Misión and the church plant in Lomas. On returning from home service in January 2001, they will begin a daughter church plant of La Misión. Ross and Sandy Meyer plan to be in Buenos Aires by August. Chuck and Kim Creech may be there by early 2001. Both couples will start their field service with internships under Argentine pastors. One more couple is in the application process.
- Muslim Field: So far, three efforts to develop Turkey as a World Outreach field have met with
 closed doors. The World Outreach Committee has postponed further initiatives related to Turkey
 until 2001. We continue to pray for Turkey as we wait to see what opportunities God brings forth.
- Siberia: Following the transfer of Jim and Sally Foote from World Outreach to Footprints, International, in September 1999, World Outreach is no longer active in Siberia.
- Ethnic Ministry: Juan and Adriana Singh are planting a Hispanic church, St Andrews Presbyterian, in Jackson, MS, with Lakeside Presbyterian in Brandon, MS, as mother church. St Andrews has about 35 members, four small group meetings and many outreach activities. Growth in attendance is needed.

Missionary care and development is part of the World Outreach Committee responsibility. Another part is helping the EPC respond to the challenge of the world around us. Some of the directions these opportunities have taken us follow:

- The 6th Conference for World Outreach missionaries took place just prior to this GA. This is always
 a great time to build the sense of family among our EPC missionaries. This year, courtesy of the
 Faith Focus, all but five of our missionary families and singles were together for three days of
 sharing, prayer and teamwork training.
- The Lord has provided a wonderfully gifted and experienced new World Outreach Director in Jeff Chadwick, currently pastor of Westminster Presbyterian in Bluefield, WV. He will begin working with Dick Oestreicher this summer in preparation for Dick's retirement in September.
- Missionary support continues to grow every year. Support income topped one million this year, at \$1,168,592. Project giving also increased, making total missions giving \$1,334,181.
- Missionaries serving under cooperative agreements with evangelical agencies give us access to
 Muslim work in Europe, Russia, the Middle East, and Central and East Asia—a vast span of
 influence for the Lord in the Muslim block nations.
- Our Benevolence Askings continue to take us to many points of the globe.

Recommendations

1. To adopt the revised World Outreach Master Plan presented in attachment 1.

Grounds:

<u>Values</u>: To modify value statements to more accurately reflect WOC positions and commitments.

<u>Goals & objectives</u>: Original goals & objectives were stated for 1998 and 2001. The new document presents goals for 2002 and 2005.

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EPC Fields: To position Muslim ministry first priority in our major defining document as it is in actuality.

Strategic Opportunities: To place East Asia (China) more substantially in our goals, and to add overseas international church planting and development as a new field focus.

Mission Ed: To state new goals as a result of progress on past goal statements.

 To approve the following revision to World Outreach Missions Manual section 302.3C: Remove item 6 Studies in Reformed essentials and tradition including the sacraments, and change number 7 to 6.

Grounds: Everything listed in item 6 is covered in item 1 A systematic study program in theology, Reformed essentials and tradition including the sacraments.

3. To approve the following revision to World Outreach Missions Manual section 400.10 Vehicles: Change the amount of the standard vehicle allowance from \$14,000 to \$18,000. This would increase the monthly vehicle escrow amount from \$233 to \$300. The only change in the wording of the manual would be to replace \$14,000 with \$18,000 in the third sentence.

Grounds: The \$14,000 allowance was established in January 1995. This increase adjusts for vehicle price increases in the intervening years.

4. To approve the addition of the following section to the World Outreach Missions Manual:

301.5 Provisional Presbytery Formation

When the WOC believes the work is ready for establishment of a provisional presbytery, it will request the GA to appoint a commission entrusted with all the powers necessary to do so (Book of Government 16-26.B).

Grounds: This specifies the procedure to be followed in establishing a provisional presbytery where there is no indigenous court with the power to ordain ministers, organize and receive particular churches, and establish presbyteries. This procedure accords with the standards set forth in *The Book of Order* and the precedent established in receiving Argentine churches and ministers into the EPC in 1987.

 To approve the addition of the following section to the World Outreach Missions Manual: 304.5 Extended Home Service

At the end of the normal home service, the WOC may grant, with justification, an extension of home service not to exceed one year.

Grounds: At present, WO has no clear statement about the length of home service or how it might be extended before a missionary is placed on leave of absence. This policy would require the missionary to request extension of home service, indicating a reason for the request. The WOC would then act on that request. This is in line with other missions agency policies.

PART III DOCUMENTS

Rules for Assembly As amended through the 20th General Assembly

I. Date and Place of Meeting

- 1-1 The General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall meet annually on the date and at the place fixed by the preceding General Assembly, between May 1 and June 30.
- 1-2 The place of meeting shall be rotated among the various areas of the church as much as practical. Any Presbytery or church of Presbytery that desires to entertain the General Assembly shall forward an invitation to the Stated Clerk no later than three years before the preceding Assembly. If two or more Presbyteries or churches submit invitations to host the General Assembly for the same year, the Committee on Administration will submit a recommendation to the General Assembly naming the host church or Presbytery. The Committee on Administration will make its recommendation based on the following criteria:

 Capability to host, i.e., availability of housing, costs, travel arrangements, committee meeting rooms, availability of food service for breaks and meals, space for exhibitors and General Assembly staff, and local transportation.

 Priority will be given to the Presbytery or church which has never hosted a General Assembly or which hosted General Assembly the greatest number of years ago.

II. Organization of a General Assembly's Meetings

- 2-1 The General Assembly shall be called to order at the designated time by the Moderator, and shall begin with a worship service.
- 2-2 The Stated Clerk shall present a report on the enrollment and declare if a quorum is present. If such is present, the Assembly shall be declared to be properly constituted.
- 2-3 The first order of business shall be the election of a Moderator. The Committee on Nominations shall make its report and the floor shall be opened for additional nominations. There shall be only one nominating speech not to exceed five minutes for each nominee. No seconding speeches shall be permitted.
- 2-4 Election shall be by ballot, on ballots provided by the Stated Clerk. Tellers appointed by the Stated Clerk shall gather, count and report the ballot tabulation to the Stated Clerk. Election shall be by majority. Should no majority exist among a plurality of nominees, a second ballot shall be called for the two highest nominees. The Moderator shall declare the election.

2-5 As soon as the Moderator shall have been declared elected, he shall assume his duties as Moderator.

III. The Moderator

- 3-1 The Moderator shall preside at all sessions of the Assembly except for those times when the Moderator may temporarily invite another Commissioner to act as the presiding officer.
- 3-2 The Moderator shall call the succeeding Assembly to order and preside until a successor has been elected. An address from the retiring Moderator is appropriate. If the Moderator is unable to act, the most immediate past Moderator present, or in the absence of any, the Stated Clerk, shall call the Assembly to order and preside over its session until a Moderator has been elected.

IV. The Stated Clerk

- 4-1 The Stated Clerk shall be elected on the last day of the Assembly. A new Stated Clerk shall assume office at the end of the Assembly, or at such time thereafter as designated by the General Assembly (cf. Acts 82-09).
- 4-2 The Stated Clerk shall perform the duties assigned by the Book of Government and by the Rules for Assembly, and such other duties as are assigned by action of the Assembly.
- 4-3 The Stated Clerk shall assemble the items of business to come before the Assembly and prepare a daily docket for the receiving of committee reports and consideration of all appropriate business to come before the Assembly.
- 4-4 The Stated Clerk shall keep the Minutes of the General Assembly. He shall publish them annually with statistical reports of the Church and reports of the committees of the Assembly.
- 4-5 The Stated Clerk shall have the privilege of the floor in all matters pertaining to his office and at such times when the Moderator, chairmen of assembly committees, or any Commissioner request clarification of Assembly business
- 4-6 The Stated Clerk shall be the parliamentarian of the General Assembly.
- 4-7 The Stated Clerk shall have surveillance over denominational archives and historical documents on behalf of the General Assembly, and shall be responsible for the right of access to such documents.

V. The Assembly Arrangements

5-1 The Moderator of the last General Assembly and the Stated Clerk shall plan the periods of worship at the meeting of the Assembly, including the celebra-

- tion of the Lord's Supper and public services. A brief worship service shall be included at the beginning of each day's session.
- 5-2 The Lord's Supper shall be celebrated by the General Assembly. The retiring Moderator shall preside on this occasion and shall preach a sermon or deliver an appropriate address. The newly elected Moderator shall assist in this service.
- 5-3 The first order of the day, except the opening day, at the beginning of the business session shall be the presentation of a docket listing the business which is to be considered that day. Revision of the docket may be necessary during the day.
- 5-4 The Stated Clerk shall oversee all arrangements for the meeting and housing of the General Assembly in conjunction with the host Presbytery and/or host church.

VI. Communications and Overtures

- 6-1 A communication to the General Assembly is formal correspondence received by the Stated Clerk from other churches, inter-church agencies and from other organized bodies outside the church proper having business with the Assembly.
- 6-2 The Stated Clerk shall recommend to the Assembly reference for all communications.
- 6-3 An overture ordinarily is the request of a Presbytery for action by the General Assembly upon a specific matter.
- 6-4 All overtures shall be delivered to the Stated Clerk at least thirty (30) days prior to the opening of General Assembly. No overtures received by the Stated Clerk less than thirty (30) days prior to the opening of the Assembly shall be considered by its Assembly convening in that year. Overtures from the floor of General Assembly shall be considered only if received by a 2/3 vote of assembled Commissioners.

VII. Reports to the General Assembly

- 7-1 The Moderator, Stated Clerk, permanent committees and special committees shall make annual reports. Such reports shall be transmitted to the Stated Clerk by May 1. These reports shall be referred to the Commissioners by the Clerk by June 1.
- 7-2 All ad interim committees shall make full reports in writing with the rationale for all recommendations included therein, and such reports shall be mailed to all Commissioners at least two weeks prior to the convening of the Assembly.

VIII. Assembly Committees

- 8-1 All business shall ordinarily come to the floor of the Assembly for final action through Assembly committees, except reports of ad interim committees, which shall report directly to the Assembly. The following committees shall handle the matters indicated:
 - A. Administration concerning administrative matters
 - B. World Outreach concerning world missions
 - C. National Outreach concerning home missions and evangelism
 - D. Christian Education & Publications concerning Christian education & publications
 - E. Ministerial Vocation concerning preparation and care of ministers
 - F. Presbytery Review concerning Presbytery ministry and action
 - G. Fraternal Relations concerning other denominations and agencies Memorials and Appreciation - concerning appreciation
 - H. Overtures and Resolutions concerning communications
 - J. Theology concerning theological matters under study
 - K. Women's Ministries concerning ministries for the women of the church
 - Student & Young Adult Ministries concerning ministries for youth and college age people of the church
- 8-2 The Moderator will appoint chairmen and secretaries of each Assembly committee. Representation on each committee shall be presbyterial. The Assembly Nominating Committee will elect committee personnel from Commissioner registrations mailed no later than ten days prior to the Assembly convening. Ratio should be as close to 2:1 (RE:TE) as possible.
- 8-3 The committees may be scheduled to meet prior to the opening session of the Assembly to handle business referred by the Stated Clerk.
- 8-4 The Assembly Committees shall proceed as follows:
 - A. At the assigned time, each committee shall assemble in its assigned place, review material in hand and begin its work.
 - Each committee shall be available to reconvene to consider additional matters referred from the Assembly floor.
 - C. A quorum is considered to be a simple majority.
- 8-5 The Assembly Committee's report shall be brief and concise. It shall include the following:
 - A. A list of all items referred to and considered by the committee;
 - B. A statement of all issues discussed:
 - C. A report of all recommendations contained in reports, communications and overtures referred. Action taken by the Assembly committees to approve, modify or not approve those items referred shall be reported back to the Assembly with reasons.

- 8-6 Minutes of the corresponding permanent committee shall be submitted to the Assembly committee for review.
- 8-7 Informational presentation of special aspects of work reported by a particular Assembly committee shall be limited to five (5) minutes. The Moderator may extend this time up to an additional ten (10) minutes.
- 8-8 Any recommendation affecting the budget of the Assembly shall be referred to the Committee on Administration for review before presentation to the Assembly.
- 8-9 The completed report of an Assembly committee shall contain the full text of the report and handled as follows:
 - Proofed and signed by chairman of committee and thereafter given to Stated Clerk for permanent record;
 - Presented to the Assembly during docketed time by chairman or designate.
- 8-10 No partial report of an Assembly committee shall be presented without consent of the Assembly.
- 8-11 A. Presbytery Minutes shall be examined for conformity to:
 - the constitutional standards of the church, as to substance of the action recorded:
 - 2. appropriate standards as to the use of the English language.
 - B. Each set of Presbytery Minutes must be read by at least two members of the Committee on Presbytery Review.
 - C. The findings of the Committee with respect to the Minutes of each Presbytery shall be reported under the following categories as appropriate:
 - Notations: Typographical errors, misspellings, improper punctuation, non-prejudicial statements of facts and other variations in form maybe reported here. Also, failure to provide sufficient or proper information or identification, misstatement of facts, etc., may be included here.
 - Exceptions: Violations of constitutional standards of actions which in substance appear not to conform to EPC standards should be reported here.
 - D. The Committee should prepare a report concerning the Minutes of each Presbytery. After action by the Assembly, two copies shall be given to the Stated Clerk, one for his permanent file and one to be mailed to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery.
 - E. Notations and exceptions in the Committee's report shall be handled as follows:
 - Notations shall be forwarded to the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery without being read to the Assembly or recorded in its Minutes.
 - Exceptions shall be read before the Assembly, recorded in its Minutes, and disposed of as the Assembly determines.

F. The Presbyteries shall take note in their Minutes of exceptions and notations conveyed from the Assembly and of the disposition they have made of such.

G. Guidelines for Presbytery Minutes

Date, time, place of meeting, Presbytery must meet at least three (3) times a year (G.16-17). Presbytery review year shall include those minutes approved by Presbytery up to June 1 of each Assembly year.
 Minutes should reflect the names of Ruling and Teaching Elders present, visitors present, and include excused and unexcused absences. Minutes should reflect the number of the stated meeting.

Meeting opened and closed with prayer.

Declaration of quorum (G.16-18).

- 4. Accurate record of motions passed and actions taken (G.16-19).
- Minutes should be typed with complete sentences, correct spelling and bound in hard cover.
- 6. Minutes should be signed by Stated Clerk and Moderator.
- Minutes should reflect an accurate record of candidates received and dismissed.
- Minutes should reflect an accurate record of ministers received and dismissed including proper examination procedures leading to ordination and/or installation.
- Record of approved pastoral calls and any changes in calls and the granting of permission to labor outside the bounds of Presbytery (G.16-16A).
- 10. Minutes must reflect an annual review of sessional records.
- Minutes must reflect establishing, dissolving, dividing, uniting, receiving, and dismissing of churches (G.16-16E).
- Minutes must reflect observations of and carrying out of General Assembly injunctions and instructions.
- 13. Overtures to the General Assembly must be recorded.
- 14. Minutes will reflect any judicial cases before Presbytery and the disposition thereof in accordance with the Book of Discipline.
- 15. Minutes will include all actions of Presbytery-appointed commissions.
- Mínutes should include annual approved Presbytery budget and related financial reports.
- 8-12 The minutes of each day will not be read at the beginning of each day of Assembly but will be proof-read by a committee of three Commissioners in consultation with the recording clerks of the Assembly. The committee of three shall be nominated by the convening Moderator and the minutes shall be posted in a public place where they can be read by interested Commissioners.
- IX. Permanent Committees and the Permanent Judicial Commission
 - 9-1 The ministries of the Assembly shall be conducted primarily through permanent committees and the Permanent Judicial Commission, to wit:

A. Committee on Administration

- Chaired by most immediate past Moderator.
- Committee Membership: Moderator, Stated Clerk, immediate past Moderator, immediate past Chairman, nine elected members, plus the chairmen of other permanent committees. The chairmen from other committees shall have voice but no vote.
- 3. Functions in the following ways:
 - a. Administrative oversight
 - Oversight and coordination of Administration Committee with World Outreach, Christian Education, Ministerial Vocation, National Outreach, Women's Ministries and Student & Young Adult Ministries Committees.
 - · Responds to emergency and disaster situations.
 - Serve as Directors of the corporation.
 - b. Denominational Development
 - · General Assembly planning
 - Promotion/public relations
 - · Personnel administration (staff hiring, staff accountability)
 - Budget development: receive projections from all committees and submit to General Assembly a proposed budget
 - All legal and corporate matters
 - Property and liability insurance
 - All other business of ecclesiastical matters not specifically assigned to any other committees.

B. Committee on World Outreach

1. To be comprised of nine members on a three-year, three-class system, with the Moderator and Stated Clerk to serve as ex-officio members. The permanent Nominating Committee will nominate replacement members from within EPC membership. Members may serve a maximum of two terms and then may not be reelected without at least one year's break. WOC members are to include three Teaching Elders and six Ruling Elders. The WOC is to meet at least twice a year, including the General Assembly.

C. Committee on National Outreach

- Membership to be nine members, including three "at large" members in order to add greater breadth and depth of experience. Chairman to be elected by committee.
- Duties: to give oversight and planning to the domestic ministries in church planting, evangelism, and church development.

D. Committee on Ministerial Vocation

- Membership to be six members; chairman elected by committee.
- 2. Monitors and aids ministerial committees of local presbyteries.
- 3. Assists in placement of pastors and helps churches to find pastors.
- 4. Provides information on colleges and seminaries.
- Examines extraordinary candidates.
- 6. Oversees theological testing.

F Committee on Women's Ministries

- Membership shall be comprised of six women, currently active members of the EPC and as geographically representative as possible of the entire denomination. No more than one person from any given Presbytery may be elected.
- Duties: to provide an atmosphere for the women of the church to mature spiritually and to recognize and develop their God-given gifts.

F. Committee on Christian Education & Publications

- To be comprised of six members, two of whom may be non-elders qualified in Christian Education and who are active members of EPC churches. Chairman to be elected by committee.
- 2. Duties
 - a. Curriculum development
 - b. Provide resources for church/Christian day schools (all levels)
 - c. Provide assistance in Sunday School development and operation
 - d. Publications other than curriculum
 - e. Camp and conference development
 - f. Lay leadership development
 - g. Worship and music resources

G. Committee on Student and Young Adult Ministries

- Membership to be composed of two Teaching Elders and four Ruling Elders in three rotating classes of two each. Two of the four Ruling Elder positions on the Student and Young Adult Ministries Committee may be filled with non-ordained EPC youth ministers who are active members of EPC churches.
- Duties: to be responsible for conference ministries, youth curriculum resourcing, youth ministry resources and other youth related concerns for grades 7-12.

H. Committee on Theology

- Membership shall be comprised of six people, one-half of whom shall be Teaching Elders and one-half of whom shall be Ruling Elders, to be in three rotating classes of two each.
- Duties: to receive and study such theological matters as may be referred to it by the General Assembly and to return to the General Assembly its opinions and requested papers or documents.

I. Fraternal Relations Committee

- Membership to consist of six members plus the immediate past Moderator, the Moderator, and the Stated Clerk as members ex-officio. The chairman is to be selected by the committee.
- 2. Duties: to assist the General Assembly in identifying, developing, and implementing relationships with other bodies of Christians including denominations in the Reformed tradition, ecumenical agencies (evangelical or Reformed in character) and other groups working to advance the Kingdom of God through evangelism, nurture, and service. The committee shall receive, study, and pursue only such fratemal matters as may be referred to it by the General Assembly and

shall report annually to the General Assembly on all matters referred and the development of existing fraternal relationships.

J. Permanent Judicial Commission (PJC)
"The Permanent Judicial Commission: The General Assembly shall
establish a PJC. The Commissions shall consist of a minimum of nine per
sons in three classes of three each, and of which at least two-thirds must
be Ruling Elders. The Assembly shall determine their eligibility to succession. Efforts shall be made to give fair representation to the various Presbyteries. During service on this Commission, no member may hold office
or employment in the court. Its quorum shall be two-thirds of its membership. It shall elect its own moderator and a clerk from among its members

K. Presbytery Review Committee

 Membership: Committee to consist of three members, at least one former stated clerk of a presbytery.

Duties: To provide structure, order, and continuity in reviewing the minutes of the Presbyteries.

- 9-2 The power and authority of the permanent committees shall be those set forth in these Rules or by direction of the General Assembly.
- 9-3 Each committee shall be constituted on a three-year, three-class structure. All members shall be Teaching Elders or Ruling Elders except as noted. Insofar as practicable, the ratio of two Ruling Elders to one Teaching Elder shall be maintained.
- 9-4 In the event of a vacancy on a permanent committee of the General Assembly, when such vacancies seriously affect the work of the committee, and upon the request of the chairman of that committee, the Committee on Administration is authorized to appoint a person to fill the vacancy of that committee. Such appointees shall serve until the following General Assembly at which time the person shall be presented to the General Assembly by the Nominating Committee for approval. Upon approval of the General Assembly, the nominees shall then be approved for the terms and the classes according to the vacancies being filled.
- 9-5 A majority of a permanent committee shall constitute a quorum.
- 9-6 Each permanent committee shall elect its chairman for the forthcoming assembly year before the Assembly that initiates that assembly year. Persons not yet elected to the forthcoming year shall not be eligible.

X. Committee on Nominations

- 10-1 The membership shall consist of 9 members, in three classes of three each composed of four Teaching Elders and five Ruling Elders, with at least one person from each Presbytery. When the number of Presbyteries exceeds nine, membership shall be rotated fairly among the Presbyteries. A member may not succeed himself. The Stated Clerk shall work with the committee to insure compliance with the requirements of the Rules for Assembly.
- 10-2 The chairman shall be named from the next outgoing class by the outgoing Moderator of the Assembly. The chairman shall take office at the close of the Assembly.
- 10-3 Each year at the Assembly, the outgoing Moderator shall nominate three persons to the Assembly for membership on this committee. At that time, the floor will be opened for other nominations. However, all nominations must meet the requirements for Presbytery representation and for the Teaching Elder and Ruling Elder distribution. The Stated Clerk shall rule if a nomination from the floor is valid, and if it is valid, the Stated Clerk shall determine which of the Moderator's three nominees the nominee from the floor will run against. Those elected shall take office at the close of the Assembly.

10-4 Duties:

- 1. Nominees for Moderator: The committee shall advise each Presbytery following the meeting of the Assembly of the privilege of that Presbytery to recommend to the committee a person for Moderator of the General Assembly. Such recommendation shall be forwarded to the committee no later than March 31 of that year. After March 31, the committee shall evaluate the recommendations of the Presbyteries, as well as other recommendations it may receive, and at the next meeting of the Assembly shall recommend no more than two persons as its nominees for Moderator. At that time, nominations may also be made from the floor. Election shall be by a majority vote of the Assembly. Nominees of the committee shall be advised of their pending nomination, ordinarily no less than thirty days prior to the meeting of the General Assembly.
- To nominate to the Assembly persons for vacancies of all Assembly permanent committees. Recommendations from Sessions or Presbyleries shall be forwarded to the Committee no later than April 30 of that year. The Endorsement for Nomination form shall be used and shall reflect official action of the Session or the Presbytery.
- To name from the Commissioners to the Assembly those who will serve on the various standing committees of the Assembly.

 The Committee shall meet in May each year to select nominee(s) for Moderator of the General Assembly and for permanent committees.

XI. The Board of Pension and Benefits

11-1 The Board of Pension and Benefits shall oversee the administration of the denominational Pension Plan and the Group Insurance Plan.

a. Membership to consist of six persons in three classes of two each, with each person able to succeed himself for one term. A member may be reelected for additional terms after an interim of one year. The members of the Board shall be nominated to the Assembly by the Nominating Committee, with the chairman to be nominated at the Assembly by the outgoing Moderator.

b. Duties: to serve as trustees under the Pension Plan adopted by the Assembly; to administer the Group Insurance Plan; to administer the proceeds of the Gratitude Gift; to make annual report of its proceedings to the Assembly.

XII. New Business

- 12-1 Any matter presented in any form which has not been received by the Stated Clerk prior to the opening of the General Assembly shall be treated as new business.
- 12-2 New business must be presented to the Assembly by noon of the second day of business. The Committee on Administration may assist the Stated Clerk in referring all new business coming to the Assembly.

XIII. Parliamentary Procedure

- 13-1 Except as otherwise specifically provided in these Rules, Robert's Rules of Order shall be the standard in parliamentary procedure.
- 13-2 In presenting the report of a committee, the chairman shall lead the Assembly in a brief prayer before making the report. The entire report shall be read before any comment. The Assembly may waive the reading of any particular report by a majority vote of commissioners present. When a minority of a committee wishes to present a minority report the member reporting for the minority shall have the privilege of presenting the minority report and moving it as a substitute for the portion of the majority report affected.
- 13-3 Each recommendation in each report must be read, considered, and acted on separately.
 - 1. The chairman moves the adoption.
 - The Moderator asks, "Is there objection or question?"
 - Hearing no objection or question, the Moderator states, "It is adopted." (Procedure known as "Short Form of Voting.")

13-4 Procedure in debating a question:

- The committee chairman may answer questions concerning the report addressed through the Moderator.
- The chairman shall have the opportunity to make the final statement in debate.
- No Commissioner may speak on the same question more than once until all desiring to speak have done so.
- Debate on the main motion shall be limited to fifteen (15) minutes unless extended. A simple majority may extend debate in additional five (5) minute increments. No Commissioner may speak longer than three (3) minutes at one time.
- Debate shall be free, open, and responsible with equal time being given to proponents insofar as possible.
- 13-5 All motions shall be presented in writing and read before the vote.

XIV. Amendment or Suspension of Rules

14-1 The Rules of the General Assembly may be amended or suspended only by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the total enrollment of the Commissioners. A motion to amend is debatable. A motion to suspend is not debatable.

Stated Clerk, 1985 (Italicized print indicates a subsequent change in an act. References to Minutes are to section numbers, not page numbers.)

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- 81-10 The document, Rules for Assembly, is adopted, governing procedures for carrying out the business of the General Assembly. Rules may be amended as desired by each General Assembly. (Minutes, 1-6)
- 81-11 The provisional Book of Worship is ratified. (Minutes, 1-22)
- 81-12 The provisional Book of Government is ratified. (Minutes, 1-18)
- 81-13 The Book of Discipline is adopted provisionally. (Minutes, 1-29)
- 82-13 The Assembly approves criteria to guide selection of the location of General Assembly meetings (Minutes 2-46; Appendix I):
 - Geographical suitability, including accessibility to long distance transportation
 - b. Capability of accommodating 350 delegates
 - Facilities for seating a minimum of 750 people for public services
 - d. Adequate financial and personnel resources
 - e. Adequate support services (housing, transportation, food).
- 83-02 Opportunity is to be provided at each General Assembly for pastors seeking a call to meet with churches and ministries seeking to issue a call. (Minutes, 3-37)
- 83-09 The General Assembly endorses a three-fold statement of purpose for General Assembly meetings:
 - To do the business of the Assembly;
 - 2. To be a time of celebration and fellowship:
 - 3. To provide an opportunity for growth in ministry skills. (Minutes, 3-53)
- 84-09 A Preliminary Position Paper is not intended to be a thorough theological statement nor a complete exegetical Biblical study on a particular issue. Rather, such a Paper is intended to set forth in a preliminary way the "mind" of the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church on some particular issue or subject. The purpose of such a Preliminary Position Paper is to enable the Evangelical Presbyterian Church to make a statement to itself, or the Christian community, or the world in general on some issue or subject so that our general position is quickly made clear while the thorough theological or exegetical study may be done in due time. Such a Preliminary Position Paper may be adopted by one Assembly and modified or changed at any succeeding Assembly.

Ordinarily such a Preliminary Position Paper shall have an Ad Interim Committee appointed to send the Paper to the presbyteries and congregations for study and comment and for further

- development theologically and Biblically in order that such Paper might be presented to some subsequent Assembly as a "Position Paper." (Minutes 4-38)
- 84-10 An Ad Interim Committee on Theology is established to enable the Assembly to continue the development of its posture on crucial issues facing its church. Preliminary position papers shall be initiated by the Committee on Administration but individuals, sessions, and presbyteries may also develop such which shall be forwarded to the General Assembly through its Administration Committee. (Minutes, 4-38) Assembly voted in 1988 to establish a permanent Committee on Theology, thus discontinuing the Ad Interim Committee.
- 85-01 All heads of committees, boards, agencies, or commissions, whether male or female, are to be designated as "chairman," and the Assembly shall refrain from usage of the term "chairperson." (Minutes, 5-25)
- 86-01 The General Assembly approves establishment of a permanent Committee on Theology, to be comprised of three Teaching Elders and three Ruling Elders. (Minutes, 6-24)
- 86-02 The Assembly instructs the permanent Committee on Theology to make known to all Ministers and Clerks of Session the date and place of its meetings and the agenda of items to be deliberated, and to welcome input from the constituency regarding said matters. (Minutes, 6-28)
- 86-06 Establishment of a permanent Committee on Women's Ministries is approved, with one representative from each presbytery (appointed initially by the Moderator) to serve a 3-year term after which the regular electoral process of rotation of class will be used. (Minutes, 6-52, 6-69) Assembly of 1989 regularized election process with eligibility being extended to any active church member.
- 86-15 Formation of an historical foundation is approved, and a committee to oversee its development shall be appointed with instructions to prepare a history of the origins of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. The Committee for the Historical Foundation shall be responsible for collecting, cataloging, and preserving historical documents, artifacts, and other iterns of historical significance in the origins and ongoing life of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. (Minutes, 6-75)
- 87-05 The Assembly decides not to do business with hotels and motels promoting pomography for their customers in the cities where future General Assemblies are held, and further will encourage its constituents to refrain personally from patronizing such establishments. (Minutes 7-38)

- 94-27 In keeping with the Denominational Goals for Pastoral Care, the Assembly approves holding an annual "growth experience for persons in ministry focusing on spiritual, emotional, marital, family and church life" beginning with the 15th General Assembly (1995). (Minutes, 14-37)
- 97-01 The Assembly ratifies a new Book of Discipline. (Minutes, 17-7)
- 97-28 A permanent Presbytery Review Committee is established, to consist of three members at least one of whom is to be a former stated clerk of presbytery. (Minutes 17-46)
- 00-10 The Assembly adopts Forms 1-19 for inclusion in the Book of Discipline. (Minutes, 20-43)

OFFICE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- 82-01 The General Assembly approves the establishment of an Office of the General Assembly and authorizes the employment (calling) of an Administrative Coordinator who shall also serve as Stated Clerk, and a Director of Church Development who shall be primarily responsible for church planting and congregational development. (Minutes, 2-32, Appendix E)).
- 82-02 The Administration Committee shall select a permanent place for the Office of the General Assembly to be approved by the Administrative Commission. (Minutes, 2-32) (In 1992, the Assembly affirmed locating the permanent assembly office in the Detroit metropolitan area. Cf. Act 92-03.)

- 85-09 The Christian Education and Publications Committee is authorized to develop, for sale to the churches, standardized forms such as certificates for infant baptism, church membership, etc. (Minutes, 5-46)
- 86-13 The Assembly instructs the stated clerks of presbyteries to request every congregation to recommend Ruling Elders willing and qualified to serve on specific permanent committees; further, to instruct the Stated Clerk of General Assembly to produce a brief description of duties and responsibilities for each permanent committee along with upcoming vacancies. Clerks of presbyteries are requested to submit a combined list of available Ruling Elders from member congregations, along with their qualifications, experience, and brief biographical sketch. Copies of pertinent documents are to be transmitted to each member of the Nominating Committee prior to its meeting. (Minutes, 6-70) (Cf. Rules, §10, for description of permanent Committee on Nominations.)
- 88-01 The Assembly approves the purchase of a 10-acre parcel of land adjacent to and owned by Trinity Presbyterian, Plymouth, Michigan for future construction of the General Assembly Office. (Minutes, 8-64)
- 90-01 The Assembly approves position of half-time Director of Women's Ministries and grants an exception to its fiscal policy (Act 83-08) permitting the position to be funded for a period not exceeding three years through the Women's Ministries "Faith Focus" benevolence asking. (Minutes, 10-24)
- 90-02 The Assembly approves a half-time Director of Youth Ministries position and granted an exception to its fiscal policy (Act 83-08) permitting the position to be funded by benevolence giving for a period not exceeding five years. (Minutes, 10-25) The 1991 Assembly approved establishment of full-time Director of Youth Ministries. Cf. Act 91-04.

- 90-06 The position of Director of Resource Management (Business Administrator) for the Office of the General Assembly is affirmed. (Minutes, 10-28)
- 90-07 The General Assembly approves the establishment of an Evaluation Committee for the annual evaluation of the Stated Clerk, and to review with the Stated Clerk the evaluation of the General Assembly staff. Committee will report annually to the Administration Committee. The Evaluation Committee shall be enlarged every third year by two persons coinciding with the year of election of the Stated Clerk to provide a more comprehensive evaluation. Evaluation and nomination of the Stated Clerk shall be made by the Committee on Administration to the Assembly. (Minutes, 10-28).
- 91-04 The General Assembly approves the establishment of a full-time Director of Youth Ministries. (Minutes, 11-27) (Cf. Act 90-02.)
- 92-03 The Assembly approves the continuation of the General Assembly Office in the Detroit, Michigan area, specifically one of the western suburbs, and to continue monitoring the needs of and services to the particular churches to determine any shifts in location criteria. (Minutes 12-25)
- 92-22 The Assembly approved the division of the Department of Outreach into two departments: World Outreach and National Outreach. Each is to have its own director. (Minutes, 12-46)

The Assembly's desire is to have this person in place by the 18th (1998) General Assembly. (Minutes, 16-36)

CONFESSIONAL MATTERS

- 81-01 The Essentials of the Faith is adopted. Its purpose shall be to give a clear concise statement of the fundamentals of Christian faith as embodied in the Westminster Confession and professed by the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. (Minutes, 1-12, 1-17, Appendix III) (Act 93-17 further clarifies the purpose of the Essentials.)
- 84-01 The General Assembly shall print the Summertown edition of the Westminster Confession of Faith (published by Attic Press) with introduction and appropriate table of contents, appendices #1 and #2, and shall exclude the Declaratory Statement. (Minutes, 4-23)
- 85-15 The Westminster Confession of Faith (EPC edition) shall include as a prefatory statement "The Essentials of the Faith." (Minutes, 5-28)

- 87-03 The Assembly endorses the addition of the Westminster Confession of Faith, The Essentials of the Faith, and the Shorter Catechism to separate sections in the loose leaf Book of Order. (Minutes, 7-36)
- 88-19 The Assembly adopts as resource for its congregations "The Chicago Statement on Biblical Inerrancy." Minutes, 8-56; text of statement pp. 70-73 of 8th Assembly Minutes)
- 88-20 The Assembly endorses for distribution to its churches The Children's Catechism: A New Modern Version, published by Summertown Texts, Signal Mountain, Tennessee (1988). (Minutes, 8-55)
- 88-29 The Assembly concurred with the Committee on Theology, which was given the task of studying the relationship between "The Essentials" and the Westminster Confession of Faith. This referral came out of a motion to the 7th General Assembly to make "The Essentials" a part of our Constitution.

The Committee concurs with the Stated Clerk that "The Essentials" should not be made a part of our Constitution and given that authority. This document now carries the authority of an Act of the Assembly (reference Acts of the Assembly §81-1).

In order to further understand the relationship between "The Essentials" and the Westminster Confession of Faith, it is important to remember our historical context. As Presbyterians, we hold the Westminster Confession of Faith to be our standard of doctrine as it is found in Scripture. This standard is held not only in the intellect but also in the heart. The Westminster Confession of Faith is a positive statement of what we believe Scripture teaches.

"The Essentials" is a distillation for the Westminster Confession of Faith and is helpful in stating what we believe. The two are not in contradiction but are in harmony with one another as an expression of Reformed doctrine.

Courts of the EPC should encourage their members to continue studying our Confession in the light of the Word of God that we may grow theologically and spiritually together, unto the stature of the fullness of Christ. (Minutes, 8-60)

- 89-01 Baptisms at some court of the church other than the session shall be done only by a Pastor and at least one Ruling Elder from the same particular church (Book of Worship, §3-2E) and shall conform to the stipulations of the Book of Worship on baptism. As members of the EPC, members of the court may participate in the responses to the questions proposed to a congregation. Further, it may not be done unless:
 - One of the parents is a member in good standing of a particular church which is a true branch of the visible Church and to which notification of the baptism is made in accordance with W.3-2Gl.
 - 2. Or, if the only presenting parent is a member of the presbytery and therefore does not belong to a particular church, that person shall stipulate prior to the baptism in what particular church the baptized person shall be enrolled. It is not within the jurisdiction of a presbytery or the General Assembly to authorize baptisms since that is a duty of a session. However, a baptism may be performed at such a court provided the above considerations are met. (Minutes, 9-52)

- 92-06 The Assembly encourages the use of the Westminster Confession of Faith Commentary (Summertown Texts) in EPC churches. (Minutes, 12-27)
- 93-08 Assembly adopts "Pastoral Letter on Children and the Lord's Supper" as guidance to the churches on the subject of young children and their participation in the sacrament of communion, and that Roger Beckwith's article (Westminster Theological Journal, Fall, 1975) "Age of Admission to the Lord's Supper," should accompany this letter. (Minutes, 13-26)

PASTORAL LETTER ON CHILDREN AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

The permanent Committee on Theology issues this pastoral letter to the General Assembly in response to its request for guidance on the subject of young children and their participation in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Administration of and participation in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper must be done in accordance with Scripture as expressed in the Westminster Confession of Faith, Chapters 27 & 29, the Westminster Shorter Catechism, Questions 96 & 97, and the Westminster Larger Catechism, Questions 168 through 177.

The history of the Reformed tradition on this matter is fairly clear that young children have not been admitted to the Lord's Supper. However, the early church until the twelfth century did permit the practice. In recent years, greater interest has developed among the Reformed denominations in allowing such to participate.

It is the conclusion of this committee that Scripture, as explained by our confessional standards, permits only those who are of faith in Christ to participate in the Lord's Supper. Further, none who are of saving faith in Christ are to be prevented from it (WLC, 173). Those who do participate must be able to discern the nature of the sacrament (WLC, 170 & 174), must prepare themselves for worthy participation (WLC 171 & 173), and be able to engage in self-examination at the time of and following participation (I Cor. 11: 26-30, WLC, 175).

The Session of the church is charged with the responsibility to discern the credibility of the profession of those who wish to participate in the Lord's Supper, regardless of age. This is explained in the Westminster Larger Catechism, # 173.

- Q. May any who profess the faith and desire to come to the Lord's Supper be kept from it?
- A. Such as are found to be ignorant or scandalous, notwithstanding their profession of the faith, and desire to come to the Lord's Supper, may and ought to be kept from that sacrament, by the power which Christ hath left in his church, until they receive instruction and manifest their reformation.

The advice of this committee is that, though a local session is not required to admit young children to participate in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, it may permit them if the following criteria are met:

- The child has been administered the sacrament or Christian captions.
 The child presents a credible profession of faith as determined initially by his or her parents, and
- 3. The child is able to evidence to the Session a basic understanding of the nature of the sacrament as it is set forth in the Scriptures and in the Constitution of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church.

The Session must still continue to exercise diligence in its covenant responsibilities toward those children who are admitted to the Lord's Supper. The Session may or may not choose to admit the child into active membership at that time.

93-17 The Assembly sustains the opinion of the Permanent Judicial Commission concerning the purpose of the Essentials of the Faith:

> The purpose of the Essentials of the Faith is to provide an explicit and concise expression of the essentials of the Christian faith, but also leave room for Christians to disagree on nonessentials. It is never to be used as an explicit standard for a minimal core of beliefs for

candidates, ordination, or ministerial exams. It is not to duplicate the Westminster Confession of Faith, or to be construed as a substitute for the WCF. Because it is not part of the Constitution, it is never to be used as such. Theoretically, a person could affirm the Essentials, as all knowledgeable Christians would do, but disagree with the WCF. Such a person would be unacceptable as a Teaching or Ruling Elder in the EPC, being out of accord with its Constitution. On the other hand, a person cannot affirm the WCF and disbelieve any part of the Essentials. The Essentials are to be subscribed to in addition to the full WCF (G,I4-IA-4). (Minutes 13-38) (The 16th General Assembly (1996) voted to delete the last sentence of this Act #93-17. (Minutes, 16-26)

- 97-11 The Assembly adopts the ruling of the Permanent Judicial Commission that the current form of the fourth ordination yow is the result of an unauthorized typographical alteration and that the words "essentials of the faith" should be printed in small case and plain letters. Future editions of the Book of Government are to be printed to conform to this correction.
 (Minutes 17-26)
- 97-12 The Assembly instructs the permanent Committee on Theology to undertake a comprehensive study of the relationship that now exists and that should exist between the "Essentials of the Faith" and the Westminster Confession of Faith to include, but not be limited to, an examination of the relevance of each to the Constitution of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, the vows of ordination for pastors and elders, relations with other denominations and the teaching and edification of lay persons. (Minutes 17-29)
- 98-02 That Assembly adopts a report entitled, "Response of the Permanent Theology Committee to the 17th General Assembly Instructions Regarding 'The Essentials' and the Westminster Confession." (Minutes 18-25)
- 99-07 The Assembly strongly exhorts churches to diligently train officers and ordinands in the essential tenets of the Reformed faith and recommends that sessions and presbyteries familiarize themselves with the "Response of the Permanent Theology Committee to the Seventeenth General Assembly Instructions Regarding 'The Essentials' and the Westminster Confession' and use such works as R.C. Sproul's Essential Truths of the Christian Faith (Tyndale House, 1998 paper). (Minutes, 19-27)

PRESBYTERIES

- 81-02 Presbyteries shall meet at least twice during the year and a third time during the General Assembly (Minutes, 1-24). (Modified in Act 88-02 to require minimum of three annual meetings but not during General Assembly.)
- 81-03 Presbyteries shall have as goals for their meetings the following:
 - To develop fellowship and support for pastors and elders;
 - b. To share resources with other churches;
 - c. To encourage church planting strategies. (Minutes, 1-24)
- 81-08 The first two presbyteries are constituted: The Presbytery of the Midwest and the Presbytery of the West. The boundaries are as follows:
 - Presbytery of the Midwest consists of the states of Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and Missouri.
 - Presbytery of the West consists of Colorado and the states north, south, and west of Colorado. (Minutes, 1-24)

- 82-04 The Presbytery of the East is constituted and shall include the states of Maryland, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, and Washington, DC. (Minutes, 2-32, Appendix E)
- 82-05 The Presbytery of the South is constituted and shall include the states of Virginia, West Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi, Louisiana, and Arkansas. (Minutes, 2-32, Appendix E)
- 82-06 Churches in Texas and southern Illinois shall be given their choice as to which contiguous presbytery each respective church belongs. (Minutes, 2-32)
- 83-03 Presbyteries shall use the approved standardized "Application Candidates for Gospel Ministry" for persons seeking to come under care of presbyteries. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-04 Session shall use the approved "Session Approval Form" for commending candidates to presbyteries. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-06 Presbyteries shall use the approved "Call for Pastor or Associate Pastor" form for ministerial terms of call. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-10 The Presbytery of the Far West is constituted and shall include the states of California and Arizona (Minutes, 3-54)
- 83-12 The Presbytery of the South is divided into two Presbyteries; the Presbytery of the Southeast and the Presbytery of the Central South. Presbytery of the Southeast shall include the states of Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, plus eastern portions of Florida, Kentucky, and Tennessee. Presbytery of the Central South shall include states of Alabama, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, plus western portions of Florida, Kentucky, and Tennessee. (Minutes, 3-54)
- 84-11 Boundaries of the Presbytery of the East are extended to include those churches which fall within the bounds of the greater Washington, DC metropolitan area and the Fairfax County, Arlington County, and Alexandria areas of Virginia. (Minutes, 4-40)
- 84-12 Boundaries of the Presbytery of the East are extended to include those churches in eastern Ohio which lie east of Interstate 77. (Minutes, 4-40)
- 85-02 The Stated Clerk of the General Assembly shall annually forward to each presbytery the names of persons from that presbytery who are members of General Assembly permanent committees. (Minutes, 5-25)
- 85-03 The boundaries of the Presbytery of the Central South shall be amended to include the state of Missouri. (Minutes, 5-29)
- 85-04 The counties of Loudon and Prince William (Virginia) shall be added to the Presbytery of the East. (Minutes, 5-29)
- 85-14 The General Assembly encourages all presbyteries to develop presbytery councils consisting at least of its clerk, moderator, and immediate past moderator. Council shall be responsible for planning arrangements for presbytery meetings, including the service of worship. (Minutes, 5-25)

86-04 The Presbytery of the East shall be divided into two presbyteries: East and Allegheny. The Allegheny Presbytery shall have as its eastern boundary a line running from and including Rochester, New York, to Chambersburg, Pennsylvania and 1-81. The southern boundary shall include the state of West Virginia except for the eastern panhandle. Western boundary shall include eastern Ohio from 1-77 eastward including the city of Cleveland.

Presbytery of the East shall include the rest of New York, the eastern part of Pennsylvania, the New England states, all of New Jersey, Maryland, and Delaware. Also the eastern panhandle of West Virginia, the District of Columbia, and the Washington, DC metropolitan areas of Virginia which include the counties of Loudon, Prince William, Arlington, Fairfax, and the cities of Alexandria and Fairfax. (Minutes, 6-51)

- 86-05 The EPC, Anna, Illinois is placed within the bounds of the Central South Presbytery. Boundaries of the presbytery would then include all of the state of Illinois south of 1-70. (Minutes, 6-51)
- 86-13 The Assembly instructs the stated clerks of presbyteries to request every congregation to recommend Ruling Elders willing and qualified to serve on specific permanent committees. Further, to instruct the Stated Clerk of General Assembly to produce a brief description of duties and responsibilities for each permanent committee along with upcoming vacancies. Clerks of presbyteries are requested to submit a combined list of available Ruling Elders from member congregations, along with their qualifications, experience, and brief biographical sketch. Copies of pertinent documents are to be transmitted to each member of the Nominating Committee prior to its meeting. (Minutes, 6-70). (Cf. Rules, §10, for description of permanent Nominating Committee.)
- 87-07 The boundaries of the West Presbytery are extended to include the states of Washington and Idaho. (Minutes, 7-44)
- 87-08 The metropolitan area of Kansas City and contiguous counties of that city within the state of Kansas (West Presbytery) shall be placed totally within the bounds of the Central South Presbytery. (Minutes, 7-44)
- 87-11 The Presbytery of Iglesia Presbiteriana San Andres, formed in Buenos Aires, Argentina shall be received, consisting of five particular churches. (Minutes, 7-51)
- 88-02 Presbyteries shall meet at least three times per year. (Minutes, 8-64)
- 88-03 The entire state of Florida is placed within the bounds of the Southeast Presbytery. (Minutes, 8-31)
- 88-04 The Presbytery of the Southeast is divided into two smaller presbyteries: The Mid-Atlantic Presbytery and the Presbytery of the Southeast. Mid-Atlantic Presbytery shall include the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, and the portions of Virginia previously included in the Southeast Presbytery. Southeast Presbytery shall include the states of Florida, Georgia, and the eastern portions of Tennessee and Kentucky. (Minutes, 8-31)
- 88-05 The boundaries of the Presbytery of the Central South are amended to include that section of Kansas which lies east of Highway 81 to include all of the city of Wichita. Western portion of Kansas remains with the Presbytery of the West. (Minutes, 8-31)

- 88-06 The Assembly approves the concept of presbyteries covenanting with colleges and other educational institutions but disapproved the General Assembly entering into such agreements.

 (Minutes, 8-55)
- 90-09 Boundaries for the Presbytery of St. Andrews shall consist of the province of Buenos Aires. (Minutes, 10-36)
- 90-11 The Presbytery of Florida is established, encompassing the state of Florida. The boundaries of the Presbytery of the Southeast are adjusted accordingly. (Minutes, 10-36)
- 91-05 A commission can be created only by an appointing court to serve as a commission for a limited time as specified by presbytery. No committee of presbytery shall have continuing authority to serve as a commission except as specifically authorized by G.16-26B and G.16-27A. 12. No committee has the authority to create commissions. The rationale is that a committee is not a court of the church. (Minutes, 11-35)
- 91-06 The Presbytery of the Central South is divided into two presbyteries:
 - 1. Central South: Northern boundary extends from 1-65 at (but excluding) Louisville, along the Ohio River to the confluence of the Wabash and Ohio Rivers, westward along Highway 13 to Murphysboro, Illinois, then due west to the Mississippi River. Then is extended from the Mississippi River due west of Murphysboro south to the Arkansas state line. Across the northern state line of Arkansas westward to the western state line. South on the Arkansas state line to the junction of the present boundary at the Texas state line. Boundaries of the continuing Presbytery of the Central South would remain as presently established.
 - 2. Mid-America: Southern boundary follows 1-40 from and including Oklahoma City to the Arkansas state line. Northward on the Arkansas state line to the junction of the Missouri-Arkansas state line, then eastward to the Mississippi River. North along the Mississippi River to the point due west of Murphysboro, Illinois, and due east to Murphysboro along Highway 13 to the confluence of the Ohio and Wabash Rivers. Northward along the eastern boundary of Illinois and westward across the northern state line of Illinois to the Iowa state line. Northward on the eastern state line of Iowa and westward on the northern Iowa state line to the western state line. Southward on the western Iowa state line to the present junction of the Kansas state line. Westward to US 81 and southward along US 81 (1-135,1-35) to and including Oklahoma City. (Minutes, 11-37)
- 92-08 The Assembly amends the boundaries of the Central South and Southeast Presbyteries so that the Nashville metropolitan area is included in its entirety in the Central South Presbytery.

The boundaries of the Central South Presbytery shall be as follows: From the Kentucky-Tennessee state line at I-65 east to the Sumner-Macon County, Tennessee line; south on the Sumner-Macon county line to the intersection of Wilson County; south on the Wilson-Trousedale, Wilson-Smith, and Wilson-DeKalb county lines to the Wilson-Rutherford county

line; west on the Wilson-Rutherford county line to the intersection of US 231; south on US 231 to the Tennessee-Alabama state line; west on the Tennessee-Alabama state line to the intersection of the Alabama-Georgia state line. (Minutes, 12-29)

92-09 Boundaries of the Presbyteries of Mid-America and Central South are amended so that the Arkansas counties of BentonBurton, Washington, Carroll, Boone and Madison are included in the Presbytery of Mid-America. (Minutes, 12-29)

- 92-10 The Assembly approves amending the boundaries of the Allegheny Presbytery to exclude the city of Bluefield, West Virginia and its county, assigning the designated area to the Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic. (Minutes 12-29)
- 92-11 Presbyteries are encouraged to establish World Outreach Committees to accelerate the foreign missions endeavor throughout the denomination. (Minutes, 12-42)
- 93-05 The Assembly adopts "Position Statement on Presbytery Development."

POSITION STATEMENT ON PRESBYTERY DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this position statement is to be a guide to the General Assembly in making decisions concerning the establishment of new presbyteries or the realignment of current boundaries.

The church as the body of Christ is composed of all those persons who profess Jesus as their Lord and Savior, together with their children. The church on earth is not limited to particular forms of government or denominational structures; nevertheless, the government of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall be Presbyterian in form. Such is government by Elders meeting in church courts in regular gradation. The Evangelical Presbyterian Church believes the perfecting of the visible church is best established where the scriptural doctrine of government by Elders gathered in church courts is practiced.

The courts of the church shall be the Session, the Presbytery, and the General Assembly. Presbytery shall be composed of all Ministers belonging to it, and two Ruling Elders for each Minister drawn from the particular churches within its bounds.

The Presbytery has jurisdiction over all that belongs to the worship and ministry of a group of churches within the designated bounds. In its spiritual oversight, the mission of the Presbytery shall be:

1. The nurture and care of persons called to the office of Minister, and oversight of all transactions pursuant to call.

The provision of spiritual discipline according to the Book of Discipline.

3. The oversight of church Sessions through annual review.

4. The maintenance of peace and unity within the congregations.

 The establishment and development of churches.
 The encouragement of evangelism, renewal and ministries of compassion within the congregations and Presbytery.

7. The active participation in the life of the General Assembly.

- 8. The organization of the Presbytery for maximum advancement of the Gospel and the Kingdom.
- 9. The provision of resources to member congregations promoting effective evangelism, education, stewardship, officer training and the like.

In pursuit of its mission, the question naturally arises as to what constitutes a viable Presbytery. Viability may be defined as "the ability with maximum efficiency to achieve a stated mission." The basic components of a viable Presbytery within the Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall be understood as the following:

- 1. LEADERSHIP: A Presbytery must have adequate personnel resources to support the local church as well as Presbytery's committees and commissions.
- FINANCIAL RESOURCES: Sufficient resources must be available to support the mission and life of a Presbytery. A minimum budget of \$100,000 ('93 dollar basis) per year is necessary.
- 3. COMMITMENT: Leadership and resources are of little value if the solid commitment of Teaching and Ruling Elders of each church to the connectional form of government is absent.
- 4. DEMOGRAPHICS: The minimum requirements for a Presbytery need to be:

a. a large church (1000 + members);

- b. twelve organized churches;
- a composite membership base of 2,500.
- 5. OFFICE OF THE STATED CLERK: The Stated Clerk shall be provided with office equipment and necessary support staff to carry out the duties of the office as defined in the Presbytery by-laws.
- GEOGRAPHIC PROXIMITY: Presbytery boundaries should be established to keep travel distances between churches to a reasonable minimum. (Minutes, 13-25)

- 93-06 Assembly approves dissolution of the Allegheny Presbytery, realigning the state of West Virginia with the Presbytery of the Mid-Atlantic, the states of New York and Pennsylvania to the Presbytery of the East, and the state of Ohio to the Presbytery of the Midwest. (Minutes, 13-25)
- 93-07 Assembly approves dissolution of the Presbytery of the Far West, realigning the states of California and Arizona with the Presbytery of the West. (Minutes, 13-25)
- 93-16 Presbyteries are encouraged to consider having a Women's Ministries Committee, and to devise an effective means of coordinating the input of that committee with the other committees of the Presbytery. (Minutes, 13-35)
- 94-12 The Assembly approves redrawing the boundaries of the Mid-America and Central South Presbyteries, so as to move the extreme southeastern portion of Missouri (including the "boot heel" counties of Cape Girardeau, Bollinger, Wayne, Carter and Oregon) from the Presbytery of Mid-America to the Presbytery of the Central South. (Minutes, 14-25)
- 94-22 A lawfully ordained minister in good standing of a non-EPC church may be authorized to serve communion in an EPC church, with the concurrence of the Presbytery. (PJC opinion, Minutes, 14-36)
- 94-23 While a Session is encouraged in the spirit of church unity to receive information from a Presbytery committee resulting from a committee inquiry, the Session cannot be forced to hear information from a Presbytery committee. (PJC opinion, Minutes 14-36)
- 94-24 In cases where a Session has been deposed, an Administration Commission of Presbytery shall be authorized to provide pastoral assistance to the congregation, but shall not otherwise act, even temporarily, with sessional powers defined in G.16-10 with the following exceptions:
 - To call and conduct a congregational meeting (G.8-IB) within 30 days;
 - 2. To train, if necessary, those elected as required in G.12-3.
 - To examine those elected, as required by G.13-7,8, and 9.
 - To promptly and in a manner consistent with G.13-7 and I4-IE,F install those favorably examined.

Every effort shall be made to preserve the church's right to elect its own officers. (PJC opinion, Minutes, 14-36)

- 94-28 Presbytery minutes shall be maintained in English in addition to any other language the court wishes to maintain, and this edition shall be rendered in a timely fashion. (Minutes, 14-38) [The 15th General Assembly reaffirmed this action. (Minutes, 15-39)]
- 95-10 Boundaries of the Mid-Atlantic and Southeast Presbyteries are realigned to move five churches formerly in the Mid-Atlantic Presbytery into the Southeast Presbytery. These churches are Community Bible Church (Highlands, NC), Plumtree (Plumtree, NC), Grace and Cornerstone (both of Franklin, NC) and Harvest Church (Asheville, NC). (Minutes, 15-28) [COA clarified geographic boundaries encompassing the above to be that portion of North Carolina west of State Routes #221 and #194.]
- 97-08 The boundaries of St. Andrews Presbytery (Argentina) are extended to include the Entre Rios and Santa Fe provinces. (Minutes, 17-25)

- 97-09 The Proposed Partnership Agreement between the St. Andrews Presbytery and the General Assembly (October 28-29, 1996) is ratified. (Minutes, 17-25)
- 98-03 The Assembly instructs all Presbyteries to use the forms included as attachments to the EPC Procedure Manual for Ministerial and Candidates Committee (Third Edition) both as a check list of proper procedure and as a way of recording that required actions have been taken. (Minutes 18-29)
- 98-04 The Assembly instructs all Presbyteries to review the style of their minutes to insure that a basic understanding of the actions taken by the Presbytery can be obtained from the body of the minutes, per se, without reference to any attachments. (Minutes 18-29)
- 98-05 The Assembly instructs all Presbyteries to supply the Presbytery Review Committee with certified copies of the pages of their minutes subject to review as they appear in the official minute books of the Presbytery at least five weeks prior to the meeting date of the next General Assembly. (Minutes 18-29)
- 98-15 The Assembly approves the following addition to the Procedure Manual for Ministerial and Candidates Committees:

Presbyteries shall perform a background investigation on all individuals seeking candidacy or membership in their Presbytery. This investigation of public records shall include at least a verification of social security number, criminal history and motor vehicle driving history. Also, as part of the reception process, references must be checked. (Minutes, 18-41)

- 99-13 The Assembly redraws the common boundaries of the Mid-America and Midwest Presbyteries so that the states of Minnesota and Wisconsin are moved from the Midwest Presbytery to the Mid-America Presbytery (Minutes, 19-46)
- 00-11 The Assembly adopts additional guidelines for Presbytery Minutes:
 - Standardization of numbering sections and subsections;
 - b. Standardization of attendance reporting:
 - Checklists to be used by Presbyteries to insure required actions have been taken and properly reported;
 - Standardization of reporting corrections to minutes made in response to exceptions issued by the General Assembly. (Minutes, 20-46)

OFFICE OF THE MINISTER

- 81-04 Terms of call for any minister of member churches shall provide for participation in the denominational hospitalization and disabilities programs. (Minutes, 1-32)
- 81-05 Terms of call for any minister shall provide a minimum of 18% benefit to provide for group hospitalization, disability, and pension. The pension factor shall be not less than 10%. This benefit shall be computed on the gross effective salary base, i.e., salary and housing/utilities allowance. (Minutes, 1-32)
- 81-06 The denominational group insurance plan providing health, disability, and life coverage shall be mandatory for all ministers within member churches. (Minutes, 1-36)

Uniform Procedures on Candidacy and Ordination:

- 1. Requirements for ordination shall be:
 - a. Bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university;
 - Seminary degree M.Div. or equivalent including Koine Greek and Hebrew:
 - c. Care of presbytery for a minimum of one year;
 - d. Examinations four written and one oral examination must be sustained;
 - e. Valid call:

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- f. Other evidence Assurance those spiritual gifts needed for effective ministry are present and being developed.
- 2. All exceptions to fulfilling standards for ordination (extraordinary circumstances) will be referred to the permanent Committee on Ministerial Vocation for a recommended course of action, including continuing education and reading requirements. The presbytery of jurisdiction shall, in conjunction with the Committee on Ministerial Vocation:
 - Mail necessary documentation (personal history, etc.) to the permanent committee for its review and counsel, and
 - 2-2. Proceed with process of ordination only after receiving recommendations from the permanent Committee on Ministerial Vocation.
- Persons seeking membership within a presbytery may be received as enrolled members only upon evidence of a call endorsed by the presbytery.
- 4. Terms of call: The amount of annual vacation time: one month.
- Terms of call: The amount of time to be given for study leave: two weeks, cumulative up to six weeks.

Ordained World Outreach career missionaries serving abroad shall be allowed to accumulate their study leave and funding for four years to be used in their fifth year in a program of study under the supervision of the World Outreach Director. Those in domestic service are limited to the standard three years accumulation. Career missionaries shall be allowed \$800 per year for study leave.

Cf. Act 94-25. The 14th General Assembly amended this document, originally adopted in 1982 (Minutes 2-42), by dropping "Licensure" from the title as well as paragraphs 1, 4, and 5 having to do with licensure. (Minutes, 14-37) The 19th General Assembly further amended this document in #5, "Terms of Call," by adding provision for career missionaries. (Minutes, 19-31)

- 82-10 The General Assembly approves the concept of self-funding insurance and instructs its Committee on Administration to execute a plan in trust as appropriate. Individual churches are urged to assume the deductible portion of the health insurance program and cost of coinsurance as part of a minister's compensation. (Minutes, 2-52, Appendix I)
- 83-01 The Committee on Ministerial Vocation shall provide the presbyteries a letter encouraging each session to annually review pastoral and staff compensation, taking into account such factors as changes in cost of living, performance, capabilities of the congregation, and economic conditions of the community. Each presbytery shall determine how best to use the letter. (Minutes, 3-37)
- 83-02 Opportunity shall be provided at each General Assembly for pastors seeking a call to meet with churches and other ministries seeking to issue a call. (Minutes, 3-37)

- 83-03 Presbyteries shall use the approved standardized "Application Candidates for Gospel Ministry" for persons seeking to come under care of presbyteries. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-04 Session shall use the approved "Session Approval Form" for commending candidates to presbyteries. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-05 A standardized "Personal Information Form" shall be provided for ministers seeking admission into the EPC and for EPC ministers seeking a change in call. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-06 Presbyteries shall use the approved "Call for Pastor or Associate Pastor" form for ministerial terms of call. (Minutes, 3-48)
- 83-07 The denomination shall provide an approved "Candidates Educational Equivalency Program" (CEEP) for presbyteries preparing candidates for the ministry who have extraordinary circumstances. Program shall be under general oversight of Ministerial Vocation Committee. (Minutes, 3-50)
- 83-14 The General Assembly charges its Ministerial Vocation Committee with the responsibility for developing a thorough Continuing Education Program for Ministers. To be included in such study are the following needs:
 - a. the need for pastoral development in study leave;
 - b. the need for quality content in the study leave;
 - the need for non-pastoral professional staff to be included in professional development time.

While encouraging all churches to participate in continuing education programs, the Assembly urges the Ministerial Vocation Committee, in devising such a plan, to preserve the ministers' and local session's liberty to choose those quality programs which best meet their needs, whether or not they be denominationally sponsored. (Minutes, 3-30)

- 83-15 The General Assembly instructs the Ministerial Vocation Committee to proceed to design a process for the proper maintenance of the military chaplaincy program (Minutes, 3-37)
- 84-02 The General Assembly sustains the Permanent Judicial Commission's opinion that "It is contrary to the Westminster Confession of Faith (27-4) and the Constitution of the Church, Book of Worship (3-1), to allow persons who are not ordained Ministers of the Word to administer the sacraments." Document entitled "Uniform Procedures on Candidacy, Licensure, and Ordination" (Minutes 1983) shall be amended accordingly. (Minutes, 4-23) (The 14th General Assembly amended this document by dropping the provision for licensure. Minutes, 14-37)
- 84-03 General Assembly approves for printing the proposed Manual for Candidates for the Gospel Ministries. (Minutes, 4-23, p. 16)
- 84-07 Licensed candidates with extraordinary status having been previously granted sacramental authority for their congregations may be given special dispensation to continue (cf. Act 84-02) while diligently pursuing ordination. Only candidates on record as of the 4th General Assembly given such authority may continue. No new candidates may be so treated. (Minutes 4-36)
- 84-08 General Assembly adopts the self-funding group insurance plan offered by The Travelers and gives authority to the permanent Committee on Administration to approve and establish all details relative to the establishment of proposed plan.
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General Assembly requires pastors and employees of all member congregations, all presbyteries, and the Assembly who meet minimum requirements to enroll in the program. This major medical program shall be reviewed annually and a full report made to the

General Assembly (Minutes, 4-37).

- 84-15 The Ministerial Endowment Fund is established to meet specific, extraordinary financial needs of Ministers of the Word, missionaries and other full-time Christian workers who are members of or working under the auspices of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. (Minutes, 4-23)
- 85-05 The General Assembly sustains the Permanent Judicial Commission's opinion regarding the office of co-pastor as being non-existent. Relationships between teaching elders and EPC congregations sanctioned by the Book of Government are those of Pastor, Associate Pastor, and Assistant Pastor. (Minutes. 5-40)
- 85-06 Assistant Pastors are full voting members of their presbyteries. (Minutes, 5-40)
- 85-08 General Assembly endorses a special denominational voluntary Christmas offering to help needy ministers or missionaries and authorizes EPC churches to receive such an offering whose funds shall be administered by the permanent Committee on Administration.
 (Minutes, 5-43). Cf. Act 87-14 for establishment of Christmas "Gratitude Gift" offering.
- 86-03 The General Assembly instructs the permanent Committee on Ministerial Vocation to investigate, evaluate, and develop a plan to assist with the pastoral care of our pastors, their families, and congregations. (Minutes, 6-43)
- 87-12 The Assembly approves the establishment of an employer-sponsored tax-sheltered annuity program for the required minimum (10%) of gross effective salary for retirement for each minister and missionary, and urges each congregation to participate in such program (Minutes, 7-53).
- 87-14 An annual "Gratitude Gift" offering in connection with the Christmas season is approved. Monies received to be used by the Pension Committee to supplement income of our retired ministers and missionaries who participate in the denominational program. (Minutes, 7-53)
- 87-22 The General Assembly endorses the document, "Denominational Goals for Pastoral Care." (Minutes, 7-60; also p. 124)
- 88-07 Chaplains are encouraged to hold membership in the presbytery allowing the greatest participation and most effective ministry. (Minutes, 8-41)
- 88-08 Assembly amends participatory requirements for group health insurance plan by requiring participation of all ministers on the rolls of presbyteries with the exception of:
 - missionaries laboring in cooperative agreements with mission agencies;

Argentine Declaration

Whereas we, the participants in the Argentine Consultation, thank God that in his providence our denomination, the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, has become a redemptive instrument for the Presbytery of St. Andrews, whereby an awareness of purpose and mission, within Reformed doctrine, has revitalized the life of its member churches. We further trust that this process in the years ahead will be one of mutual blessing and resound to the glory of God.

The participants of the Consultation make the following declaration:

 It further reaffirms that the Church is best established where the scriptural doctrine of government by elders gathered in church courts is practiced.

- 00-01 The Assembly authorized the Committee on Administration to continue the relationship of the EPC with the Presbyterian Church of Brazil (IPB). The relationship will include exchange programs for youth, leadership, and music ministry, theological education programs, joint missionary projects and church planting. (Minutes 20-20; Communication 00-14)
- 00-06 The Assembly adopts an updated World Outreach Master Plan, stating goals and objectives for 2002 and 2005, placing East Asia more substantially in the goals, and adding overseas international church planting as a new field focus. (**Minutes**, 20-29)

FRATERNAL MATTERS

- 81-07 The Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall seek membership in the National Association of Evangelicals. (Minutes, 1-39)
- 82-11 The Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall pursue with the highest ethical conduct, fraternal relationship with other evangelical Reformed bodies. (Minutes, 2-56, Appendix K)
- 83-17 The Assembly establishes and elects a permanent Fraternal Relations Committee, consisting of six members. The Stated Clerk is instructed to draw up a job description for the committee. (Minutes, 3-31)
- 84-05 The General Assembly instructs the Stated Clerk to make denominational application for membership into the World Alliance of Reformed Churches. (Minutes, 4-26)

84-06 The General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church seeks, through its Fraternal Relations Committee, to identify, develop, and implement relationships with other bodies of Christians which will promote the Lordship of Jesus Christ, the unity of His Body, and the strengthening of the Kingdom of God on earth. To this end, the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, through its Fraternal Relations Committee, seeks to build relationships with those denominations in the Reformed tradition, ecumenical agencies which are evangelical or Reformed in character and in spirit, and other groups and organizations which are working to advance the Kingdom of God through ministries of evangelism, nurture, and service.

A fraternal relationship may include one or more of the following:

- A formal relationship with the highest representative body of another denomination. Such
 a relationship is more commonly understood as "being in correspondence with" that body.
- Less formal relationships, which may include exchange of information, exchange of observers, and shared ministries at different judicatory levels.
- Memberships in ecumenical agencies which proclaim the Word of God, promote the unity
 of the Body of Christ, and share resources for effective ministries.
- Relationships which endorse and support ministries lying outside conventional ecclesiastical structures but are of significance to the Kingdom.

A fraternal relationship may be constituted only by the General Assembly which shall also approve the terms of such relationships. (Minutes, 4-26)

- 85-10 The General Assembly shall establish fraternal relations with the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, and send a delegate to its Synod every other year beginning in 1986. (Minutes, 5-47) Cf. Act 88-14 for definition of this relationship. The 12th General Assembly approved an annual exchange of delegates. Cf. Act 92-02)
- 85-11 The General Assembly shall pursue fraternal relations with the Presbyterian Church of America, the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America, the Christian Reformed Church, and the Orthodox Presbyterian Church as soon as mutually convenient. (Minutes, 5-47)
- 85-25 The Assembly approves in principle the Articles of Agreement between the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church of Brazil (IPB) and forms a commission to negotiate and consummate a final agreement. (Minutes 5-47) The work of the Commission was received and adopted by the 6th General Assembly (Minutes 6-40).
- 86-16 The Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall seek membership in the World Evangelical Fellowship. (Minutes, 6-74)
- 87-09 The Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall seek membership in the North American Presbyterian and Reformed Council. (Minutes, 7-51)
- 87-10 The Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall enter into a fraternal relationship with the Christian Reformed Church. (Minutes, 7-51)
- 88-14 Definition of "fraternal relationship" established by the 5th General Assembly is as follows:
 - exchange of fraternal delegates at major assemblies;
 - 2. occasional pulpit supply:
 - 3. intercommunion;
 - 4. joint action in areas of common responsibilities;

- 5. communication on major issues of joint concern:
- exercise of mutual concern and admonition with a view to promoting the fundamentals of Christian unity. (Minutes 8-50)
- 88-15 The Assembly states that the official policy of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church is, as it has been, not to solicit churches to leave the Presbyterian Church (USA) or any other denomination. Further, that the Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall limit itself to responding to churches requesting information about the EPC. (Minutes, 8-50)
- 88-16 In a spirit of brotherly concern, the 8th General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church requests that the Presbyterian Church (USA) reconsider its action relative to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and consider rescinding said action until such time as the Evangelical Presbyterian Church receives information from the Presbyterian Church (USA) about the charges leveled against the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and these charges can be responded to after investigation. (Minutes, 8-50)
- 88-17 The Evangelical Presbyterian Church will take every measure possible to handle all matters of disputes between her and all others, the just and the unjust irrespectively, before Christian mediators and will eschew civil litigation unless she is named as the defendant. (Minutes, 8-50)
- 88-18 The Stated Clerk shall convey to the World Alliance of Reformed Churches (WARC) a protest on behalf of the 8th General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church regarding the action of the 200th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to censure and condemn the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, a sister denomination in the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, without adequate communication and without an attempt to resolve the alleged problems between our bodies; and further, we request the World Alliance of Reformed Churches assist the Evangelical Presbyterian Church in resolving this dispute between sister denominations in the World Alliance of Reformed Churches. (Minutes, 8-50)
- 89-19 The Assembly instructs the Fraternal Relations Committee to explore with both the Christian Reformed Church and the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church the possibilities of more extensive relationships and/or cooperative ministries (Minutes, 9-49)
- 89-20 The Assembly instructs the Fraternal Relations Committee to explore the desirability and feasibility of establishing fraternal relationships with the Reformed Church in America and with the Presbyterian Church in America. (Minutes, 9-49)
- 89-21 The Assembly instructs the Fraternal Relations Committee to continue dialogue with NAPARC concerning our application for membership in the organization; to continue to strengthen our relationship with member denominations in the World Alliance of Reformed Churches; and to continue to affirm our relationship with the National Association of Evangelicals. (Minutes, 9-49) (Cf. Act 87-09)
- 91-10 The Assembly approves a statement of commitment between the EPC and the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church authorizing the Interchurch Relations Committees to continue meeting for the purposes of finding areas of mutual commitments, discovering areas of differences and exploring ways of resolving those differences, exploring new and creative ways of working together. They shall report back to the respective parent bodies each year, until such time as either committee may ask to be discharged from this duty, or until the appointing body may discharge the committee from such duty. (Minutes, 11-26) (Cf. Act 92-01 for the Geneva Statement.)

92-01 The Assembly approves The Geneva Statement, to be added to the joint statement adopted by the EPC and the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church. (Minutes, 12-21) (Cf. Act 91-10)

The Geneva Statement

Being persuaded from Scripture that all Christians are united together as one body in Christ, we acknowledge our responsibility to God and one another to labor together in the work of Christ so as to promote the peace, purity, and unity of the church, and the advancement of Christ's Kingdom in the world.

We share a common understanding of the Scriptures as expressed in the Westminster Confession of Faith and Calechisms, for laboring together in ministry. Recognizing that some differences exist between us in our understanding of certain issues concerning God's will for his church, we also recognize that that which we hold in common far outweighs that which differentiates us. It is understood that our common labors shall not compromise the consciences of either church. The integrity of each church concerning its standards and policies must be maintained and respected.

We therefore pledge ourselves to labor together in love to advance the work of Christ in both our

common and separate ministries, seeking to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

We promise that if ever we should offend one another in our common labors, we shall do everything possible to resolve the matter and to maintain cooperation. We commit ourselves to labor in support of our church courts, faithfully reporting our activities to the appropriate board or agency, and our respective committees concerning inter-church relations.

We further believe that such practical fraternity, apart from any quest for organizational union will be pleasing to God and promote the advancement of the Gospel in the world. For these reasons we commit ourselves to this Agreement of Cooperation which is to be attached to the joint statement previously adopted by our churches.

- 92-02 The Assembly approved an annual exchange of fraternal delegates to the meetings of the EPC and Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, rather than the present alternating year exchange. (Minutes 12-21) (Cf. Act 85-10)
- 92-16 The Assembly responds to questions raised by the North American Presbyterian and Reformed Council (NAPARC) concerning our stance on charismatic gifts by referring them to the Position Paper on the Holy Spirit, along with the following interpretive statements:
 - The Evangelical Presbyterian Church holds that baptism in or with the Holy Spirit is to be identified with regeneration and adoption;
 - Evangelical Presbyterian Church views the gifts of the Holy Spirit as these are specified in such passages as I Corinthians 12, Romans 12, Ephesians 4, and I Peter 4 as valid for the church at the present time.
 - The Position Paper on the Holy Spirit distinguishes between the Word of God on the one hand, and the gifts of the Spirit, including the gift of prophecy, on the other. Whatever the exercise the gift of prophecy may involve, it is plain that its exercise is subject to the Holy Scriptures and to the local session.
 - Clearly the implication of the Position Paper on the Holy Spirit is that because pre-eminence is ascribed to the Holy Scriptures, one would have to draw a very sharp distinction between the Bible (the Word of God) and any other form of revelation mentioned in the New Testament. (Minutes, 12-44)
- 93-03 The Assembly instructs the Christian Education Committee to explore with the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church the feasibility of a joint family conference to be held at Bonclarken Conference Center. (Minutes, 13-18)
- 94-01 The Assembly establishes fraternal relations with the Association of the Charismatic Presbyterian Churches in Puerto Rico as defined in Acts #84-06 and #88-14. (Minutes, 14-18)

- 94-02 The Assembly extends a resolution of thanks to Dr. Billy Melvin upon his retirement as director of NAE, expressing appreciation for 28 years of faithful service to NAE. (Minutes, 14-18)
- 94-03 The Assembly instructs the Fraternal Relations Committee to pursue and explore fraternal relations with the Presbyterian Church in Ireland to include, but not be limited to possible world outreach. (Minutes, 14-18)
- 94-04 The Fraternal Relations Committee is instructed to continue to pursue membership in the North American Presbyterian and Reformed Council (NAPARC). (Minutes, 14-18)
- 94-05 The Assembly instructs the Fraternal Relations Committee to study the membership of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church in the World Alliance of Reformed Churches and ascertain if any alternate organizations are available for churches in the Reformed world. (Minutes, 14-18)
- 96-04 The Fraternal Relations Committee is instructed to investigate the possibilities of creating as many mutually beneficial and kingdom enhancing denominational relationships, even if outside the Reformed family, as seems appropriate. (Minutes, 16-23)
- 97-04 The Assembly shall seek membership in the World Fellowship of Reformed Churches, a new global network of Presbyterian and Reformed bodies that will meet in conjunction with the World Evangelical Fellowship General Assemblies. (Minutes 17-22)
- 97-05 The Assembly encourages its churches to participate more fully in the National Association of Evangelicals, such as participating more fully in its commissions. (Minutes, 17-22)
- 00-02 The Assembly authorized the Committee on Administration to continue the relationship of the EPC with the Presbyterian Church of Brazil (IPB). The relationship will include exchange programs for youth, leadership, and music ministry, theological education programs, joint missionary projects and church planting. (Minutes 20-20; Communication 00-14)

FISCAL MATTERS

- 81-09 The Assembly adopts suggested guideline of \$5 "per member" contribution by EPC congregations. (Minutes, 1-24)
- 82-08 The fiscal year of the Assembly shall be a calendar year. (Minutes, 2-50)
- 83-08 Fiscal Policy: Unified Budget Proposal

The administration and operation of the General Assembly ought to be supported

entirely by per member giving.

Aside from Assembly operations, the programs and activities of the Assembly in such areas as world missions, new church development, etc., are to be supported by the benevolence offerings of the various congregations as follows:

- Each committee shall make a request to the Assembly through the Administration Committee for specific project funding in the succeeding year.
- Upon the Assembly's approval, this shall become the Benevolence Askings of the denomination.
- 3. Local congregations may give to this objective in the following manner:
 - Undesignated giving to all objectives which gifts shall be applied according to the percentage of the budget for each program.

b. Designated giving to a specific program. All designated giving shall go to the program for which it was given. However, when the full budget of a program is reached, while designated giving shall continue to go to that program, undesignated giving shall then be distributed to other programs proportionately until 100% of budget for each program is reached. Once each program has reached 100% of benevolence, undesignated gifts shall then be distributed according to the percentage of budget as was done previously.

The Administration Committee shall present to the Assembly a recommended calendar of all events for the coming year. Such calendar shall include specific seasons, times of emphasis, times for prayer and education of the congregations for the various benevolence objectives of the General Assembly. The asking of special offerings shall be left to the discretion of local

sessions.

To move toward the support of the administration and operation of the Office of the General Assembly entirely by per member giving, for 1984 the per member giving shall be set at \$8 and based on the current membership as of December 31, and in 1985, with the approval of the General Assembly, shall be set at a figure to cover that cost.

As staff is added to boards, agencies, and other offices of the Assembly, such staff shall be funded out of the General Assembly Administration Budget. The purpose of this policy is to unify staff operations and equipment use as much as possible and to maintain parity of salaries

and benefits.

As soon as practical, through the Administration Committee, the budget for the following year and a preliminary budget for the year after that shall be presented to the General Assembly each year.

All financial appeals by any committee, agency, or persons must be submitted to the Administration Committee for prior approval. (Minutes, 3-53)

- 83-11 The General Assembly shall establish a loan fund for church site and building development whereby on a revolving capitalization basis, low interest monies will be available to mission churches and other churches in need. (Minutes, 3-54)
- 84-15 Ministerial Endowment Fund is established to meet specific, extraordinary financial needs of Ministers of the Word, missionaries, and other full-time Christian workers who are members of or working under the auspices of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. The Stated Clerk and chairmen of the World Outreach and Ministerial Vocation Committees are appointed administrators of the Fund, responsible for making specific grants from the income of the Fund. (Minutes, 4-23)
- 85-07 The General Assembly shall set aside its fiscal policy (Unified Budget #5) which states, "additional staff be funded out of the General Assembly Administration Budget" for a period of five years during which time new staff development may be funded by benevolence giving. (Minutes, 5-43)
- 85-08 General Assembly endorses a special denominational voluntary Christmas offering to help needy ministers or missionaries and authorized EPC churches to receive such an offering whose funds shall be administered by the permanent Committee on Administration. (Minutes, 5-43)
- 86-07 The Assembly endorses the concept of "2nd Mile Giving" for Women's Ministries to be part of the Benevolence Askings Budget. (Minutes, 6-60)
- 87-20 The Assembly approves the adoption of a per member benevolence goal for each congrega-

tion, to be determined by the total benevolences approved by the Assembly. Assembly Office shall provide to each session and congregation information on the approved benevolences along with the suggested per member goal by September 1 following the meeting of the General Assembly, along with the suggested per member contribution for the Assembly's Administration Budget.

Each session and congregation is assured that such per member goal is not an assessment but only a suggestion, and that contributions to approved Assembly benevolences be designated for specific causes and those contributions shall be used only for such designated causes.

The Assembly urges each congregation to notify the Assembly Office no later than February of each year of its intended giving goal for that year to approved Assembly benevolences, with the understanding that the local church's goal is not a pledge but only a goal towards which the church will strive. (Minutes, 7-55)

- 89-18 Per member asking is raised from \$8 to \$10. (Minutes, 9-48)
- 90-01 The Assembly approves a half-time Director of Women's Ministries and granted an exception to its fiscal policy (Act 83-08) permitting the position to be funded for a period not exceeding three years through the Women's "Faith Focus" benevolence asking. (Minutes, 10-24)
- 90-02 The Assembly approves a half-time Director of Youth Ministries position and granted an exception to fiscal policy (Act 83-08) permitting the position to be funded by benevolence giving for a period not exceeding five years. (Minutes, 10-25)
- 90-10 The Church Loan Fund policies shall be amended to include the following: "A presbytery shall contractually guarantee timely repayment of principal and fees upon the recommendation of its Church Development Committee following its determination that the loan is a sound financial venture. (Minutes, 10-36)
- 90-12 The Assembly approves and endorses the following eight principles regarding the propriety of lending money at interest:
 - It is always right and honoring to God that the church make gifts and/or interest-free loans to mission congregations situated in severely disadvantaged areas, and to congregations in need of special assistance.
 - 2. The Old Testament prohibition of usury had in view Israel as a national entity, a commonwealth, a body politic unique in its position in redemptive history, a prohibition which therefore cannot be directly applied to the New Testament church. Here we take the general position clearly set forth in *The Westminster Confession of Faith* (Chapter XIX, "Of the Law of God" paragraph iv); "To them [i.e., Israel] also as a body politic, he gave sundry judicial laws, which expired together with the state of that people, not obliging any other, now further than the general equity thereof may require."
 - 3. The prohibition of usury, or the lending of money at interest, through never absolute (for example, interest could be charged when loans were made to non-Israelites) was designed by God for the commonwealth of Israel, and intended to govern its life in the period prior to the coming of Christ and the fulfilling of the law by him (Matthew 5:17-18). The principle of love which underlay that prohibition continues to be relevant to the lives of believers and to the life of the church. We believe, however, that the laws themselves are no longer directly applicable "further than the general equity thereof may require."
 - 4. The preservation of the value of the principal by means of the charging of interest, given

administrative costs and the prevalence of inflation, and even some increasing of the principal itself for the good of Christ's kingdom, cannot be said to be a violation of biblical teaching for the reasons set forth in the preceding statements.

5. Underlying the Old Testament teaching on interest and its New Testament implications is always the great truth that relations among believers in the area of finance, the lending of money, and the charging of interest, as in all others, are to be governed by the requirements of love, equity, and justice.

6. Given the principles enunciated in this paper, we believe that in administering the funds available for loans to congregations, the Evangelical Presbyterian Church must take into consideration the diverse nature of those congregations applying for assistance. It is clear, for example, that some congregations are in a much more favorable position to repay loans with interest than is the case with others. What may be applicable in one set of circumstances may not be at all applicable in another.

7. It is clear from the Scriptures (I Timothy 6:10) and from Christian history that churches, as individuals, are not immune to the temptations of avarice. Those responsible for the administration of funds belonging to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church will remember the importance of proceeding with caution in this area and profit from the example of biblical teaching as well as from the broader history of the church.

- 8. It is our conviction that a loan with interest ought not to be extended to a person, or persons, lacking collateral or the ability to repay the sum borrowed. Further, in our view a clear distinction must be made between a mission or ministry supported by the church through gifts given without any expectation of repayment, and support extended to church extension projects or congregations seeking to purchase property and construct a building. It is entirely proper to grant assistance to new or existing congregations by means of a loan to which interest is attached and which is to be repaid on a mutually agreeable schedule. (Minutes, 10-36).
- 90-16 The Assembly conceptually endorses the Medical Benevolence Trust with the understanding that the actual Trust Agreement would be presented to the 11th Assembly. Approval to begin promotion of the Trust is given. (Minutes, 10-41)
- 92-21 The Assembly adopts the policy that financial solicitations of any type for support of an EPC church planting project be limited to the organizing context for the project, viz. daughter church project to its mother church, presbytery plant to its presbytery, Assembly-supported plants to Assembly-approved National Outreach Committee benevolence projects. (Minutes, 12-46)
- 92-23 The Assembly approves an increase in the per member asking from \$10 to \$12. (Minutes, 12-46)
- 94-13 The Church Loan Fund Criterion #1 is amended to read; "Fee rate: The original rate shall be established at the time the loan is made for a period of one (1) year and renewed on each succeeding anniversary date, and shall be based upon prevailing money market rates." (Minutes, 14-25)
- 94-14 Assembly approves an increase in the per member asking from \$12 to \$15. (Minutes, 14-26)
- 95-01 The General Assembly Office is instructed to provide information relative to special offerings at least five weeks in advance of the projected date of the offering. (Minutes, 15-20)

- 95-08 Permission is granted the Christian Education and Publications Committee to design a subscription or funding program for EPC Reflections, to begin with the June, 1996 issue. (Minutes, 15-23)
- 95-11 Assembly approves the matching scholarship program offered to EPC students by Erskine College, and a mailing to introduce the program. (Minutes, 15-29)
- 97-06 The "per member" factor is increased from \$15 to \$18. (Minutes 17-25)
- 97-07 Financial eligibility for the Medical Benevolence Funds is increased from \$20,000 to \$25,000. (Minutes 17-25)
- 97-20 The permanent Committee on Student and Young Adult Ministries is directed to become more focused in its request for benevolence giving, and is further directed to send a letter to the clerks of session of EPC congregations encouraging support of the SYAM budget through benevolent giving. (Minutes, 17-37)
- 98-09 A new monthly fee schedule for administration costs for World Outreach missionaries is adopted:
 - EPC missionaries (married): \$300; EPC single, \$150;
 - Cooperative agreement missionaries, (married), \$200; Cooperative, single: \$100.
 Fees to be deducted from support account of each WOC missionary unit. Amount will be adjusted annually in accordance with Consumer Price Index. (Minutes 18-37)
- 98-13 The Sowing/Reaping Planned Giving Program and information commending such is endorsed for distribution to the churches for review and consideration. (Minutes 18-39)
- 00-05 The Assembly adopts a plan to fund church planting through a 3-year campaign to raise \$750,000. Two-thirds of the fund will be used for church/presbytery/National Outreach partner projects. One-third of the fund will be used for Key City projects. (Minutes, 20-28)

PROGRAM MATTERS

- 84-14 The General Assembly adopts Preliminary Position Papers on Homosexuality, The Value Of and Respect For Human Life, Capital Punishment, Abortion, and The Ordination of Women (Minutes, 4-38). (Cf. Acts 86-20 and 87-21) [The 15th General Assembly (1995) rescinded its Preliminary Position Paper on Capital Punishment. Cf. Act 95-12]
- 86-08 The Task Force on Aging shall continue its work with the goal of implementing the following recommendations adopted by the Assembly:

Short Range Goals:

- To encourage each presbytery to assign the study of a ministry to older adults to an appropriate committee.
- Produce and distribute resource material for the local church's use in developing ministries for older adults.
- Provide consultation to Lifestyle Committees.
- Conduct workshops on aging to be held at General Assembly and presbytery meetings.
- 5. Publish a quarterly newsletter.

Long Range Goals:

1. Promote awareness of the unique emotional, social, and spiritual needs of older persons.

- Promote appreciation for the contributions older persons may make to the church body and fellowship through leadership, teaching, and outreach.
- Encourage collecting information and sharing about effective ministries with older adults within the EPC as well as other denominations.
- Provide information about current state and federal legislation as well as national public policy.
- Emphasize the importance of individual Christians modifying their lifestyles to improve their physical, emotional, and spiritual health. (Minutes, 6-60)
- 86-09 The Youth Ministry concept for summer youth conference is adopted. (Minutes, 6-60)
- 86-20 Position Papers on Abortion, Homosexuality, and The Ordination of Women are adopted (Minutes, 6-35, 6-36, and 6-37 respectively). (Cf. Act 84-14)
- 86-21 Position Paper on the Holy Spirit is adopted. (Minutes, 6-33)
- 87-04 The Assembly approves the development of an officer training program for the purposes of (1) continued resourcing of current officers and (2) resourcing new officers. (Minutes, 7-38)
- 87-05 The Assembly decides not to do business with hotels and motels promoting pornography for their customers in the cities where future General Assemblies are held, and further will encourage its constituents to refrain personally from patronizing such establishments. (Minutes, 7-38)
- 87-21 Position Paper on the Value Of and Respect For Human Life is adopted. (Minutes, 7-36) (Cf. Act 84-14)
- 88-06 The Assembly approves the concept of presbyteries covenanting with colleges and other educational institutions, but disapproved the General Assembly entering into such agreements (Minutes, 8-55).
- 88-19 "The Chicago Statement on Biblical Inerrancy" is adopted as a resource for its congregations (Minutes, 8-56; text of statement pp. 70-73 of the Minutes).
- 88-20 The Assembly endorses for distribution to its churches The Children's Catechism: A New Modern Version, published by Summertown Texts, Signal Mountain, Tennessee (1988) (Minutes, 8-55).
- 88-21 The Assembly endorses the work and ministry of Lay Renewal Ministries as an excellent resource for EPC churches to use (Minutes, 8-31).
- 88-22 The Assembly adopts the concept of endorsing curriculum publishers consistent with our theology and beliefs, and the subsequent marketing of such materials (Minutes, 8-55).
- 88-23 The Assembly approves holding a biannual conference for all ministers with fewer than five years experience in pastoral ministry. (Minutes, 8-41)
- 88-24 The Assembly endorses for its churches two booklets: What is the Reformed Faith, by John R. de Witt, and Baptism, by Francis Schaeffer (Minutes, 8-60).

- 88-25 The Assembly approves the establishment of a Youth Speakers Bureau for the purpose of providing quality speakers for both local church and presbytery functions (Minutes, 8-54).
- 88-26 The Sonlife Strategy for Youth Discipleship is endorsed as a Biblical, practical, uniform. model for youth ministry in the local church (Minutes, 8-54).
- 88-27 A Preliminary Position Paper on Pornography is adopted, to be sent to the presbyteries for further theological and Biblical reflection to the end that a position paper may be adopted (Minutes, 8-60).
- 88-28 A proposed "Constitution for Women's Ministries" is adopted, and the churches are encouraged to work toward implementation of such constitution. (Minutes, 8-42)
- 89-16 Bethany Christian Services is approved as an agency for ministry to unmarried mothers and the unborn, providing alternatives to abortion including adoption services. Bethany is commended as deserving of the prayers of our people as well as worthy of financial support from those of our people who feel so led. (Minutes, 9-39)
- 89-17 The Assembly approves the establishment by the Christian Education & Publications Committee of a Christian Education Resource Network utilizing qualified regional (3 regions) people who will serve as (1) interpreters of the committee's goals for presbyteries in the region, and (2) phone resources for churches in the presbytery needing consultations, and (3) assistance for presbyteries in workshop development. (Minutes, 9-39)
- 89-26 The Assembly instructs the permanent Christian Education and Publications Committee to establish a task force on homelessness. (Minutes, 9-38)
- 90-04 Committee on Christian Education shall make every effort to inform churches of available curriculum which is distinctly Reformed, such as Great Commission Publications and Christian Reformed Church materials. (Minutes, 10-26)
- 90-05 Committee on Christian Education is instructed to develop a curriculum for prospective new church members, one for youth and one for adults, which shall include Presbyterian history, doctrine, and polity. (Minutes, 10-26)
- 92-04 Youth Ministries Committee is requested to research the establishment of a denominational retreat and camping facility, using Montreat and Young Life as models for this ministry. (Minutes, 12-26)
- 92-05 The Assembly commends the Officer's Training Manual by Dr. Andrew Jumper for use in EPC churches, and recommends its printing in a spiral-bound format. (Minutes, 12-27)
- 92-06 The Assembly encourages the use of the new Westminster Confession of Faith Commentary (Summertown Texts) in EPC churches. (Minutes, 12-27)
- 92-17 Pilot project for a regional pastor is approved, to be sponsored jointly by the General Assembly and Mid-Atlantic Presbytery. (Minutes, 12-45)
- 92-20 Establishment of two subcommittees is approved:
 - Evangelism, a subcommittee of National Outreach;
 - 2. Caring, a subcommittee of Ministerial Vocation. (Minutes, 12-46)

- 93-03 Christian Education and Publications Committee is instructed to explore with the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church the feasibility of a joint family conference to be held at Bonclarken Conference Center. (Minutes, 13-18)
- 93-04 Christian Education and Publications Committee is instructed to develop resources for utilizing the Westminster Catechism, and for teaching Reformed distinctives to children and youth in local churches. (Minutes, 13-23)
- 93-15 Presbyteries are encouraged to consider having a Women's Ministries Committee, and to devise an effective means of coordinating the input of that committee with the other committees of the Presbytery. (Minutes, 13-35)
- 93-18 The Assembly approves the Recommended Reading List for Ordination Preparation, to be used in the task of preparing candidates approaching ordination examinations especially in the areas of the Reformed tradition and the Reformed office of the Minister. (Minutes, 13-39)
- 93-19 The Assembly commends the Study Guide for the Westminster Confession and Book of Order, by Rev. William Hyer for use in the churches. (Minutes, 13-39)
- 94-10 The Assembly tables the instruction to research the establishment of a denominational camp and retreat facility until such time as resources or facilities are available. (Cf. Act 92-04) (Minutes, 14-24)
- 94-11 The Assembly encourages its churches to establish procedures whereby those who work with children may be screened for any felony or child abuse incidents, and to have policies and guidelines concerning these areas. Resources are Christian Ministry Resources, 1/800/222-1840 and the Presbytery of the West. (Minutes, 14-24)
- 94-20 Position papers on AIDS/HIV and Homosexuality are replaced by new editions on these subjects. (Minutes, 14-35)
- 94-21 A Preliminary Position Paper on Divorce and Remarriage is adopted and sent to the churches for study, and the Assembly instructs the Theology Committee to include a more thorough study in this paper on the following subjects:
 - A definition which affirms the covenantal aspects of marriage.
 - 2. A strong statement relating reconciliation to covenant faithfulness in relationships.
 - A strong statement regarding pre-divorce reconciliation to compliment the existing statement of post-divorce reconciliation.
 - 4. Expand statements on "hardness of heart" as related to divorce and/or reconciliation.
 - Expand the discussion of forgiveness and restoration as it relates to service and leadership in the Church by divorced or remarried persons.
 - A review of I Timothy 5:8 for possible inclusion as it relates to the issues of desertion and covenant unfaithfulness.
 - A discussion of remaining unmarried in the context of the section entitled, "What About Remarriage?" (Minutes, 14-35)
- 95-01 The General Assembly Office shall provide information relative to special offerings at least five weeks in advance of the projected date of the offering. (Minutes, 15-20)

- 95-08 Permission is granted the Christian Education and Publications Committee to design a subscription or funding program for EPC Reflections, to begin with the June, 1996 issue. (Minutes, 15-23)
- 95-09 The Christian Education and Publications Committee is instructed to form a task force composed of Christian educators and theologians to review and evaluate various curricula and make evaluations based on EPC standards, making this evaluation available to the churches in a simplified form. (Minutes, 15-23). The 16th Assembly reaffirmed this instruction, and further requested the task force to complete a one-page simplified evaluation form on materials. Minutes 16-24
- 95-12 The Assembly rescinds its Preliminary Position Paper on Capital Punishment (Cf. Act 84-14). (Minutes, 15-31)
- 95-13 A Pastoral Letter Regarding Criteria for Evaluating Membership in Secret Fraternal Organizations is adopted. (Minutes, 15-31)
- 95-14 A "Position Paper on the Problems of Suffering, Death, and Dying" is adopted. (Minutes, 15-31)
- 95-20 Since the EPC does not have an organized men's ministry, the Assembly encourages men in the local churches to become involved in Promise Keepers. (Minutes, 15-23)
- 96-05 The Assembly encourages commissioners to send the following overture on the value of and sanctity of human life to their congressional senators and representatives in addition to the President, Vice-President, Speaker of the House of Representatives and Majority Leader of the Senate:
 - The 16th General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church goes on record as opposing, in the strongest possible terms, the President's veto of the "Partial Birth Abortion Ban," and urges Congress to override his veto. Furthermore, that our denomination communicate its stand on this issue to the President, Vice-President, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Majority Leader of the U.S. Senate. (Minutes, 16-31)
- 96-06 The Assembly acknowledges that the Disney Company has openly promoted a morally destructive agenda which is hostile to traditional family values, and calls on its members to recognize and grieve over these developments at Disney Company and lead them to take whatever action the Holy Spirit leads them to do in response. (Minutes, 16-30)
- 96-08 The Assembly challenged the Committee on Student and Young Adult Ministries (formerly Youth Ministries Committee) to determine direction in the following areas:
 - To establish student curriculum guidelines to assist churches in the Christian nurture of their children;
 - To establish a strategy for targeting more resources to establish student and young adult ministry as a top priority within the church. (Minutes, 16-31)
- 96-09 The Assembly adopts a Pastoral Letter on Civil Disobedience, and instructed the Committee on Theology to develop a purpose statement regarding this letter, and also to define the term, "pastoral letter." (Minutes 16-33)

- 96-10 The Assembly adopts a Pastoral Letter on Organ Donation and Transplantation. (Minutes, 16-33)
- 96-15 The name of the Committee on Youth Ministries is changed to "Committee on Student and Young Adult Ministries." (Minutes, 16-36)
- 97-13 The Assembly adopts a new introductory section for the Pastoral Letter on Civil Disobedience which was adopted by the 16th General Assembly. That section reads as follows:

This pastoral letter sets forth biblically sound theological principles which should be applied to the questions we face as Christians and churches in evaluating and responding to the moral issue of civil

disobedience.

A pastoral letter is intended to shine the light of God's word broadly on a general area of concern to the Church. Requiring the approval of only one General Assembly, it is not as definitive as a Position Paper which requires the approval of two General Assemblies including a minimum of one year circulation among the presbyteries. The primary purpose of a pastoral letter is to guide churches within the EPC rather than to identify our positions to the world. (Minutes, 17-30)

97-14 The Assembly instructs the permanent Committee on Theology to study the broad issue of the churches engagement with culture including but not limited to the following issues:

As a denomination, the EPC desires to be a body of believers that stands our country, to work as agents of salt and light its transformation. Through engagement with our society, we seek to make a visible difference in the quality of its life—spiritually, socially, culturally, and economically.

We do not want to be a denomination that merely stands against our society, to denounce and scorn it.

That is a fortress mentality that only condemns and castigates our society its wickedness. Instead we want to

interact with our society as servants, peacemakers and healers.

We do not want to be a denomination of our society, only reflecting and confirming its practices and thought forms. Through a proactive proclamation of the saving grace of the Gospei and a practical demonstration of the wholesome and holy lifestyle to which God calls His people, we confront thought forms and lifestyles that stand contrary to God's revealed Word.

We do not want to be a denomination that simply stands above our society, only using it for own personal gain, then escaping it by retreating for our Sunday holy huddles. Rather, we desire to be a people in the world but not of it. (Minutes, 17-30)

- 97-16 The Assembly recommends to all church sessions that an oral or written report be regularly received from a representative of that church's women's ministry. The rationale for this is two-fold:
 - 1. so that there is a session record of the activities of the women's ministry.
 - 2. so that communication and accountability are enhanced. (Minutes 17-32)
- 97-17 The Assembly requests that the formation of a men's ministry be considered by the appropriate committee (CE&P) including the possible funding of a part-time director and to report back to the 18th General Assembly. (Minutes, 17-33)
- 97-18 The Assembly excuses the Christian Education & Publications Committee from further research on the LiFE curriculum beyond the assessment already completed on this series in 1994 as reported in the Curriculum Evaluation Packet for Children. (Minutes, 17-33)
- 97-19 The Assembly endorses a relationship with Pioneer Clubs as understood and defined in the working agreement. (Minutes 17-33)
- 97-20 The permanent Committee on Student and Young Adult Ministries is directed to become more focused in its request for benevolence giving, and was further directed to send a letter to the Clerks of Session of EPC congregations encouraging support of the SYAM budget through benevolent giving. (Minutes, 17-37)

- 97-21 The permanent Committee on Student and Young Adult Ministries is authorized to investigate the formation of a new committee to work specifically on a Single Adult Ministry by the year 2000. (Minutes, 17-38)
- 98-12 The Assembly endorses the Alpha program as a resource for evangelism. (Minutes 18-41)
- 98-13 The Sowing/Reaping Planned Giving Program and information commending such is endorsed for distribution to the churches for review and consideration. (Minutes 18-39)
- 98-14 The Assembly adopts the following set of guidelines for Presbytery Women's Ministries:

Guidelines

- Each Presbytery Women's Ministry Committee shall be made up of 6 or more women who represent the spectrum of presbytery churches.
- Pastors' wives shall be represented on the committee if possible.
- Women shall serve a 3-year term. A second 3-year term is allowed, but a woman may
 not serve more than two consecutive terms.
- Nominations for the committee may be submitted to the Presbytery Nominating Committee in two ways:
 - 1. The Session of each individual church may submit names.
 - 2. The current committee may submit names.
- Prior to a woman's name being submitted to the Nominating Committee, her pastor and/or Session shall be contacted for approval. Following this approval, she may be asked if she is willing to serve.
- The Presbytery Women's Ministry Committee members shall elect a chairman, who shall attend the General Council of the Presbytery. (She may or may not have a vote depending on the presbytery, but will be able to keep the council abreast of Women's Ministries' concerns, and vice versa.) (Minutes, 18-42)
- 00-07 The Assembly endorses children's catechism lessons from Children's Ministries International as resources for use in EPC churches. (Minutes, 20-38)
- 00-08 The Assembly endorses the book Infant Baptism by John Sartelle for use alongside Francis Schaeffer's booklet, Baptism. (Minutes, 20-38)
- 00-09 The Assembly endorses a Youth Curriculum as a working draft for use in church membership programs. (Minutes, 20-39)

BOARD OF PENSION AND BENEFITS

- 81-04 Terms of call for any minister of member churches shall provide for participation in the denominational hospitalization and disability programs. (Minutes, 1-32)
- 81-05 Terms of call for any minister shall provide a minimum of 18% benefit to provide for group hospitalization, disability, and pension. The pension factor shall be not less than 10%. This benefit shall be computed on the gross effective salary base, i.e., salary and housing/utilities allowance. (Minutes, 1-32)

- 81-06 Denominational group insurance plan providing health, disability, and life coverage shall be mandatory for all ministers within member churches (Minutes, 1-36)
- 82-10 The General Assembly approves the concept of self-funding insurance and instructs its Committee on Administration to execute a plan in trust as appropriate. Individual churches are urged to assume the deductible portion of the health insurance program and cost of coinsurance as part of a minister's compensation. (Minutes, 2-52, Appendix I-8).
- 83-18 The Assembly instructs the Ministerial Vocation Committee to continue to solicit bids for a standard health insurance plan with better benefits than current coverage and authorizes the Committee on Administration to approve such a plan between Assemblies. (Minutes, 3-37)
- 83-19 The General Assembly adopts a policy that, effective January 1, 1984, expenses for health, life, and disability insurance be allocated on the basis of a set percentage of the salaries of all participants. (Minutes, 3-37)
- 84-08 General Assembly adopts the self-funding group insurance plan offered by The Travelers and gives authority to the permanent Committee on Administration to approve and establish all details relative to the establishment of proposed plan.
 - General Assembly requires pastors and employees of all member congregations, all presbyteries, and the Assembly who meet minimum requirements to enroll in the program.
 - This major medical program shall be reviewed annually and a full report made to the General Assembly. (Minutes, 4-37).
- 86-18 The denominational group insurance plan shall be amended by increasing the cap for long term disability insurance from \$25,000 to a \$40,000 maximum insurable salary. (Minutes, 6-75).
- 86-19 The denominational group insurance plan shall be amended to make retired persons eligible by defining "retiree" as follows: "A retiree is one who has reached the 60th birthday and has served at least five (5) years in his or her EPC church. Such persons may continue to participate in the medical portion of the EPC plan indefinitely by contributing the appropriate monthly premium. (Minutes, 6-75)
- 87-12 The Assembly approves the establishment of an employer-sponsored tax-sheltered annuity program for the required minimum (10%) of gross effective salary for retirement for each minister and missionary, and urges each congregation to participate in such program. (Minutes, 7-53)
- 87-14 An annual "Gratitude Gift" offering in connection with the Christmas season is approved. Monies received to be used by the Pension Committee to supplement income of our retired ministers and missionaries who participate in the denominational program. (Minutes, 7-53)
- 87-15 Persons otherwise required to be covered by the denominational group insurance plan may be exempted from such mandatory coverage when they have coverage under the Civilian Health and Medical Programs of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS). (Minutes, 7-53)
- 87-16 Restriction is eliminated of 6 months waiting period for pre-existing conditions for an employee coming in from another denominational insurance plan. The 12 months waiting

- period for coverage of pre-existing conditions of dependents of those employees is also eliminated. (Minutes, 7-53)
- 87-17 Group Insurance Plan is amended to exclude coverage for radial keratotomy, a new procedure to correct nearsightedness, except when the physician (including second surgical opinion) verifies that myopia cannot be corrected by either glasses or contact lenses. (Minutes, 7-53)
- 87-19 Group Insurance Plan for health and life coverage is changed from The Travelers to the Provident Life and Accident Insurance Company. Disability insurance coverage remains with The Travelers. (Minutes, 7-54)
- 88-08 Assembly amends participatory requirements for group health insurance plan by requiring participation of all ministers on the rolls of presbyteries with the exception of
 - 1. missionaries laboring in cooperative agreements with mission agencies;
 - 2. ministers laboring in institutional agencies providing their own group insurance plan;
 - ministers afforded group insurance coverage as part of retirement benefits from a previous employer;
 - ministers without call, and ministers laboring less than 20 hours in a place of ministry. (Minutes, 8-24)
- 88-09 Non-ordained eligible employees of EPC churches shall be expected to participate in the denominational group insurance plan on a contributory basis with the exception of employees whose spouses carry certifiable medical insurance able to cover all eligible dependents, and employees offered group insurance coverage as a part of retirement benefits from a previous employer. (Minutes, 8-24)
- 88-10 Churches are requested to move conscientiously toward (or maintain) at least 80% of nonordained eligible employees participating in the plan to preserve the integrity and continuance of the Plan. (Minutes, 8-24)
- 89-02 The Assembly adopts the Evangelical Presbyterian Church Pension Plan and Adoption Agreement as presented, with an amendment allowing the Board of Pension and Benefits to work with special cases, giving them the authority to make decisions for the General Assembly (Minutes, 9-22) (The 13th General Assembly adopted a restated Pension Plan. Cf. Act 93-01).
- 89-03 The Assembly approves the recommendation that members of the Board of Pension and Benefits be subject to removal from office in the same manner as set forth in Chapter 6 (Book of Discipline), with the Permanent Judicial Commission acting in the place of session or presbytery. (Minutes, 9-22)
- 89-04 The Board of Pension and Benefits is authorized to accept Adoption Agreements from churches for a period of three years from and after January 1,1990, or three years after a church is established as a particular Evangelical Presbyterian Church, whichever is later. An Adoption Agreement from a judicatory shall be accepted within three years from and after January 1, 1990 or within three years from and after the date of employment of its first employee, whichever is later. (Minutes, 9-22).
- 89-06 The Assembly approves formation of a Board of Reference to provide information and advice to the Board of Pension and Benefits. Board of Reference should be appointed by the Board of Pension and Benefits from the broad constituency of the denomination to advise it con-

- cerning the acceptance, operation, and effectiveness of the Plan. (Minutes, 9-22). The 15th General Assembly rescinded this action to establish a Board of Reference (cf. Act 95-07).
- 89-14 The Assembly approves a three-tier system based on regions (zip codes) to determine premium costs for the medical portion of the Group Insurance Plan. (Minutes, 9-33)
- 89-15 The Assembly approves the establishment of a General Assembly benevolence fund for medical care costs, concentrating its benevolence health care efforts on ministers without call, mission church pastors, and retired ministers and their families. (Minutes, 9-33)
- 90-08 The Group Insurance Plan shall be placed under the Board of Pension and Benefits no later than the summer of 1991. (Minutes, 10-28)
- 90-15 The Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to reduce the yearly deductibles from \$250 per year to \$150 per individual, and from \$500 to \$300 per family. The maximum yearly coverage for outpatient treatment of mental and nervous conditions, substance abuse, and biofeedback was reduced form \$2000 to \$1500. Substance abuse treatment was added to the category of nervous, emotional, or mental disorders for which a lifetime cap of \$50,000 exists. (Minutes, 10-39)
- 90-16 The Assembly conceptually endorses the Medical Benevolence Fund Trust with the understanding that the actual Fund Trust Agreement would be presented to the 1lth Assembly. Approval to begin promotion of the Fund Trust is given. (Minutes, 10-39)
- 90-17 The Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to make ministers of fraternal bodies laboring within EPC congregations as missionary-in-residence or graduate school student-in-residence eligible for participation if such are understood as full-time staff in the life of the church if no other plan for coverage exists. (Minutes, 10-39)
- 90-22 The Assembly adopts a restated pension plan and adoption agreement. (Minutes 10-22)
- 91-01 The Board of Pension and Benefits shall assume administration of the Group Insurance Plan effective upon adjournment of the 1lth General Assembly (Minutes, 11-14). (Cf. Act 90-08)
- 91-02 The Group Insurance Plan shall be amended so that the definition for retired employees shall be "A Retired Employee is one who has reached the 60th birthday and has served at least five (5) years in an EPC presbytery approved ministry." (Minutes 11-25)
- 92-19 The Assembly extends the initial period of enrollment and submission of EPC Pension Adoption Agreements for churches of record as of January 1, 1990 from December 31, 1992 to December 31, 1993. (Minutes, 12-46)
- 92-24 Pension Plan is amended to provide that normal retirement age shall be 59 1/2, rather than age 60. (Minutes, 12-13)
- 92-25 Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to provide coverage for transplants of the following human organs only: comea, kidney, liver, heart, lung and bone marrow. Total dollar amount payable for all charges related to organ transplants is limited to \$500,000 per person per lifetime. (Minutes, 12-13) [Cf. Act 95-05. The 15th Assembly added pancreas to the list of organs for which transplant expenses will be covered. Minutes, 15-22]

- 92-26 Requirement for second surgical opinion is eliminated, and Group Insurance Medical Plan will cover only up to 80% of second surgical opinions obtained. Additionally, all surgical procedures covered by the Plan are covered at 80%. Plan shall continue to pay 100% for preadmission tests. (Minutes, 12-13)
- 92-27 Group Insurance Medical Plan extends normal co-pay of 80% to the following procedures: clinical breast examination between the ages of 20 and 40, and every year after age 40; mammography every year after age 50; sigmoidoscopy every three years after age 50; prostatic specific antigen test every year after age 50. (Minutes, 12-13)
- 92-28 An additional class of employees, "Disabled Employees" is created and defined under the Group Insurance Medical Plan as follows: "A disabled employee is one who has been determined to be totally disabled. To be totally disabled, the employee must be unable to perform all of the normal duties of his or her regular occupation or employment for pay or profit. This must be due to the disability. Such a person may continue to participate in the medical portion of the EPC Plan indefinitely by contributing the appropriate monthly premium." (Minutes, 12-13)
- 92-29 The Medical Benevolence Fund document is adopted. (Minutes, 12-13)
- 93-01 General Assembly adopts a restated Pension Plan. (Minutes, 13-12) (Cf. Act 89-02)
- 93-02 Board of Pension and Benefits is authorized to extend health insurance coverage for EPC employees up to three months following month of termination, with a prepaid premium increase of 5% to cover administrative costs and a \$.50 per participant per month charge for the privilege of conversion. (Minutes, 13-12)
- 93-13 World Outreach missionaries in cooperative agreements may choose insurance coverage with either the EPC or their sending agency. In unique situations, other alternative coverage approved by World Outreach Committee may be appropriate. (Minutes, 13-27)
- 93-14 National pastors under appointment by World Outreach are not required to participate in the EPC Pension Plan. (Minutes, 13-28)
- 93-18 The Assembly adds infertility treatment (but not testing) for up to four months to the Medical Plan. (Minutes, 13-12)
- 94-06 Board of Pension and Benefits is instructed to investigate and determine actual cost of medical coverage for persons on the Plan not covered by Medicare at time of retirement (Minutes, 14-22)
- 94-07 The Group Insurance Medical Plan shall provide benefits for adopted children at the time effective custody takes place. (Minutes, 14-22)
- 94-08 The Group Insurance Medical Plan shall provide medical coverage to dependents of retired and disabled employees (Minutes, 14-22)
- 94-09 Board of Pension and Benefits may review and enroll churches of record December 31, 1993 who wish to participate in the Pension Plan but who, because of extenuating circumstances, did not enroll during the period of eligibility. (Minutes, 14-22)

- 95-02 Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to exclude persons who have opted out of the Social Security System and who are not otherwise eligible or entitled to Social Security or Medicare coverage, upon retirement or attainment of age 65 (whichever occurs later). Coverage, however, may be continued upon participation in the Medicare Voluntary Enrollment Plan, Parts A and B, and upon payment of the required monthly premium to both Medicare Voluntary Enrollment Plan and the EPC Medical Benefits Plans. (Minutes, 15-22)
- 95-03 The Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to add a section under "Preventative Care" to cover 80% of eligible expenses after the deductible is met, for immunizations for eligible dependent children to age 16. (Minutes, 15-22)
- 95-04 Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to omit the current conversion option for medical care benefits. As of January 1, 1995 conversion charges increased by 400% for major medical coverage, 300% for comprehensive coverage, and 100% for hospital and surgical coverage. (Minutes, 15-22)
- 95-05 The Group Insurance Medical Plan is amended to include pancreatic transplants on the list of organ transplants covered. (Minutes, 15-22) Cf. Act 92-25 for list as originally adopted.
- 95-06 Assembly approves a revised premium structure for the Group Insurance Medical Plan effective August 1, 1995 so that four categories ("employee only," "employee/spouse," employee/children," and "employee/spouse/children") replace the former "single" and "family" categories. (Minutes, 15-22)
- 95-07 Assembly rescinds 1989 action (cf. 89-06) establishing a Board of Reference. (Minutes, 15-22)
- 96-01 The Assembly grants the COA authorization to select vendors for various benefit and pension plans on recommendation from the Board of Pension and Benefits. (Minutes, 16-19)
- 96-02 The Assembly changes the vendor for plan administration from Healthsource/Provident to a third party administrator, Benefit Services, Inc. For medical benefits, long term disability insurance and life insurance effective January 1, 1997. (Minutes, 16-19)
- 96-03 The Assembly approves changing vendors for long term disability insurance and life insurance from Metropolitan Life Insurance Company to UNUM Life Insurance Company for long term disability insurance, and Healthsource/Provident to The Lafayette Life Insurance Company for life insurance. (Minutes, 16-19)
- 96-17 The Assembly approves designating up to 100% of a minister's early and normal retirement pension or disability pension for 1996 and 1997 as housing allowance for United States income tax purposes (IRS Ruling 1.107-1) but only to the extent that the pension is used to rent or provide a home. (Minutes, 16-36) (Note: This recommendation is intended to be presented and adopted on a yearly basis.)
- 97-02 The Group Medical Insurance Plan is amended to provide one routine mammogram per year, paid at 80% for women forty (40) years of age or older. (Minutes, 17-20)
- 97-03 The Assembly amends the Group Insurance Plan to double the current life insurance cap provided EPC pastors and employees from \$25,000 to \$50,000 for an additional premium. (Minutes 17-20)

- 97-07 Financial eligibility for the Medical Benevolence Funds is increased from \$20,000 to \$25,000. (Minutes 17-25)
- 98-01 The Assembly approves the provision of a Preferred Provider Organization (PPO) for the medical portion of the Group Insurance Plan. (Minutes, 18-19)
- 99-01 The Assembly amends the Group Insurance Medical Plan to require that claims be submitted within twelve months of the date of service. Claims submitted after twelve months of date of service will not be paid. (Minutes, 19-20)
- 99-02 The Assembly amends the Group Insurance Medical Plan by adding sleep disorders and biofeedback to the list of exclusions. (Minutes, 19-20)
- 99-03 The Assembly amends coverage for prescription in the Group Insurance Medical Plan to: 80% of the cost of generic drugs; 50% for name brand drugs unless a suitable generic is not available; Subject to deductibles and co-insurance. (Minutes, 19-20)
- 99-04 The Assembly amends the Group Insurance Medical Plan by increasing the deductible to \$250 per employee, \$500 per employee and spouse, and \$750 per family for PPO network providers. The Assembly also amends Group Insurance Medical Plan by increasing the deductible to \$300 per person, \$600 per employee and spouse, and \$900 per family for non-network (PPO) providers. (Minutes, 19-20)
- 99-05 The Assembly amends the Skilled Nursing Facilities Benefits in the Group Insurance Medical Plan to cover 90% of reasonable and customary charges in the PPO network and 80% our of network. Confinement in a skilled nursing facility is limited to 60 days per calendar year with a per diem limit of \$150, provided that a physician determines that the covered person requires skilled nursing care and prior authorization from the Plan has been obtained. (Minutes, 19-20)
- 00-02 The Assembly amends the Medical Plan to include:
 - a) Home health care services provided within 7 days following discharge from hospital for a cause related to the cause of hospital confinement
 - b) Prescription coverage for Viagra and birth control pills. (Minutes, 00-25)
- 00-03 The Assembly amends the Medical Plan to specifically exclude:
 - a) Charges in connection with weekend hospital admissions unless deemed medically necessary;
 - b) Charges made in connection with surrogate parenting arrangements:
 - c) Charges for completing a claim form:
 - d) Charges made for professional services of a resident physician or intern;
 - e) Surgery for sex reassignment or complications from such procedure;
 - Services or supplies rendered while not under continuing care of a physician. (Minutes, 00-25

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT

Between the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and The Presbyterian Church of Brazil

aiming at a brotherly fellowship in which they will help each other in the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Preamble

The Presbyterian Church of Brazil has been created by God as one of His instruments to be a Reformed and Presbyterian witness in Brazil for Jesus Christ and the Kingdom of God. The Evangelical Presbyterian Church has also been created by God as a similar instrument in the United States. Each recognizes that the other has primary responsibility for the country where God has placed it. When one works as a helper in the regional field of the other, it shall do so under the authority of that church. However, in order for the helper church to have a voice in the missionary enterprise of the primary church, it is necessary to establish a means whereby the two churches may share in the planning, projecting, overseeing and strategizing for missions. It is always to be remembered that the primary church has final authority for approval of such plans for missions. The means for such joint planning shall be "The Joint Committee for Missions." This Joint Committee shall assist both in Brazil and in the United States in recommending to the primary churches plans for developing the missionary enterprise in joint venture between the primary and the helper churches.

The Joint Committee for Missions

 Recommendations for shared missions between a primary and helper church shall come to both churches through the JCM.

The JCM shall be composed of six (6) members, three (3) from each church. In addition, each church may appoint advisors without vote.

3. Each church shall designate one of its members as co-chairman and meeting shall be alternately chaired by the co-chairman. A secretary/recorder shall be provided by the host church and minutes shall be provided in both English and Portuguese. A permanent book of the minutes shall be kept in both languages and a copy provided for each church for historical purposes. The Committee shall meet at least annually in November and at other times as necessary, such other meetings to be set by the JCM at its November meeting or upon call of the co-chairman. The regular meetings ordinarily shall be held alternately in each country.

 The JCM shall make an annual report to the two churches through the appropriate denominational committee, in order that shared missions may be kept before the two churches.

- The approval, disapproval, or modification of recommendations from the JCM shall come from that board or agency so designated by the particular church. Also such designated board or agency may submit recommendations and proposals to the JCM for its consideration.
- No joint missionary enterprise shall be undertaken that has not been recommended by the JCM and approved in a manner required by each denomination.
- Approved joint missionary enterprises shall have a time frame and financial parameters designated and shall have established procedures for evaluation and assessment.
- The following stipulations shall govern missionaries (those appointed to serve within the bounds of the other church):

A. Ordained

- Shall be under the jurisdiction of the agency, institution or church court under which they serve.
- Shall be under the constitutional documents (confessions, polity, discipline, court decisions) of the church under which they are serving.
- May become members of an appropriate presbytery if they desire without affecting their membership in their own denomination.
- In the event of a need to exercise discipline, the matter shall be referred to the church of origin (sending church).

B. Laymen

- Shall be under the jurisdiction of the agency, institution or church court under which they serve.
- Shall be under the constitutional documents (confessional, polity, discipline, court decisions) of the church under which they are serving.
- May become members of a local congregation if they desire without affecting membership in their own home church.
- In the event of a need to exercise discipline, the matter shall be referred to the church of origin (sending church).
- C. The sending church shall be responsible for matters relating to the maintenance of missionaries. An exception to this could occur when a request is made by the primary church of the helper church on the condition of taking responsibility for the support of that person.
- 9. Funding shall be guided by the following principles:
 - Donors may designate funds only to projects approved by the JCM and accepted by both churches. Each donor church shall designate an agent of facilitation for prospective donations.
 - B. Contributions of a helper church shall ordinarily be used for missions enterprises, including church buildings, or schools or manses. Mission enterprises include the support of personnel designated as internal missionaries by the primary church, but such support shall always be through the Board of National Missions.
 - C. Mission projects ordinarily shall be supported by both the primary church and help church so that there will be a sense of mutual ownership.

However, the mutual ownership shall not be judged by the amount of financial participation.

D. The helper church may acquire or own properties for its own use such as a headquarters for its missionary enterprise or manses for its missionaries within the area of the primary church. However, when funds are provided for expansion or development of facilities shall be owned by the appropriate agency or court of the primary church.

 Participation in the JCM does not preclude either church from establishing working relationships with other churches or groups in either Brazil or the United States, provided that through the JCM the other denomination is

informed and has an opportunity to respond.

 However, the above freedom does not apply to relationships that may be established by either church with persons, agencies, or dissident groups of the other church.

- 12. While this agreement envisions a permanent mutual working relationship, it shall be reviewed periodically by the JCM which may also suggest revisions to both churches, or either church of itself may initiate suggested revisions. Either church may revoke the agreement provided six months minimum notice is given. The union of either church with another church body will automatically terminate the agreement after twelve (12) months following such union. The continued cooperation with the new entity will necessitate approval of new terms of agreement.
- Initially and until changed by either church, the coordinating agencies for the JCM shall be the World Outreach Committee of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and the Inter-ecclesiastical Relations Committee of the Presbyterian Church of Brazil.
- 14. Initially, the priorities for the JCM shall focus on Brazil as the primary church with the Evangelical Presbyterian Church being the helper church. Those priorities shall be:
 - A. Theological Education, including;
 - Graduate education for pastors;
 - 2. Library development
 - Capital development of seminaries.
 - B. Support of US Presbyterian missionaries already working with the Presbyterian Church of Brazil who wish to continue that working relationship by transfer of the jurisdiction of EPC as their sending church.
 - C. The sending of missionaries from EPC to work with the Presbyterian Church of Brazil, providing the Presbyterian Church of Brazil approves them.
 - D. The JCM may explore areas in the United States of Canada where it may be appropriate to place the missionaries from the Presbyterian Church of Brazil, provided it has the approval of the EPC.
 - E. Cooperating in the national missions enterprise with the Presbyterian Church of Brazil in frontier areas especially but not to the exclusion of other significant opportunities for mission.
 - F. Beginning to develop a mutual and cooperative missionary enterprise to the Americas and wherever there are places of special opportunities.

- 15. The details of the methods by which recommendations from the JCM go to each church for approval and implementation may be attached to this Agreement as an official attachment for the church.
- These Articles of Agreement shall be in force when approved by both churches.
 Amendments will be in force when approved by both churches.

1. The missionary shall have dual membership status with both the Evangelical Presbyterian Church World Outreach and (name of agency) 2. The appointment of the missionary shall be subject to the approval of both agencies in accordance with the standards established by each agency. 3. In the event that one agency requests confidential materials gathered by the other, such material shall be shared with the understanding that the materials shall be kept confidential by that agency. 4. The missionary-candidate shall participate in the full candidate and training program agency. 5. An appropriate time shall be allowed for the candidate to properly do itineration or deputation for the candidate coordination of the World Outreach within the Evangelical Presbyterian Church churches in order that adequate prayer and financial support can be realized. 6. 



THE GENEVA STATEMENT

Agreement of Cooperation between the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church

Being persuaded from Scripture that all Christians are united as one body in Christ, we acknowledge our responsibility to God and one another to labor together in the work of Christ so as to promote the peace, purity and unity of the church and the advancement of Christ's Kingdom in the world.

We share a common understanding of the Scriptures, as expressed in the **Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechism** for laboring together in ministry. Recognizing that some differences exist between us in our understanding of certain issues concerning God's will for His church we also recognize that which we hold in common far outweighs that which differentiates us. It is understood that our common labors shall not compromise the consciences of either church. The integrity of each church concerning its standards and politics must be maintained and respected.

We therefore pledge ourselves to labor together in love, to advance the work of Christ in both our common and separate ministries, seeking to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

We promise that if ever we should offend one another in our common labors, we shall do everything possible to resolve the matter and to maintain cooperation. We commit ourselves to labor in support of our church courts, faithfully reporting our activities to the appropriate board or agency, and our respective committees concerning interchurch relations.

We further believe that such practical fraternity apart from any quest for organizational union, will be pleasing to God and promote the advancement of the Gospel in the world. For these reasons we commit ourselves to this Agreement of Cooperation, which is to be attached to the joint statement previously adopted by our churches.

Adopted June, 1992 12 General Assembly

The 11th General Assembly (1991) together with the General Synod of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church authorized the interchurch relations committees to continue meeting for purposes of finding areas of mutual commitments, discovering areas of differences, and exploring ways of resolving those differences, exploring new and creative ways of working together. They shall report back to the respective parent bodies each year until such time as either committee may ask to be discharged from this duty, or until the appointing body may discharge the committee from such duty.

Adopted June, 1991 11th General Assembly

EVANGELICAL PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH MEDICAL BENEVOLENCE FUND

RESOLVED, that there is hereby declared this 26th day of June, 1992 by the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church meeting in Memphis, Tennessee, a Medical Benevolence Fund designated and distinct from all other funds of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church to be administered by the Committee on Administration under the following terms and conditions:

- Fund Income. The Committee shall, after paying the necessary expenses of the
 management and preservation of the Fund, pay an amount up to but not exceeding
 the net income of the Fund as directed by the Benevolence Committee. In the year
 that the total distributions over the course of a calendar year, as directed by the
 Benevolence Committee, shall total an amount less than the entire net income, then
 the Committee shall accumulate any excess income and add it to the principal.
- 2. <u>Benevolence Committee</u>. The Benevolence Committee shall be composed of two Ruling Elders and one Teaching Elder of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church who shall be nominated by the Committee on Administration and elected by the General Assembly. Each member of the Benevolence Committee shall serve for a term of three years and shall not be eligible for succession. The first group of Committee members shall be elected with staggered terms; that is, one shall be elected for a one-year term, one shall be elected for a two-year term, and one shall be elected for a three-year term.
 - <u>Distribution Requirements.</u> The Benevolence Committee shall order the Committee on Administration to make distributions from the income of the Fund only under the following conditions:
 - A. All distributions shall be used solely for the purpose of paying for the cost of medical benefits insurance.
 - B. Only the following individuals shall be eligible as beneficiaries of such distributions:
 - Ministers of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church who are without a present call. Such beneficiaries shall be eligible, however, only until such time as their income* exceeds \$25,000** annual gross effective income, until medical benefits become available from some other source as a part of such person's income or for a maximum period of one year.
 - Mission church pastors of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church, but only if the
 mission church is not a daughter church of another Evangelical Presbyterian
 Church and only until such time as such pastor's annual gross effective
 income shall exceed the sum of \$25,000** and in no event shall such pastor
 receive distributions for more than one year.
 - 3. Retired ministers of Evangelical Presbyterian Churches.

- C. Applications for distributions shall be made to the Benevolence Committee by the Presbytery having jurisdiction over the prospective beneficiary. The Benevolence Committee shall develop an application form which, among other things, shall be executed by the Presbytery and shall contractually commit an amount equal to the distribution from this Fund, it being the intention that this Fund shall never pay more than one-half of the actual amount of the medical benefit insurance premium paid on behalf of each individual beneficiary. Applications shall be received by the Committee quarterly in January, April, July and October.
- D. In the event that the income from this Fund is not sufficient to pay the entire one-half of the need of the individual applicants in any year, then the Benevolence Committee shall order its distributions to be made pro rata based upon the amount of income available from this Fund.
- Amendment. The General Assembly shall have the power at any time, by a
 vote of seventy-five percent (75%) of the General Assembly, duly constituted,
 to modify, alter or amend this designation of endowment fund and to change
 the requirements for the beneficiaries thereof.
- 5. <u>Accountings.</u> The Committee on Administration shall render annually a statement of properties in the Fund and of receipts and disbursements by category during the period covered to the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church at its annual meeting. Each accounting shall be done on a calendar year basis and shall be rendered to the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church during the next calendar year.

POSITION DESCRIPTION FOR THE STATED CLERK

I. Position Title: Stated Clerk of the General Assembly

II. **Date**: January 1, 2001

- III. Position Summary: The Stated Clerk is responsible before God for the work of the General Assembly of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. The Stated Clerk is chief administrative officer of the Office of the General Assembly.
- IV. **Term**: The Stated Clerk shall be elected by the General Assembly to serve for a definite period as constitutionally defined by the court.

V. Duties:

- A. The general duties and responsibilities of the Stated Clerk are set forth in the Book of Order and Rules for Assembly.
 - B. The Stated Clerk shall be responsible for interpreting all constitutional matters not specifically referred to a General Assembly committee, in which case the General Assembly, by its response to a committee report, will be the final interpreting authority.
 - C. The Stated Clerk shall record all Assembly transactions and preserve these records carefully, and in addition, grant extracts from them whenever properly required. Such extracts shall be evidence to any ecclesiastical court, and to every part of the church.
 - D. All notices required by civil and ecclesiastical law shall be prepared and forwarded by the Stated Clerk, who shall also take general charge of the corporate books and records.
 - E. The Stated Clerk shall sign such instruments as may be required and perform duties as may be assigned by the Committee on Administration or members of the corporation in General Assembly. The Stated Clerk shall assist the Moderator in the fulfillment of his office.
 - F. The Stated Clerk shall be responsible for the oversight of the Financial Manager who is the custodian of the funds and securities belonging to

the Corporation. The Stated Clerk shall oversee the receipts deposits and disbursement of such funds by the Financial Manager as directed by the General Assembly. The Stated Clerk shall oversee the accounted accounting of the finances of the Corporation by the Financial Manager.

- G. The Stated Clerk shall resource the work of each permanent committee in keeping with those tasks assigned to it by the General Assembly. Each committee that has its own staff executive shall be resourced by that executive. The Stated Clerk is responsible for coordinating the utilization and distribution of the resources of the Corporation.
- H. The Stated Clerk shall be available as need warrants to represent the denomination to the general public and to the churches. Responsibility for official denominational correspondence with all fraternal persons and bodies shall be that of the Stated Clerk.

VI. Organizational Relationships:

- A. Responsible to: The Stated Clerk is responsible to the General Assembly through immediate accountability to the Committee on Administration.
- B. Responsible for: The Stated Clerk is responsible for all professional and clerical staff persons assigned to the Office of the General Assembly, and to coordinate the work of all.
- C. The Stated Clerk is responsible, through various committees and individuals for planning of goals and activities designed to carry out the mission of the denomination and achieve the results anticipated by the vision statement of the General Assembly.

VII. Evaluation:

The personnel committee of the Committee on Administration shall serve as an evaluation committee for the annual evaluation of the Stated Clerk, and review with the Stated Clerk the evaluation of the General Assembly staff. Committee will report annually to the Administration Committee.

The Evaluation Committee shall be enlarged every third year by two persons for that year only, coinciding with the year of the election of the Stated Clerk. This committee shall provide the Committee on Administration a comprehensive evaluation of the Stated Clerk. The Committee on Administration shall provide this evaluation and a nomination to the General Assembly.

POSITION STATEMENT ON PRESBYTERY DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of this position statement is to be a guide to the General Assembly in making decisions concerning the establishment of new presbyteries or the realignment of current boundaries.

The Church as the body of Christ is composed of all those persons who profess Jesus as their Lord and Savior, together with their children. The Church on earth is not limited to particular forms of government or denominational structures; nevertheless, the government of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall be Presbyterian in form. Such is government by elders meeting in church courts in regular gradation. The Evangelical Presbyterian Church believes the perfecting of the visible Church is best established where the scriptural doctrine of government by elders gathered in church courts is practiced.

The courts of the Church shall be the Session, the Presbytery, and the General Assembly. Presbytery shall be composed of all Ministers belonging to it, and two Ruling Elders for each Minister drawn from the particular churches within its bounds.

The Presbytery has jurisdiction over all that belongs to the worship and ministry of a group of churches within the designated bounds. In its spiritual oversight, the mission of the Presbytery shall be:

- The nurture and care of persons called to the office of Minister and oversight of all transactions pursuant to call.
- 2. The provision of spiritual discipline according to the Book of Discipline.
- 3. The oversight of church Sessions through annual review.
- 4. The maintenance of peace and unity within the congregations.
- 5. The establishment and development of churches.
- The encouragement of evangelism, renewal, and ministries of compassion within the congregations and Presbytery.
- 7. The active participation in the life of the General Assembly.
- The organization of the Presbytery for maximum advancement of the Gospel and the kingdom.
- The provision of resources to member congregations promoting effective evangelism, education, stewardship, officer training and the like.

In pursuit of its mission, the question naturally arises as to what constitutes a viable Presbytery. Viability may be defined as "the ability with maximum efficiency to achieve a stated mission." The basic components of a viable Presbytery within the Evangelical Presbyterian Church shall be understood as the following:

1. LEADERSHIP

A Presbytery must have adequate personnel resources to support the local church as well as Presbytery's committees and commissions.

2. FINANCIAL RESOURCES

Sufficient resources must be available to support the mission and life of a Presbytery. A minimum budget of \$100,000 ('94 dollar basis) per year is necessary.

3. COMMITIMENT

Leadership and resources are of little value if the solid commitment of Ministers and Ruling Eiders of each church to the connectional form of government is absent

4. DEMOGRAPHICS

The minimum requirements for a Presbytery need to be:

- 1. A large church (1,000 + members);
- 2. Twelve organized churches;
- 3. A composite membership base of 2,500.

5. OFFICE OF THE STATED CLERK

The Stated Clerk shall be provided with office equipment and necessary support staff to carry out the duties of the office as defined in the Presbytery by-laws.

6. GEOGRAPHIC PROXIMITY

Presbytery boundaries should be established to keep travel distances between churches to a reasonable minimum.

Article III. Egith and Durmons	

Article II: Faith and Purpose

We affirm our document, "The Essentials of Our Faith." The foundation paragraph of this document follows:

All Scripture is self-attesting, and being Truth, requires our unreserved submission in all areas of life. The infallible Word of God, the sixty-six books of the Old and New Testaments, is a complete and unified witness to God's redemptive acts, culminating in the incarnation of the Living Word, the Lord Jesus Christ. The Bible, uniquely and fully inspired by the Holy Spirit, is the supreme and final authority in all matters on which it speaks.

Statement of Purpose

Ephesians 4:12 "For the perfecting of the saints for the work of the ministry, for edifying of the Body of Christ..."

The purpose of Women's Ministries of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church is to provide an atmosphere for the women of the church to mature spiritually and to recognize, develop and share their God-given gifts for works of service. Central to the purpose of Women's Ministries is the affirmation of women as being loved and called by God into a personal relationship with Him through our Lord Jesus Christ and the nurture of women in the knowledge of Him and His plan for each individual life.

Article III: Membership

The membership of Women's Ministries shall be open to all women of the church. No formal membership is necessarily required for participation.

Article IV: Leadership

The leadership of Women's Ministries shall be members of the local church. Leadership shall be structured according to the needs and preferences of the local church.

Examples may include but are not limited to: 1. A Coordinator serving over committees such as Spiritual Nurture, Missions, Special Events, Service. 2.

President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Historian, and Program Chain.
3. Director of Women's Ministries in conjunction with a Coordinating Council initiating and overseeing the various ministries of a larger church.

Article V: Denomination Representation and Participation

Local church Women's Ministries should encourage women to participate in presbytery and national program-ming including retreats, General Assemblies, and national conferences to build and enrich connectional relationships.

Article VI: Relationships

Local Women's Ministries shall be under the jurisdiction of the local church session.**

Article VII: Finances

The local work of Women's Ministries may be financed through regular pledges, voluntary offerings, church budget, and/or fundraising as approved by the session.

Article VIII: Meetings

Meetings may be scheduled as desired and needed.

Article IX: Amendments

This Constitution may be accepted, rescinded or amended by a simple majority of Women's Ministry participants who are also members of the local church.

Article X: Parliamentary Authority

Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority in matters not addressed in this constitution.

- "Local church" refers to both the particular churches and mission churches.
- ** "Session" includes local church sessions and applicable governing body over mission churches.

1. World Outreach Missionaries

Recruitment

- Encourage prayer for the identification of World Outreach missionary candidates.
- From among both the members of presbytery and its congregations, seek out and encourage potential candidates to consider World Outreach service.
- · Encourage and assist candidates in the application process.
- Disseminate current information on World Outreach's specific needs for new missionaries.

Support

- Urge the churches of the presbytery to help support all World Outreach missionaries through the World Outreach Office.
- Encourage each church to include in its mission committee policy a statement which gives preferential support consideration to World Outreach missionary appointees.

Contact

 Insure adequate communication is maintained between churches and the missionary on field.

Home Service

- Plan, in cooperation with the World Outreach committee, strategic opportunities for World Outreach missionaries to share their work with presbytery.
- Meet with, for reporting and review, each missionary on home service who is a member of presbytery.

2. Interpretation and Support of World Outreach Projects

- Encourage regular representation from the presbytery on World Outreach mission trips, helping the participants share broadly on their return.
- Establish and pursue the goal of preferential support for World Outreach projects by every church in the presbytery.
- Provide on request information on current World Outreach projects, their progress and their support status.

3. Ethnic Church Development

 Encourage representatives of presbytery to visit any EPC ethnic congregations or mission churches within the presbytery. See opportunities for integrating ethnic congregations into the life and fellowship of the presbytery.

4. Mission Education

- Plan World Outreach seminars, workshops and conferences whereby clusters
 of churches or the entire presbytery will be encouraged to cooperate, thereby
 strengthening their mission commitment.
- Encourage every congregation to have a periodic mission conference or mission day, sharing resources with one another as appropriate.
- Distribute information on the mission program of World Outreach.
